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SAYS INDUSTRY IN BAD SHAPE

Its Disorganization Very Serious and Outlets Far Greater Than Demand

Editorial.—The following outstanding thing in the financial situation has come under the attention of the United States commission, headed by E. H. Root, after two weeks' study of conditions here. The industrial disorganization of the country and the obstacles in the path of reconstruction introduced by anarchistic and reactionary elements, irresponsible persons and fanatics of all kinds, working with the direct purpose of assisting the enemy or the equally malicious desire to cause the downfall of the Russian democracy, are much more serious than America has been led to believe.

The Provisional Government has been successful in initiating the support of the great majority of the people, but until it is able with a strong hand to demonstrate its complete authority and exercise this authority in punishing irresponsible persons and cliques, which by their creation of dissension in the country are attempting to prevent Russia from consolidating the benefits gained from the triumph of the revolution, there can be no real stability or security to serve as a basis for sound economic work.

The commission noticed, however, many encouraging symptoms of the gradual acceptance of the Provisional Government will of the country and found a tendency among all the Socialists of the extremist minority to give full support to the Provisional Government. The result of this movement is to widen daily the breach which has sprung between the Socialists and the pure moderate Socialists.

Not a few of the moderate Socialists, instead of being able to continue to direct Russian reconstruction in its own channels of anarchistic revolt, the Maximalists and the Stalinists alone as a distinct and stable industry, ceasing to dominate or seriously to influence any considerable number of persons.

A more sober and responsible conception is spreading through rural Russia, and is reverting to the negative ideas of the peasants and the mischievous doctrines propagated by the extremists.

There is still manifest a deep sense of the miseries of the people regarding the possibility of a close fraternity between the proletariat of Russia and Germany.

The Socialists have not yet learned that there is little common between the international Socialists and the purely national and anti-imperialistic Socialists of Germany, and that a world democracy cannot grow out of the association of Russia and Germany.

EXIT CREMATORY

Citizen Registers Complaint—Health Officer Ordered to Clean Up—Sunday Law Must be Enforced—Indecent to be Shipped From—Whereas It Came.

The regular monthly meeting of the city council was held in the police room at the City Hall Tuesday evening with the following official present: Mayor Davidson and Aldermen Nichols, Glenn, Calhoun, Chitty, Prater and Cross.

The usual monthly reports of the Chief of Police and City Clerk and Treasurer were received. The ordinance with reference to the collecting of licenses in the city received second reading.

Mr. W. J. Irwin appeared before the council and made complaint regarding the condition and location of several surface closets near Aiken and College streets. This matter, at Mr. Irwin's request, had been taken into by the health department and it was found that the closets were very unsanitary and also that the property owners had not been carrying out the law with reference to same. A motion was made and seconded that the Health Officer inform the property owners that their property must be kept in a sanitary condition, not only in the section complained of, but throughout the entire city.

Mr. Omas H. Barron, of the Carolina Bond & Mortgage Company, appeared before the council with reference to the check held by the city for one thousand dollars in connection with a refunding bond issue, and asked that same be returned. It was decided to come to an agreement within a few days.

The matter of locating the Infirmary was again taken up and discussed. It was decided that the council, as a whole, would make a survey of the city and endeavor to find a location where there would be no complaint from any citizen.

The selling of cold drinks, cigars, etc., on Sunday was discussed after which it was decided that the Mayor instruct the policemen to enforce the ordinance, with reference to the sale of goods on Sunday, to the letter. This motion was made by Mr. Glenn, seconded by Mr. Cross.

The building of a cement sidewalk on Upper Columbia street, was brought up by Mr. Chitty. The property owners asking for same will be requested to sign a petition. It is in accordance with the law governing the construction of cement sidewalks.

Wednesday morning the members of the council had visited various sections of the city and were unable to find a location where there would be no complaint from citizens.
