

On Thursday, Nov. 8 the Parkland Theatre will Program be presenting the opening night production of The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940 by John Bishop, located in the Harold and Jean Miner Theatre at 7:30 p.m. Following the show, director Mathew Green and his cast and crew will host a "talkback," and answer any questions that the audience might have about the show.

Mathew Green. the director of this production, has high hopes for the play. The Musical Comedy Murders of 1940 will be the second production that Green has directed here at Parkland; Green's first experience as a Parkland director was for The Crucible. Green is also a member of Urbana's Station Theatre, where he has directed 12 different shows over a 15-year time period.

"My favorite part of the show has been working with the cast," Green said. "We have a tremendous amount of fun every night – sometimes making each other laugh a bit too much." There are 11 cast members in the show, who have spent almost five weeks preparing for opening night. The cast of this show includes Karen Hughes as Helsa Wenzel, Chelsea Collier as Elsa Von Grossenkneuten. There isn't much of a larger message beyond 'enjoy vourself.' Parkland's theatre season, this year, is focusing on comedy and fun, and this show certainly delivers that."





Parkland Soccer Team Suffers Defeat in Semifinals

Both men's and women's basketball had their season openers last Friday.

Each team is nationally ranked in the preseason poll. The women's team is ranked 18th while the men's team is ranked 15th. However, the men's team only has three players returning from last year's team. The women have a little bit of an advantage with five returning players. Either way, new and returning players of both teams are looking to live up to their preseason rank.

The women's team fell a little short in their season opener against Moraine Valley losing 74-80. Both teams were pretty evenly matched from the start leaving it to a battle of wills. The Cobras started out strong in the first half. They tied the game in the first quarter with 18 points then took the lead in the second quarter to make the score 36-39 at halftime. However, this lead did not hold as the Cobras were outscored by 10 points in the third quarter. The Cobras did their best to make a comeback in the final quarter, but it was not enough and they lost by only six points with a final score of 74-80. Sophomores Micah Tapscott and Olivia Babcock led the team in points with Tapscott scoring 14 and Babcock scoring 11.

The men's team had better luck in their season opener against North Arkansas winning 100-71. The Cobras started out strong and finished the game that way. Parkland got the first lead and never gave it up. Charles Campbell Jr. led the team with an impressive 19 points. Bruno Williams Jr. was not far behind with 16 points, while Ty'Ohn Trimble had 14 and Yakeema

The women's team had another tough game the following day, Saturday the 3rd, against Southeastern Iowa. Both teams fought for the lead back and forth for all four quarters. With only a couple minutes left in the final quarter and a ten point lead, it seemed that Parkland had this one in the bag-- that is until Southeastern began to make their comeback. With a second left on the clock, down by three points, the Blackhawks sunk a three pointer for the buzzer beater tie 60-60. However, the Cobras did not let this discourage them. They played hard in the five minute

overtime to get the well deserved win with a final score of 71-70.

The men's team got another win against Arkansas State Mid-South on Saturday as well. The final score for that game was 78-73. This gives the #15 nationally ranked Cobras a great start on the season for a 2-0 record so far. In regards to the team, head Coach Anthony Figueroa said "[I am] excited to see how we can grow throughout the season"--as are their fans. The Cobras will play their first home game versus Indiana Elite Prep on Nov. 20 at 7:00pm. Figueroa said him and the team are "Looking forward to our first

Nunamaker, Sasaki Named Parkland Athletes of the Month

CHAMPAIGN, III. – Parkland College Athletics named volleyball player Shelby Nunamaker and men's soccer player Yu Sasaki its October Athletes of the Month on Monday afternoon. Nunamaker, a redshirt sophomore middle blocker, and Sasaki, a freshman forward, each led their respective ranked teams into the playoffs this fall.

Playing alongside a freshmenladen team, Nunamaker helped lead and mentor the No. 2 Cobras to a 53-2 record and its 11th straight NJCAA Nationals appearance. Currently owning a 19-match winning streak, the Cobras have benefited from Nunamaker's impact on both offense and defense. On offense, Nunamaker has been one of the nation's most efficient attackers, ranking 15th with a hitting percentage of .362. Defensively, the Effingham, III., native owns the sixth most block assists (137) in Division II, the eighth most total blocks (158), while her 1.20 blocks per set sit 24th

"Shelby is the heart and soul of our team," explained head volleyball coach Cliff Hastings. "As our captain, she takes on the additional roles of leader, primary communicator and sometimes therapist. She has high expectations of herself and her teammates, but she is also one of the kindest and most thoughtful human beings I've had the opportunity to coach. On the court, however, she is feared by opponents as she's relentless and finds a way to score points both offensively and defensively. Her athleticism coupled with knowledge of the game make

her one of the best middles in the game this season."

Sasaki, a first-year Cobra from Aomori, Japan, led Parkland to an 11-2-2 overall record and a trip to the Region 24 Semifinal round. A team that featured numerous freshmen on its roster, Sasaki stood out with a team-high 30 points on the season that ranks 31st in Division I. Of the 30 points, 20 of them came from 10 goals this season which

tied with classmate Naoto Uede for tops on the team. Highlighting Sasaki's October was a goal against Southwestern Illinois in the regular season finale that helped to clinch home field advantage for the Region 24 Quarterfinal match. The Cobras were ranked as high as No. 11 during the season with its best win coming over No. 7 St. Louis.

"Yu has been a great leader by example," said head men's soccer

coach Mark Sikora. "He is one of the hardest working players in training and on the field. His best attribute has been to always push to be better, whether that be staying after team practice to work on his craft or absorbing as much of his teammater."
