Research Idea: Analyze Discovery Channel's show Manhunt Unabomber for evidence of a change in modern opinion regarding Ted Kaczynski's actions

Method: A rhetorical dramatistic analysis, which looks at real-life rule-breaking actions as if they were occurring in a drama. This method's main tool is called the pentad, which lists the components of a rule-breaking action. Examples of this are shown for Kaczynski and Fitzgerald.

Findings: My research found that the series's lead detective character, Fitz, served as a subtle example of Kaczynski's controversial, rebellious ideas successfully being put into practice, while Kaczynski served as a more obvious negative model.

Relevance: Today's world revolves around technology, and could benefit from a modern, unbiased look at Kaczynski's beliefs.
