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Mr. DE LANO, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany bill H. R. 3543.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 3543) granting a pension to John Green Reed, have considered the same, and report as follows:

The claimant served in Capt. John Bay's Company of Illinois Volunteers, Black Hawk war, from June 16, 1832, to August 12, 1832. He asks a pension at \$20 per month, declaring that he is now in his eighty-first year, and in reduced circumstances, and he asks that the relief prayed for may be granted in order that he may be placed above want for the remaining days of his life. His petition is signed by thirty-seven citizens of Sheffield, Ill., where he (claimant) resides.

Your committee believe this to be a proper case for relief by special act, and the passage of the bill is therefore recommended.
