NOT TO CONCENTRATE COTTON PURCHASING

Hoover Sets at Rest False Rumors Started by Those Who Wish to Profit.

Lexington, Oct. 15.—So many rumors have come to Representative Lever to the effect that a movement is under way to concentrate the purchasing of all cotton for the allies into the hands of the food administration that he felt called upon to take the matter up by letter with Food Administrator Hoover. The following reply was received: "My dear sir: I received your letter of October 6 with regard to the alleged purchasing of cotton for the allies by the food administration."

"I agree with you that the food control act is a food and fuel law, and that it was never intended to bring cotton within its provisions. I assure you that it is not our intention to have cotton, and that there is not under consideration, by the food administration any plan leading towards the elimination of competitive buying of cotton among the part of our allies."

"We are at present considering the promotion of certain cotton and regulations with regard to cotton seed and its products and this may have a bearing on the manner in which you speak in your letter."

"Trusting that this satisfactory answer your inquiry?" etc. Mr. Lever expressed today the opinion that the rumors have their source in a desire to frighten the farmer into parting with his cotton at a figure below its real value as fixed by the demand for it. He said: "There is no doubt that there is some obstacle in cotton. As there is there any doubt that the production next year can be very materially increased on the face of a shortage both in labor and fertilizers. The food control bill was never intended to apply to cotton, and it is not to be a business paper and simple. It is true that at one stage in its passage in the senate cotton was included in the bill but the members of the senate took it out. The food administration under the law, has absolute control over the cotton market and I am glad to see that no effort is to be made to concentrate the purchasing of cotton for the allies in the hands of the food administration. The farmers should not be frightened into turning loose their cotton and they should not be misled by the false rumors that most originate in the brains of those who would like to buy it at a lower figure."

BAN ON PUBLISHING ARRIVAL OF TROOPS

Guard Officers Who Have Called News From France May Be Court-martialed.

Washington, Oct. 15.—Arrested by the publication in some parts of the country of private cablegrams announcing arrival of American troops in France, the war and navy departments today took steps to prevent a further repetition of the incident, which may result in the court-martial of officers who sent the message.

In one case, a former National Guard officer, a member of the State's troops, so far as it is known here newspaper in the vicinity observed the government's voluntary censorship request and did not print the cable.

In the other case, however, a former National Guard officer, the arrival of the governor of his State of the arrival of his regiment with a request that it be given further publicity. The governor's office gave out the cablegram and many papers in the State printed the news. This morning other newspapers published the dispatch and added the number and designation of the regiment; all in violation of the voluntary censorship.

Steps probably will be taken to prevent the sending of similar messages from other officers. Steps to prevent their delivery, if necessary should they get through by mistake. All troops abroad now are under the federal control, and no longer are under State control. By reason of this fact, the government can exercise control over the news of their movements.

The body of the dead man was found on the road, and the other man was taken to the hospital. The coroner is now in the city, and the shooting was reported by a friend of the dead man.

COTTON THE CHEAPEST COMMODITY ON MARKET

Catawba Farmer Does Not Propose to Sell at Present Price.

Cotton is the cheapest commodity on the market today, and I don't propose to sell mine at present prices, says the statement of a prominent Catawba township farmer today, in discussing his crop.

"The cotton mills have paid a million and a half dollars more than was realized," he said, "and this following up by another of five short weeks ago, and the cotton price is now 10 cents below the price that it was when I began to raise it."

The cotton mills are making more money today than ever before and from what information I can get cotton mills can pay 20 and 40 cents and even more for cotton and then make handsome profits, and why a farmer knowing all these things will sell cotton at today's prices is beyond me and there is no way to get a high price for his cotton to get out even this year because it has been one of the most expensive crops to make in my experience.

"If I could not get my cotton to sell as cheap as they can, I don't believe the cotton mills would have been so successful in their business, because many of them have sold their goods for several months ahead of hand, and they would not want to deliver these goods if cotton should decline there might be a tendency on the part of the purchasers to cancel their orders."

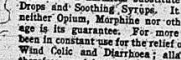
The other farmers can sell their cotton if they want to, but I propose to hold mine for higher prices. When asked what he thought about the price of cotton seed, he said: "There is no telling what cotton seed will bring. One thing sure the farmers had better hold back more than they have in the past year, they may have five times as much more as they had last year when they had to replant."

Following Our Own Idea

Why is it, we sometimes ask ourselves, that notwithstanding the fact that we have identified our own and intelligence enough to put them into operation, we have invariably followed the ideas of others? The answer is, of course, that we lack both the initiative and the determination to put them. His practice there are times when we are thoroughly convinced that it is possible to do it, to carry out our own ambitions, but when the time comes for us to put ourselves to the test we become dismayed at the outlook and doubt as to whether we overcome the hardships to be endured, we simply follow in the lead of others.

No one ever achieved noteworthy success who was content to follow indefinitely where led. He might do so for a while until he familiarized himself with conditions and satisfied himself that he possessed the ability to do for himself in his own way and others have done for themselves in their own way. But, if he is at all ambitious, he will not be content to get ahead, he will quicken and find that there is a point in his path at which he must either branch out for himself on his own initiative or else content to continue to walk unspurred in the footsteps of those who have already achieved. He must not shrink at the unknown dangers and discouragements which lurk in the unfrequented roads of life if he would be free through the force of his own ability to the heights which others have already attained. He must be strong enough of himself if possible in the direction in which his greatest talents lie and prepared day after day no matter how difficult the climb.

Others have reached the heights, but there are few of those who have foreseen ahead of us the things that they have already achieved. There are plenty of us who have the ability to go ahead, however, for those who brave the dangers on the way, and it is not necessary or desirable for any one to try and go ahead and follow the lead of others. It is just that the man who is content to follow the lead of others never to do. He has not as yet determined the other lofty heights which tower above him, one of which is certainly reserved for him if he will only have the courage to dare its ascent. As soon as he does see the peak that is meant for him, he will be ready to even in a faint and vague sort of way the rewards which await him.

He will be content to do only as others have done before him, and attempt to follow immediately in their footsteps, but he will set his own goals, and he will be content to share the particular pinnales which they have already achieved.

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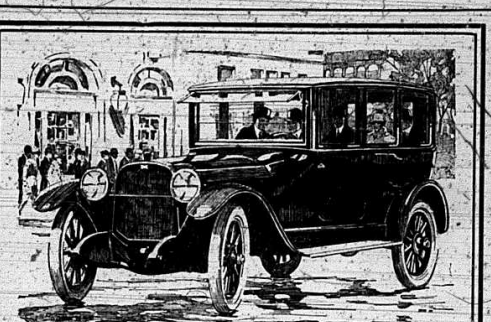
