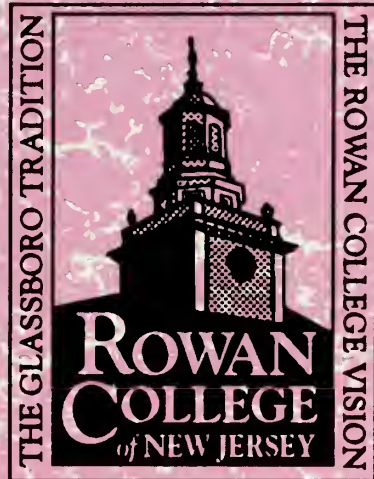

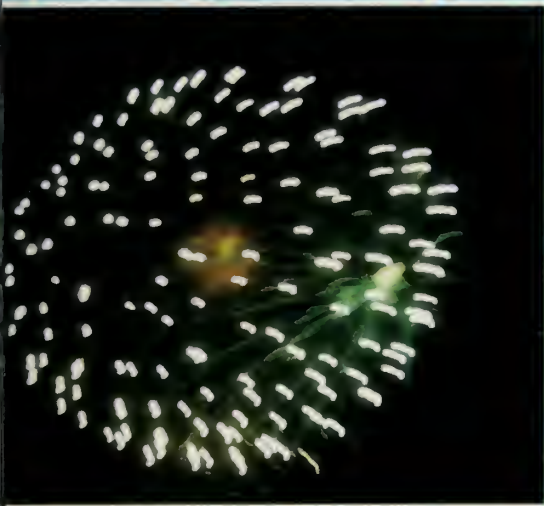

HOME COMING GAME

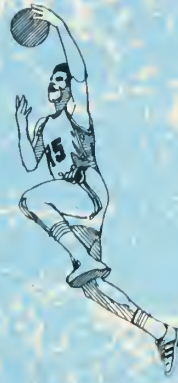
On October 30, Rowan College played Kean College in the pouring rain. The night before Alumni helped serve drinks and food to the organizations preparing floats for the homecoming game.





