On October 30, Rowan College played Kean College in the pouring rain. The night before Alumni helped serve drinks and food to the organizations preparing floats for the homecoming game.




























On July 6, 1992, Mr. and Mrs. Henry M. Rowan of Rancocas, New Jersey, presented Glassboro State College with a gift of \$100 million, the largest sum ever given to a public college or university. In recognition of this gift, Glassboro State College changed its name on September 1, 1993 to Rowan College of New Jersey. The endowment will be used to establish a school of engineering; to create visiting professorships; and to establish a scholarship fund for children of Inductotherm employees. Inductotherm Industries Inc. is Mr. Rowan's company.

The tradition of changing an institution's name in honor of a major donor is as old as higher education in America. Cambridge College, founded in 1636, changed its name to Harvard College in 1639 to honor John Harvard for bequeathing his library and half of his estate to the college. Glassboro State College began as Glassboro Normal School in 1923 and became the New Jersey State Teachers College at Glassboro in 1937. In 1958, the school's name was changed to Glassboro State College. Now, the name of this institution is Rowan State College of New Jersey.













At the Emmy Awards on Sept. 29, the NBC program "Seinfeld" took home 3 trophies. Michael Richards, "Kramer," won as best supporting actor in a comedy.

Michael Jordon announced his departure on Oct. 6 after leading the NBA in scoring the last seven years. "The thrill is gone. I've done it all. There's nothing left for me to do," Jordon told reporters.



An Amtrak train hurtled off a bridge into an inky bayou in Saraland, Alabama, early on the morning of Sept. 22, plunging its sleeping passengers into a nightmare of fire, water, and death. 47 people were killed.



Russia experienced political upheaval in 1993. Fire raged uncontrollably inside the stately parliament building. When the smoke cleared, the rebellion was crushed, and its leaders — including Speaker Ruslan Khasbulatov and former Security Minister Viktor Barannikov — were in jail.



One of the most dramatic home runs occurred in the 1993 World Series. Joe Carter of Toronto stepped to the plate in the 9th inning of the 6th game of the series, the score 6-5, Phillies. After one swing of his bat, the game was over and the Blue Jays won their 2nd straight series.



18 year old Kimberly Clarice Aiken, Miss South Carolina, became the new Miss America. "My main goal is to get homeless people off the streets ... I'd like to make the greatest difference."



The floods that washed across the Midwest may have been the worst in American history. The stage for disaster was set during the winter, when unusually heavy snow fell. Nancy Kerrigan, the 22year-old U.S. figure skater who was among the gold medal favorites at the 1994 Winter Olympics, was attacked after practice on January 6, 1994, by a man who hit her on the right leg with a club or metal bar.

The blow severely bruised her knee and quadriceps tendon, an injury that could impede her jumping and landing ability.

Within days, an anonymous phone call to authorities pointed to Kerrigan's rival, Tonya Harding, and a few of her entourage.

Harding's ex-husband, Jeff Gillooly, her bodyguard, Shawn Eckardt, and two hired men were arrested.

The U.S. Figure Skating Association has formed a panel to investigate the case, a first step in the process that could lead to Harding's removal from the team.



The Dallas Cowboys won their second strai National Football League championship and f Buffalo Bills earned a sadder spot in sports hist r by losing their fourth straight Super Bowl.

Across the Northeast, the Midwest and large parts of the South, the extreme cold of January 1994 brought an end to the daily routine.

Arctic air with wind chills up to 74 below zero swept across the eastern United States in the wake of a blizzard that dumped enough snow to paralyze several states.

At least 92 deaths have been blamed on the barrage of cold and snow. Many of these victims were killed on icy roads or had heart attacks shoveling snow, while others froze to death.

Tens of thousands of homeless people sought protection at shelters, which were filled to capacity in many areas.



Dallas defeated the Bills 30-13 on Sunday, January 30, 94, scoring 24 unanswered points in the second half r trailing 13-6 at half-time. Emmitt Smith, the game's st Valuable Player, led the way for Dallas, rushing for 2 yards and scoring two touchdowns.

Smith, the league's MVP in the regular season, added Super Bowl MVP award to his collection.





At 4:31 AM on Monday, January 17, 1994, an earthquake of 6.6 magnitude (Richter scale reading) struck Southern California, claiming 61 lives and leaving damage that may total \$30 billion.

Five interstate highways, including the state's major north-south route, and three state highways were closed at several points, crippling transportation.

Broken aqueducts cut off much of the water supply to the San Fernando Valley, the 260-square-mile suburban expanse hit hardest by the quake. Over 500,000 customers were left without power in Los Angeles County.

Streets were empty during nights of the 11PM-7AM curfew. National Guard troops patrolled against looting.

"The days ahead will also be rough for us," Mayor Richard Riordan warned Angelenos, even as he praised them for a cool-headed response to the crisis. "Let's all stick together."



Twenty-six fires that swept Southern California in the Fall of 1993 left four people dead and caused at least \$1 billion in damage.

Wildfires destroyed 1,150 homes, burned across 200,000 acres and injured nearly 200 people in Southern California in a matter of weeks. Adding to the horror, authorities said that 19 fires were set by arsonists.

After the discovery of two of the dead, Sgt. Ron Spear said, "If it's an arson fire, then that makes it murder. They were burned by the fire and as far as we know, it was an arson fire."

A \$250,000 reward was posted for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the arsonist. Special thanks to Martina Harold for helping with the senior section.

Monica Worrell of Burlington Township came to Rowan College in the Fall of 1993 as a Law and Justice major. Despite the many options open to her, Monica debates what specialty will be right for her.
