Joanne has trod every continent on the globe except South America and has been in every country in Europe except those behind the Iron Curtain. The daughter of Américan missionaries, she was born 27 miles from the Caspian sea and just onē hundred -miles from the Rusisan border in the country more commonly known as Persia. She has lived there for a total of 12 of her 19 years.
"During the second" World war, my mother and I were evactuated from Iran," she related. "We were on a small freighter and were chased by enemy submarines. Our party went to Ceylon and decided not to take the -ship further. It went on without u and was sunk shortly thereatter. "Most of the war years we spent in

"I carned enough money from teaching to take a tour of Europe and the Near East by airplane," she explained. "The highlight of alt my travels was when 1 visited Israel and saw the many places where Christ had been. 1 wisited the supposed sites of the Sepulcher and Calvary, and 1 shall never forget watching the sun set over ferusalem as I stood on the Mount of Olives.
"Another place I found to be very impressive was the quaint little village of Canterbury, in England. The Canterbury Cathedral contrasted so sharply, in its beautiful simplicity, with the ornate cathedrals and churches which I saw in Rome," she said.
Joanne speaks English and Persian fluently, and also has some knowledge of Russian, Arabic, Armenian, and Assyrian.
After completing her college work, she plans on returning to Iran as a misssionary.

"Wée are not anti-American," Kaga. wa said, "but we are against certain policies of the United States, particularly, the sudden rearmament, for it is
forcing' us to spend more money on arms and munitions and, much lesa moriey on things like social security. It is a difficult situation."
The " H " bomb is another problem, according to Kagnwa. In referring to the incident last summer 'when Japanese fishermen were burned by' radiation 75 - miles from the blast of an American hydrogen bomb in the Paci. fic, Kngawa explained that such ex.

## Does Cruelty Underly Hazing?

* Is it right or wrang'tikis strange cultural 'collegiate fad that sociologígts call hazing?

One psychologist from a university in Canada says thumbs dowin gn this national phenomenon. He feels that hazing breeds resentment on the part of those being initiated, when they are coerced into acting and dressing in accordance with childish regulations.

He pointed out that if one individual is oriented into poor social adjustment, the whole practice is wrong. That the mental health of one person is worth more than the warped pleasure of the entire group was elearly brought out.

The principal defense for maintaining freshman hazing is the misconception that the practice instills a sense of unity between the initiate and the institution. True unity of spirit is not achieved through alienation, but through fostering a feeling of mutual aspirations, with the emphasis on team work.

What kind of a team have you got when some of the members are wearing a different uniform and some disagree intensely with the veteran team-mates who make up the rules of the sport as they go along? This is not a team, nor is it unity.

Others argue that forcing ridiculous situations on "green" students teaches them humility, Who here will say that he has ever learned humility by being exposed to humiliation? It can't be done.
"Noah" calls assimitation the process of malding alike: Are we making the freahmen like us whon we slosh them into horse troughs, clapmp them into primitive stocles, and make them parade in humiliating costumes?

Yes, in one sense we're making them like us- in a sadistic sense. The underlying motive of hazing stems from sadism and cruelty, no matter how much you would like to color it, cover it up, or explain it away. Of course the seriousness of this problem has been kept to a minimum at Whitworth. Still we are supposed to be molding Christians, not sadists.

A'college can be likéned to a meltiñg pot, and the students the metal. But you can't melt em by makin' 'em mad. Hazing is definitely a negative approach to assimilation.

Merely the act of living on a college campus the first few weeks of school holds tremendous problems of adjustment 'for' the freshman, without shoving' the 'boul'der of humiliation and hazing into his pathway;. His road is already rough enough.

Then too, the attitude of revenge nowballs in the mind, and the chance that next year's initiation will run out of

The principal motive of 194 supporters is to protect the moral development of Washington's children. The principal motive of liquor and beer advertisers, as they have openly declared, is to create a desire in children and to event ually become tipplers of beer and hard drinks, THROÚGH ADVERTISING. The purpose of the supporters is to protect morals; the latter, to corrupt.
Do we limit freedom? Yes. We do that in our America. We limit the freedom of murderers, of robbers, of those who piander and of those who demoralize youngsters. We, the people, are to sit jury on the vital issue, 194.

On the basis of what is best for most, society as a whole, the time has come to extend present regulations of advertis ing alcohol on TV. Members of the US Supreme court were not thinking of self when they declared the liquor business to be fraught with dangers demanding regulations to SAFEGUARD PUBLIC WELFARE.

History's birthday last week was marked by a healthy optimism being sported by the nation's top experts who have ventured to predict that " ' 55 should be a good year', in respect to business and industry, and national and international affairs.

That same pptimism could turn into a dangerous opiate. as it has in former years, if it were not being balanced by a necessary skepticiam. This balance describes the now realistic approach of America toward the frightening problem of preventing a World War III. Always before, America could shut one eye and boit ears when the drums of war sounded at somebody elese's door, and at laist resort sond a few soldiers over there to die for some other country's sing.

Now that we're about three hours away from a Russian H-bomb and half the world's population is peeking at us through a curtain, we wake up and stop singing the isolation lullaby. ' (and that wasn't so long either.)