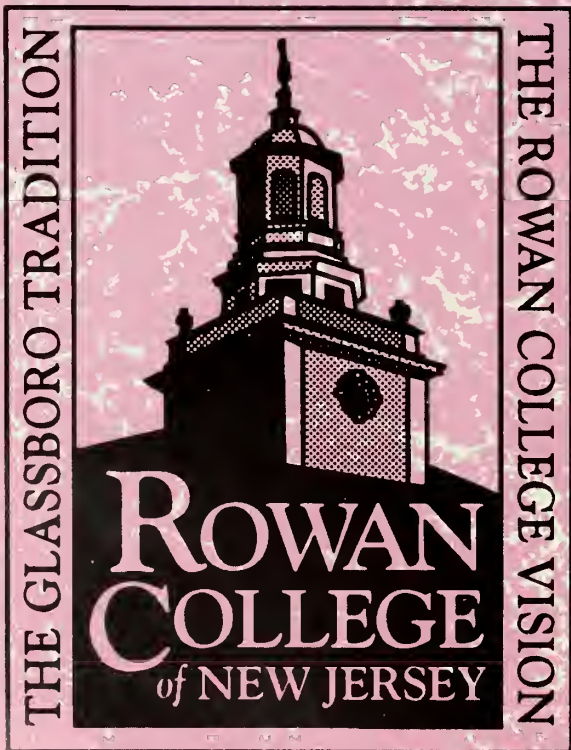

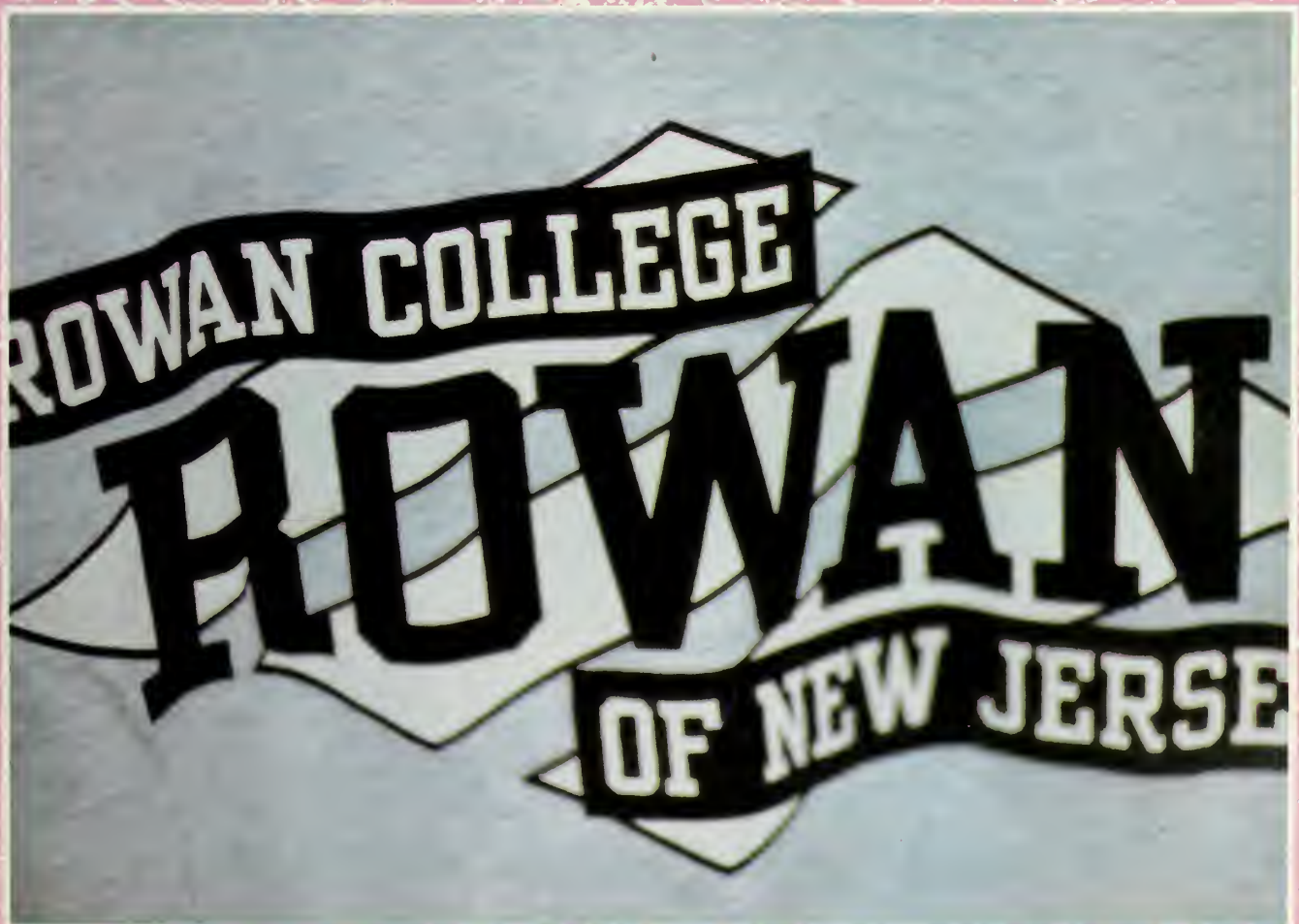
CHANGES





On July 6, 1992, Mr. and Mrs. Henry M. Rowan of Rancocas, New Jersey, presented Glassboro State College with a gift of \$100 million, the largest sum ever given to a public college or university. In recognition of this gift, Glassboro State College changed its name on September 1, 1993 to Rowan College of New Jersey. The endowment will be used to establish a school of engineering; to create visiting professorships; and to establish a scholarship fund for children of Inductotherm employees. Inductotherm Industries Inc. is Mr. Rowan's company.

