This season the Profs came within 14 yards of a trip to the NCAA national championship.

Rowan captured the East Region Championship with an 18-13 victory over Buffalo State.

At home in he semifinal, Rowan dropped a heart breaker to Washington & Jefferson, Pa., 18-13. The Profs drove to the Presidents' 14-yard line but failed to score with a minute remaining in the game.

Coach John Bunting's squad completed the most successful season in history as they won their first East Region title and second straight NJAC Conference Championship. The team finished 12-1 overall and was undefeated in the regular season with a 10-0 mark. It was the first undefeated season for the Profs football team.

It was a record breaking season for the team. The Profs set marks for best record, most wins in a season and most consecutive wins in a season. The team's 333 points broke the old school record of 305 points set in 1974. They tied the shutout record of three and scored more points against an opponent in a single game.

Quarterback Ed Hesson became the alltime career passer with 4,950 yards. He recorded more touchdown passes, 21, and a career, 48.

Wide receiver Kirby Johnson set a record for the most receiving touchdowns in a season, 40.

Halfback Calvin Easley set the mark for most points scored ij a game with 24.

Kicker Gaetan Leone scored the most points in a season, 55. Steve Anderson had the most punt returns with 27. He was named the ECAC Metro NY/NJ Rookie of the Year.

















The soccer team made its 13th appearance in the NCAA Championship
Tournament. The Profs ranked fourth in the final Division III poll and finished the year with a 15-3-3 record. Rowan won its ninth NJAC title with an 8-0-1 mark.

In the NCAA Metro Regional at Rowan College, the Profs were seeded first and lost to fourth seed Trenton State, 1-0, in the first round.

Forward Scott Leacott was the scoring leader with 18 goals and eight assists for 44 points. Second in scoring was Brian St. Leger with nine goals and four assists. Mat Santoro had three goals and created scoring opportunities with 133 cornerkicks.

In 16 starts, goalie Michael Oehlmann compiled a 92.4 save percentage and 0.4 goals against average.

Anthony Cristaudo started every game at sweeper and was a key addition to the Profs strong defense. The Profs had 11 shutouts and outscored their opponents 56-12.

This season Rowan College retired former player Andy Logar's uniform. Logar, a three year captain, is the first athlete at the college to have his jersey retired for athletic achievement.

The Profs dominated the conference with six players named to the All-Conference team.













At the beginning of the season, Coach Bill Fritz had two goals for the men's and women's cross country teams: win the conference and qualify for the NCAAs. The teams did just that.

The men's cross country team captured its 18th NJAC title. They also won the NCAA Mid-East Regional to advance to the NCAA Championships, where the men finished 11th.

The team never let up during the season, winning the Wagner, Hunter and Allentown Invitationals, the CTC Championships and taking second at the New Jersey Colleges Championships.

Several Profs won NCAA Mid-East Coaches Association honors and Rob Black was named to the first-team NCAA All-Mideast All-Frosh team.

The women's cross country team had its best season ever. The women captured their first NJAC Championship and took third at the NCAA Mid-East Regional.

Sharon Sittineri was the individual champion at the NJAC Championships, running a record setting 17:55. Sittineri was also the CTC individual champion.

The Profs had impressive finishes all season long. At the Wagner Invitational, Sittineri placed second and Missy McNally placed third to claim a Profs first place finish overall.

The team took second at the Hunter Invitational and the NJAIAW Championships. At Hunter, the Profs tied for second. McNally came in first and Sittineri second.

Sittineri, McNally and Antoinette Elton received NCAA All-Mideast Coaches Association honors. Sittineri and McNally received first-team honors from the National Coaches Association. Elton and Suzanne Mergner were named to the first-team NCAA All-Mideast All-Frosh team.























The field hockey team received its first bid to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship Tournament since 1986. The field hockey team finished with a 13-5-1 overall record.

In the first game of the NCAA tournament, the Profs defeated Lebanon Valley, 1-0, in two overtimes. Forward Liz Garrett recorded the game winner unassisted. Trenton State won the second round game against Rowan, 1-0, in overtime.

Forward June Cioffi was the team's scoring leader with 10 goals and four assists. Midfield Colleen Smith was the assist leader with nine points and was second overall with 12 points.