Now Uncle Sam stands wide-eyed, with binoculars focused on the international scene, viewing, for the first time in years, a world free of declared wars. And he's a bit skeptical because he knows that when a battle halts it may be just because somebody got hurt and called time out to run home for a band-aid. In this age you have to be a skeptic to stay alive.

Our Uncle knows from the sound of machines stamping. out materiel behind that curtain that the bour has not come for hastily converting US defense lactories for the production of plowshares and pruning hooks. Uncle Sam is still shivering from the cold war and hass settled down to sweat out what looks like a hot time to come.

With the possibility of an H or A bomb that could turn the world into a no-man's-land-literally-America is still bravely optimistic, as she must be. We should leave no room in the inn for fatalism here.

Peaceful coexistence is a nice idea no matter whose it is, as is the idea of the lamblying down with the lion, but so far neither has happened. A bomb or a , bullet nevef brought peácé, but good ideas will.

Finally, man hass begun this realization and is attempting to fight it out over a UN conforence table, with the idea of coexistence.

Until the millennium of coexistence is come it looks like America will have to keep on playing God sending its sons to be crucified on some foreign cross to save a fre man's peace

## $\overline{\text { Faculty Sees Slight Dilemma }}$

Hurrah for the faculty and administration who dis. covered a problem, investigated it; and are now working out a solution.

That an indefinite number of students are laboring under a heavy academic load plus working their way through college, plus serving in their particular church, plus taking on executive duties in Whitworth extra-curricular activitieswas called to the attention of administrators.

Only 309 students who cunswered the poll indicated that they worked at jobs up to six hours a week. Thirteen worked over eight hours. Out of 675 who reported 360 are angaged in some type of religious organization work:

Belonging to one or two non-college organizations were 158, while ten belonged to three or four clubs and 23 belonged to more than four clubs. Offices in non-campus organizations were held by 57 students. Only 54 students spent more than six hours a month in this club work. Forty students tussle with more than 18 hours of academics, while 16 hours was the median, with 226 scholars subscribing.

Pouring over texts more than five hours daily are 149 intellects, while most spent from two to four.

Ten Whitworthicuss were mambers of six or more college orgamizations: 79. belonged to four or five; and about a hundred attended one, two, and thiree clubs, each, with 99 holding on office, and il holding two officas. According to interpretations af the poll somon students are mopt ar. suredly epreading their butter $\alpha$ bit thin. But the reailits show doubt whether the problem has reached any serious proportion at Whitworth.

At any rate, some changes will be made by the end of this term. Platitudinously speaking, Whitworth has often been criticized for having "too many organizations and not enough organization". To rectify the situation, several of the major religious functions will either combine or hold meetings on the same night, and one week night will be chosen for most other club meetings.

ASWC constitutional switches will include restricting the student body officers, and the editors of the Natsihi and Whitworthian from holding offices in other college organizations, and others from holding too many offices.

## $\overline{\text { Masses Worry Russ 'Brains' }}$

Wouldn't you like to know? Just what Soviet Russia's next move will be, that is.

Some scholars from Harvard university were curious too, and they made a four-year study of the Red color scheme to find out. The 33,000 -page report, which included hundreds of interviews from Russian emigres, questionnaires filled out by escapees, reports from former factory managers, and Commie party officials, was handed over to the United States air force.

Interpretations of the report were made by a social psy'chologisi, an anthropologist, a sociologist, historians, political scientists, economists, clinical psychologists, and students of Russian literature. In consideration of the strengths and wealanesses of the USSR, social studies eame in handy.
Will there be a revolt against the Red political and economic regime? The students say the chances are very slight at present, although the researchers called the Russian peasant-farmers- 'the angry men', becausé they allegedly detest the state means of ownership and production.

Some of the strong points in the regime were brought out. Russia plunks down one billion, five hundred thousand salted peanuts periannum for PROPAGANDA. Small wonder that "little Ivan" believes that Amierica is out to conquer the world; that capitalism feeds on the working class and exists only to further the production of bullets and bombs with which to murder the Russian people; that the US standard of living for the rank and file is lower than Russia's; that Americans are materialistic and lack spiritual values; that Westerners are softies.

According to the report on all-out war at this time seems unlikely; the resignation of Madenkov will probably not alter the stability of the Russian syaterit and the cold war will last for at least five more years couplad with a continual struggle between the "palace leaders" expected. "The leaders plan to strengthen their country, exploit other lands, and .sit tight until capitalism "decays" like Lonin predicted.

Meanwhile the "Red heads" are having difficulty pleasing and appeasing the people.: Hot hatred of the collective farming system is wide spread, and the rulers in power are disliked, and ditto, the low standard of living.

They live in terror of the secret police and the knock on the door in the dark of night. They are silent men. The finger on the lips saves a life of forced labor. Also, the theoretical classless's society is actually anything but, and Ivan has begun to notice this.

The pillar of strength of the Soviet system lies in the control of the individual and the individual's ability to adapt to this grip. In Russia, such' an adjustment is not ám alternative. There are no allematives, unless you count being murdered, or a brillicnt careor of salt mining, altematives.

One thing Harvard forgot. This, too comes from observation. Aristotle, centuries past, scored when he realized that man was made for God. If this is true, man must. and will awaken to this truth. The Russians cannot supress the mind of man indefinitely. Their very ideology is contra dictory to the nature of man

When will the great awakening be? Not even Harvard knows that.