The tradition of changing an institution's name in honor of a major donor is as old as higher education in America. Cambridge College, founded in 1636, changed its name to Harvard College in 1639 to honor John Harvard for bequeathing his library and half of his estate to the college. Glassboro State College began as Glassboro Normal School in 1923 and became the New Jersey State Teachers College at Glassboro in 1937. In 1958, the school's name was changed to Glassboro State College. Now, the name of this institution is Rowan State College of New Jersey.

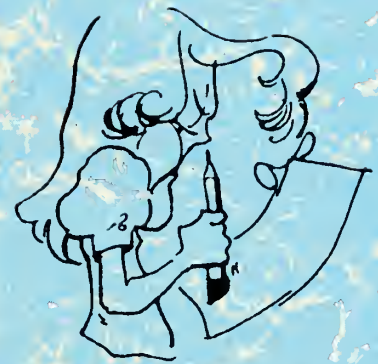

Rowan College offers a variety of courses. From academic to dance, students listen and work intently or they check out what a friend does in the next row.







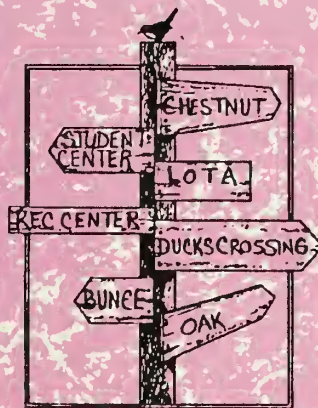

Fisher was named to the Football Gazette All-American First team. He was also named to the Champions Division III All-American second team and the NJAC first team.

Fornicola was selected to the Football Gazette All-American third team. He also made the Champion All-American second team, the NJAC All-Conference first team and the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) NY/NJ Metro All-Star Team.

Hesson was named to the Football Gazette All-American third team and the Champion All-American third team. He was voted to the NJAC and the ECAC NY/NJ Metro Player of the Year and chosen to the ECAC All-Star and NJAC All-Conference teams.

