SAVE AFRODI ANTS DIVE

SAYS AEROPLANES DIVE AT 250 MILES AN

London, April 28.—An aviation expert, writing in the Sunday Observer, dwells on the enormous speed made by the latest flying models. He says.

"Without mentioning by name any British or any henry type, it may be stated that aeroplanes capable of a speed of néariy 150 miles per hour in calm air are in existence. It it likely, too, that certain machines of heavy 'loading' (which is not the same hing as great total weight-and small head resistance in a steep dive can attain a speed of 250 miles per hour.

"Certain dangers are encountered by very high speed machines. The dangers were anticipated years ago and to some extent at any rate they are provided fop, in building. These fast craft have their own degree and problems of instability, and they are no whit, easier to fly, or safer than

"A diving speed of something more than 200 miles per hour having been attained, it seems likely that an entirely new phase is entered upon, recuiring very careful consideration.

BRITISH IN APRIL TOOK 19,343 GERMANS

257 Guns, 227 Trench Mortors, and 470 Machine Guns Captured During the Month.

London, May I.—Nearly twenty thousand prisoners were captured by the British during the month of April according to the report of the War Office this morning. In this same psried 257 guns and howitzers, 227' trench mortars, and 470 machine cupin were captured.

There has been very little fighting on the ground today, but yesterddy and last night were marked by marked activity in the air. Nine "German airplanes were brought down while nihe others were driven down out of control. The British lost nine ma-

chines.
Tonight's official statement

\*During the manth of April we have taken in the course of our offensive operations 10,343 German prisoners, including 393 officers. In the same period we also captured 257 guns and howitzers, (including 38 heavy guns and howitzers,) 227 trench mortars, and 470 mexico guns and southers.

In addition to those we captured, many of the enemy's guns, howitzers, trench mortars, and machine guns have been destroyed by our artillery fire.

Marked activity in the air continued yesterday and during the night. In the hir fightling eight German machines were brought, down hiour airplanes, two of which fell in our lines; nine others were driven down out of control, another hostile machine was shot down. Nine of our airplanes are huissing.


