PREFACE

In 1979 The South Carolina Historical Society secured the Papers of David Duncan Wallace from two sources. Dr. Wallace's correspondence and his collection of family papers had been carefully preserved by his surviving children, Mrs. Edwin B. Clippard, Dr. Robert M. Wallace, and Miss Alice Wallace. The research notes for his History of South Carolina had been preserved intact by Wofford College.

The correspondence and family papers were acquired with funds contributed by the Post-Courier Foundation, Mr. and Mrs. Rodney Williams, Dr. and Mrs. Charles V. Peery, Mrs. Lloyd Hunter, and Mrs. Lawrence R. Kegan. Because Wofford has no graduate program in history and because the notes were on acidic paper, the College transferred title to the Society in return for a microform copy of the complete papers. As a result, the original arrangement of the notes and the information itself is being permanently preserved and made widely available. The Society is grateful to Dr. Joab M. Lesesne, Jr., President of Wofford, and to Dr. Lewis P. Jones, Chairman of its Department of History, for the arrangements necessary to prepare as complete an edition of the Papers as possible. Mr. Herbert Hucks, Jr., Archivist, lent the Archives files for filming and made available a copy of his "David Duncan Wallace: a Bibliography" (1954), which formed the basis for the accompanying bibliography. Mr. Frank T. Anderson, Librarian, lent the annotated edition of The History of South Carolina and several major manuscripts for filming.

This edition of the Papers contains all of Dr. Wallace's known book manuscripts, correspondence, notes, etc. Since Dr. Wallace kept meticulous records, his papers are unusually extensive; and since his Papers are essentially intact, the value of the whole is exceptional. All of the Papers have been filmed and copies are available at the Fireproof Building, Charleston, and Wofford's Sandor Teszler Library, Spartanburg. Several groups of manuscripts are available separately and are not included in this edition: correspondence with members of Dr. Wallace's immediate family, records of his service on the State Board of Charities and Corrections, his extensive investment records, and his book orders for the Wofford Library.