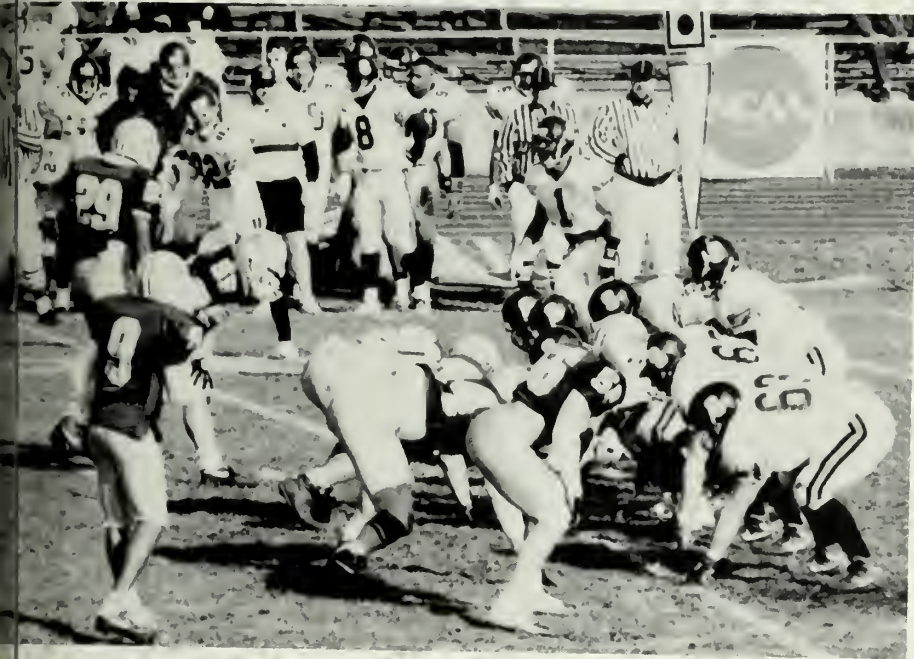

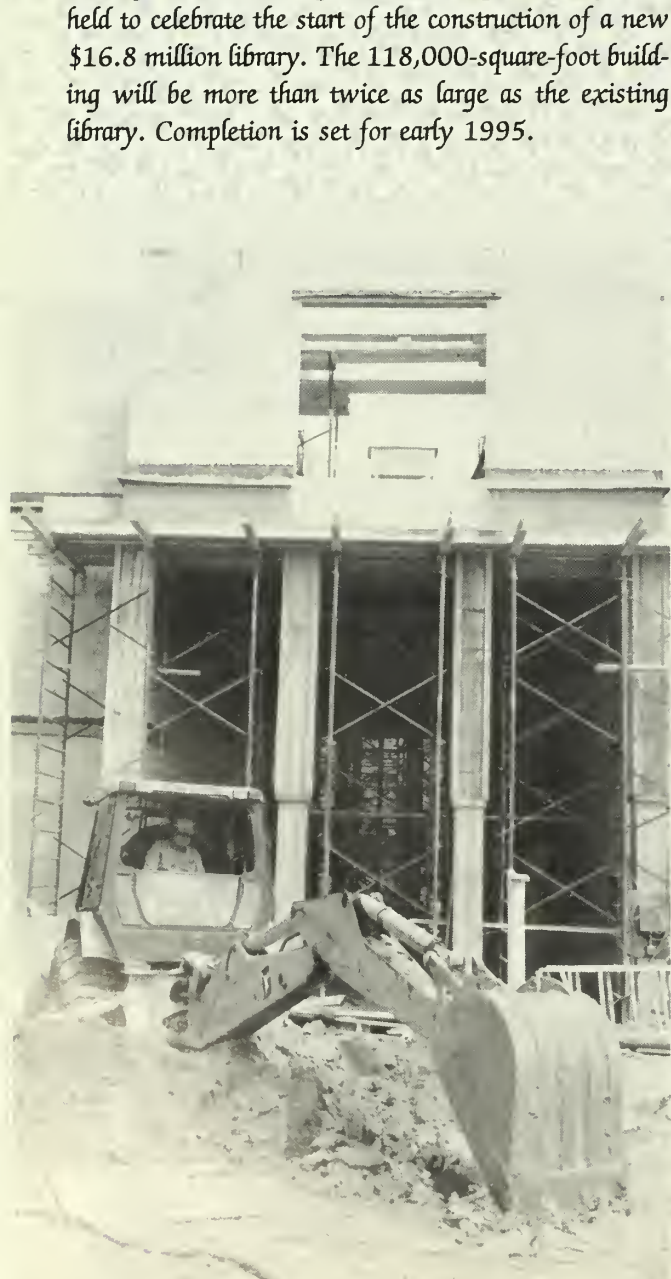


Because of the civil war in Bosnia, as many as 200,000 people were dead or missing. The war began when Serbs rebelled over a vote by republic's Muslims and Croats to secede from Serb-ruled Yugoslavia and form two separate governments. The 27th annual "Project Santa" week sponsored by the Student Government Association was held from Nov. 29 to Dec. 4. Proceeds from this year's Project Santa benefitted the Cerebral Palsy Center in Hurffville, N.J., a private, non-profit educational facility for children ages 3-15 with orthopedic and mental disabilities. Fundraising included a holiday dinner along with a tree lighting ceremony on Nov. 29; a spaghetti dinner at the Newman Center and an indoor carnival on Nov. 30; a flea market, education workshops, and a movie on the Nov. 29; a celebrity auction and an evening in the Rathskeller in the Student Center Dec. 12; and an "open mic" night followed on Dec. 4. Thirty students worked on the committee to organize all the events while other organizations, fraternities and sororities contributed to the success of the project.