Goalkeeper Connie Cumberland, New Jersey Athletic Conference (NJAC) Goalkeeper of the Year, had a save percentage of 91.6 during the regular season. She had 163 saves and allowed only 15 goals for a goals against average of 0.9

Rowan placed seven players on the NJAC All-Conference team.

















The women's tennis team suffered through a harsh season of losses and concellations. The team had five matches are celed due to the weather and ended with 0-7 record, 0-2 in the NJAC.

The team had a coaching change miseason and will try to use this year to rebuild the tennis program.

Sue Johnson was the only Prof to conpete in postseason play.

It was Coach Dawn Bunting's eighth season at the helm. In eight seasons she carries a 122-82 record.

Number one seed Rowan defeated number four seed Montclair, 66-54, in the first round of the NJAC Championships. The Profs lost to William Paterson in the finals, 73-70.


The team was ranked fourth in the NCAA Division III Atlantic Region final poll and hosted the first round of the NCAA Championships. It was the school's third appearance in postseason play.

The Profs had tremendous talent on the team this year and all the players contributed to the team's success.

Dominating the court this season was scoring leader Debbie Filipek. She led the Profs with 467 points and 229 rebounds. Filipek's career high came this season against Kean when she totaled 32 points.

Captain Nan Hambrose spurred the defense with eight blocks. She tallied 116 rebounds and 33 for 53 from the line. Ronalda Smitherman contributed 241 points this season. She was the assist leader with 122 and totaled 68 steals. Steal leader was Marcy Darmstadter with 78.

If you didn't see the men's basketball team in action this season, you missed some good hoops.

The men ended the regular season with a 23-1 record, 17-1 in the conference. Their only loss came against Trenton State. Prior to that game, the Profs were on a 20 game win streak, the longest in the nation among Division I, II and III schools. It was Rowan's third consecutive 20 win season. They broke the school record for most wins in a season, which they tied last year with 21.

Number one seed Rowan claimed its eighth NJAC title when they defeated three seed Kean 63-54 in the championship game.

Rowan was seeded first in the Atlantic Region in the NCAA Division III final poll. This was the school's fifth tournament appearance.

During the season, the Profs won the Stockton Tipoff Tournament and the LaSolla Classic at UC San Diego.

Scoring leader Keith Wood was named the NJ Colleges Basketball Coaches Association Division III Player of the Week in January.

Michael Burden was rebound leader with 206 rebounds, 7.9 a game.

Co-captain Paul Wiedeman was the assist leader with 109 points. He recorded 76 steals, too.

Adrian Matthew, Omar Foote and Lonnie McCoy added tot he nucleus of the team. Matthew was 32 for 40 from the line. Foote tallied 41 steals and was 7 for 10 from the three point range.













The talented women's swim team finished the regular season with a 9-1 record, 5-0 in the New Jersey Athletic Conference (NJAC).

The Profs won the conference title in a home meet against rival Trenton State. Prior to the meet, the teams were tied for first place. This was the third consecutive year that the Profs won the title in a victory over Trenton.

Rowan took first at the East/West meet in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. The team finished first out of 16 teams at the Metropolitan Conference Championship (Met). It was the third straight title for the team.

The team swam 17 season best times at the meet, breaking three Met records.

Diver Cindy Crane contributed to the teams' success through the season. At the Met, Crane scored her season best in the three meter and one meter dives.

The men's swim team finished an undefeated regular season with a record of 11-0 and 4-0 in the NJAC.

One of the great victories was beating Trenton State 119-118 for the conference championship title. At the Met, the Profs placed second behind Division II Rider College. Several school records and a NCAA time were set at the Met by the Profs.















The lacrosse team finished their 1992 season with a 7-8 record.

The record does not speak for the achievements of the players. Colleen Smith led the team in points with 23 goals and 18 assists for 41 points. Close behind her was Karen Dilmore with 21 goals and 19 assists for 40 points.

Defender Sue Conner received All-American honors. She was a second team selection to the Brine National All-America team and was chosen to the Northeast A Regional All-America team.

Receiving Regional All-America honors were attack Sandy Duda and defender Crystal Housh. Duda was the team's scoring leader with 25 goals and nine assists for 34 points.

Tri-captain Denise Malta received Regional All-American honorable mention.

Controlling the defense for the Profs was goalie Laureen Goncey. She had a 62.4 save percentage and 7.4 goals against average.











































An apology
















These are a few of the student organizations of Rowan College of New Jersey.
