In addition to the traditional police duties, these officers are also trained as emergency medical technicians. They administer first aid, as needed, to accident victims as well as to others who may have suffered a medical emergency. They also perform Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation.





#### **Women's Gains Questioned**

Last Wednesday Ms. Grace DeSantis of DePaul University painted a less-than-rosy picture of the status of women in today's workplace.

The equal rights movement has not produced a victory for women, according to DeSantis. "The phrase 'equal work for equal pay' is a meaningless one," she said. Although more women are working, it is still primarily in the clerical and secretarial sectors. These jobs, which are usually low have never played a major role.

Although statistics support the claim that women are replacing men in the overall labor force, this typically lower skilled jobs. is due more to the decline of heavy

"Breakfast with Dubbed Computers," the workshops will meet from 7 to 9 am, starting with sweet rolls and coffee served on the second floor balcony overlooking the campus. They will then move into the Cooperative Computer Center for discussion and hands-on instruction.

"Visicalc" is a five-morning workshop meeting on June 21, 22, 23, 24 and 27. The first electronic spreadsheet is recognized as a must for all career-minded executives with personal computers. 
The next meeting is scheduled for July 13 at 3:30 pm in the Honors Dining Room. There will be no meeting in August.