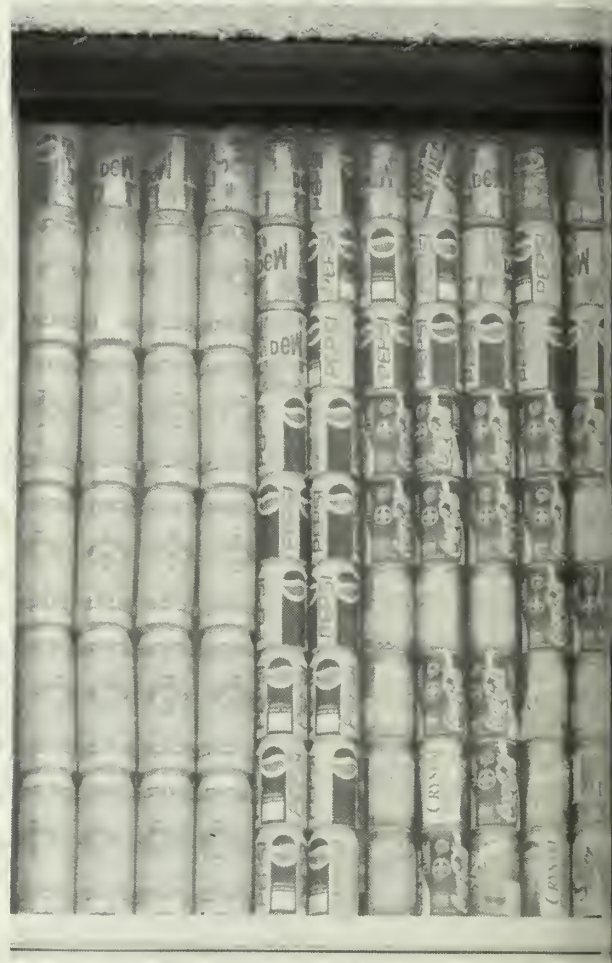

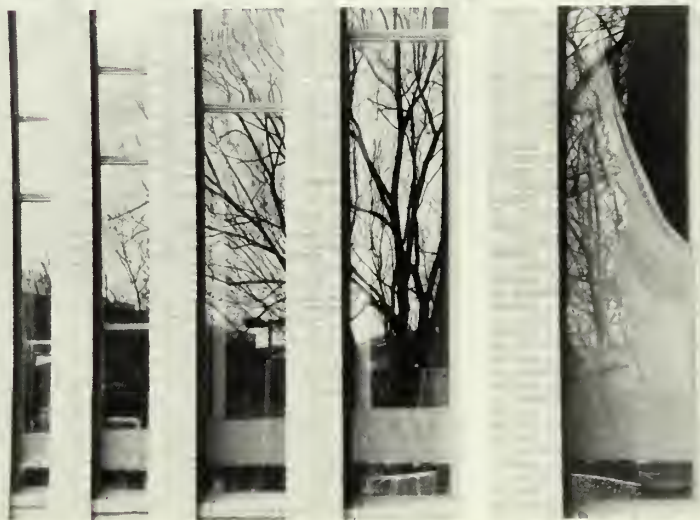

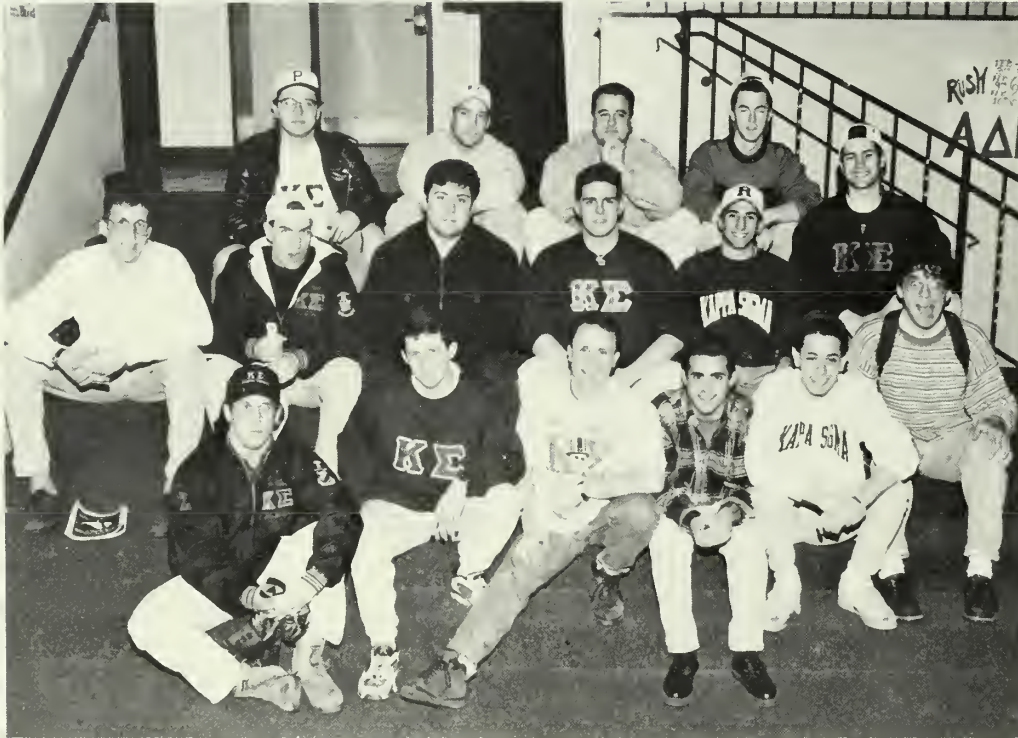

Nancy Kerrigan, the 22-year-old U.S. figure skater who was among the gold medal favorites at the 1994 Winter Olympics, was attacked after practice on January 6, 1994, by a man who hit her on the right leg with a club or metal bar.

The blow severely bruised her knee and quadriceps tendon, an injury that could impede her jumping and landing ability.

Within days, an anonymous phone call to authorities pointed to Kerrigan's rival, Tonya Harding, and a few of her entourage.

Harding's ex-husband, Jeff Gillooly, her bodyguard, Shawn Eckardt, and two hired men were arrested.

The U.S. Figure Skating Association has formed a panel to investigate the case, a first step in the process that could lead to Harding's removal from the team.



The Dallas Cowboys won their second straight National Football League championship and the Buffalo Bills earned a sadder spot in sports history by losing their fourth straight Super Bowl.



Across the Northeast, the Midwest and large parts of the South, the extreme cold of January 1994 brought an end to the daily routine.

Arctic air with wind chills up to 74 below zero swept across the eastern United States in the wake of a blizzard that dumped enough snow to paralyze several states.

At least 92 deaths have been blamed on the barrage of cold and snow. Many of these victims were killed on icy roads or had heart attacks shoveling snow, while others froze to death.

Tens of thousands of homeless people sought protection at shelters, which were filled to capacity in many areas.



Dallas defeated the Bills 30-13 on Sunday, January 30, 1994, scoring 24 unanswered points in the second half after trailing 13-6 at half-time. Emmitt Smith, the game's Most Valuable Player, led the way for Dallas, rushing for 122 yards and scoring two touchdowns. Emmitt Smith, the league's MVP in the regular season, added the Super Bowl MVP award to his collection.



At 4:31 AM on Monday, January 17, 1994, an earthquake of 6.6 magnitude (Richter scale reading) struck Southern California, claiming 61 lives and leaving damage that was total \$30 billion.

