# UNH To Host Non-lethal Technology Symposium

DURHAM, N.H. – The University of New Hampshire will host the second annual Non-lethal Technology and Academic Research (NTAR) Symposium Nov. 15 - 17 at the Sheraton Harborside Hotel in Portsmouth. The symposium is cosponsored by the Joint Non-Lethal Weapons Directorate of the U.S. Department of Defense and The National Institute of Justice of the Department of Justice.

A multidisciplinary conference, NTAR brings together researchers from government, industry and academia to exchange ideas and knowledge in the hope of identifying new areas for non-lethal technological research for both military and law enforcement applications.

"UNH has been an active participant in non-lethal technology development for a little over two years now," says Donald Sundberg, vice president for research and public service. "Our faculty and postgraduates are attracted to the technical challenges of providing new, life-conserving, environmentally friendly and fiscally responsible options to those on the front lines in conflict management. Non-lethal weapons introduce a new development in conflict management, opening important new avenues for research."

UNH is actively seeking to expand the field of non-lethal research and welcomes applications to present papers. The deadline for abstracts is Sept. 1.