Five interstate highways, including the state's major north-south route, and three state highways were closed at several points, crippling transportation.

Broken aqueducts cut off much of the water supply to the San Fernando Valley, the 260-square-mile suburban expanse hit hardest by the quake. Over 500,000 customers were left without power in Los Angeles County.

Streets were empty during nights of the 11PM-7AM curfew. National Guard troops patrolled against looting.

"The days ahead will also be rough for us," Mayor Richard Riordan warned Angelenos, even as he praised them for a cool-headed response to the crisis. "Let's all stick together."



Twenty-six fires that swept Southern California in the Fall of 1993 left four people dead and caused at least \$1 billion in damage.

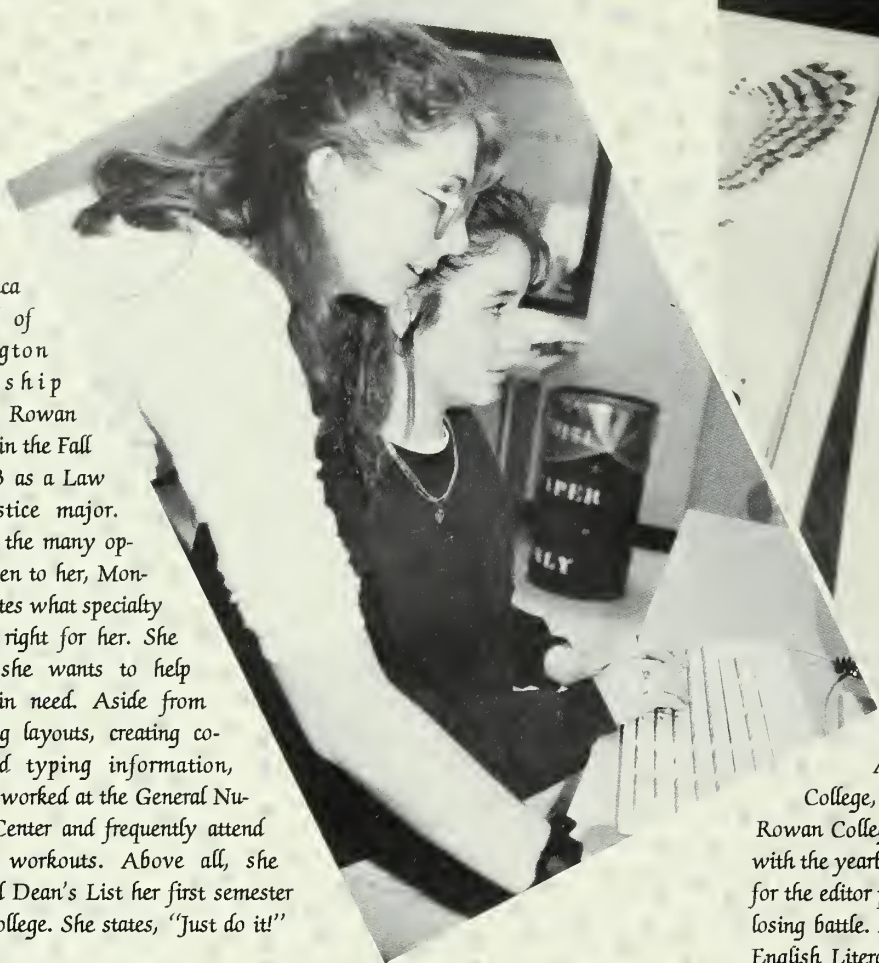
Wildfires destroyed 1,150 homes, burned across 200,000 acres and injured nearly 200 people in Southern California in a matter of weeks. Adding to the horror, authorities said that 19 fires were set by arsonists.

After the discovery of two of the dead, Sgt. Ron Spear said, "If it's an arson fire, then that makes it murder. They were burned by the fire and as far as we know, it was an arson fire."

A \$250,000 reward was posted for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the arsonist.
