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GRANITE STATERS SKEPTICAL TAX LAW WILL BENEFIT THEM; CITE HEALTH AS MOST IMPORTANT PROBLEM FOR FAMILY

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
DURHAM, NH – New Hampshire residents are divided in their opinion of the recently passed tax law. Despite some predictions that most Americans will see at least a short-term reduction in the taxes they pay, only one-third believe their taxes will decrease or that they will be better off. Republicans are far more likely than Democrats and Independents to favor the tax law and believe they will be better off and see their taxes decrease. When asked about the most important problem facing themselves and their family, respondents most frequently mention health/healthcare or income/finances.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and sixty-six (566) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between February 10 and February 21, 2018. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.1 percent.

Recent Tax Legislation

Last December, Congress passed and President Trump signed legislation intended to reduce taxes for many individuals and businesses. New Hampshire residents are somewhat aware of the law: 21% percent say they have heard a great deal about the new tax law, 36% have heard a fair amount, 29% have heard only a little, 13% have heard nothing at all, and less than 1% don't know or are unsure. Republicans (63%) and Democrats (58%) are more likely than Independents (40%) to say they have heard a great deal or a fair amount.

In November 2017, when the legislation was still being formulated and debated, 18% reported hearing a great deal about the debate on it while 20% reported having heard nothing at all about it.




How Much Heard About Tax Legislation Passed by Congress and Signed by President in December

Opinion on the recent tax law is divided among Granite Staters who have heard at least a little about it (N=489). Thirty-four percent say they strongly (22%) or somewhat (11%) favor it, 36% strongly (27%) or somewhat (9%) oppose it, 17% are neutral, and 13% don't know or are unsure. There is a very large partisan divide in support for the tax law. Nearly two-thirds of Democrats (65%) oppose the law, seven in ten Republicans (70%) favor it, and Independents are split nearly evenly (29% in favor, 34% opposed). In November 2017, when the details of the legislation were still being decided upon, 39% said they were in favor of the plan while 43% opposed it.

Conservative talk radio listeners, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, self-described conservatives, those who attend religious services once a week or more often, and men are more likely than others to favor this tax legislation. Self-described liberals, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, *Boston Globe* readers, NHPR listeners, those who never attend religious services, and those who have completed postgraduate work are more likely than others to oppose it.




Support or Oppose Recent Tax Legislation

Expected Impact of Tax Plan

Thirty-four percent of Granite Staters believe their family will be better off under the new tax law, 33% think it will not make much of a difference, 23% think they will be worse off, and 9% don't know or are not sure. Republicans (57%) are far more likely than Independents (26%) or Democrats (18%) to think their family will be better off under the new tax law.


Conservative talk radio listeners, self-described conservatives, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, and those who attend religious services once a week or more often are more likely than others to think themselves and their family will be better off under the new tax law. Those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016 and self-described liberals are more likely to say they will be worse off.



Believe Yourself and Family Better or Worse Off Under Tax Plan

Non-partisan tax experts predict that as a result of the recent tax legislation, most Americans will see at least a short-term decrease in the amount of taxes they pay. However, only one-third (33%) of New Hampshire residents believe their taxes will decrease due to the legislation. Thirty-five percent believe the amount of taxes they pay will stay the same, 26% believe their taxes will increase, and 6% don't know or are unsure. Republicans (47%) are far more likely than Democrats (25%) or Independents (20%) to believe their taxes will decrease will decrease, but even among Republicans only a plurality believe this will be the case.

Conservative talk radio listeners, self-described conservatives, and those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016 are more likely than others to believe the amount of taxes they will be pay will decrease under the new tax law. Self-described liberals and those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016 are more likely to say they their taxes will increase.




Believe Amount You Pay in Taxes Will Increase, Decrease, or Stay the Same

When asked about the most important problem facing themselves and their family, a quarter of Granite Staters mention health or healthcare (24%), 15% mention income or finances, and 8% each mention taxes or the economy. Fewer respondents mention the status of the country or government (4%), education costs or loans (4%), the cost of living or housing (4%), aging or retirement (3%), job availability or security (3%), or safety or security (3%). Fourteen percent mention something else as their most important problem, 7% say they have no problems, and 3% don't know or are unsure.

In a Granite State Poll earlier this month, when asked for the most important problem facing the state, more than half of respondents cited the drug crisis, but few mention it as the most important problem facing themselves or their family.

Conservative talk radio listeners, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, and self-identified Republicans are more likely than others to cite taxes as the most important problem facing their family.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and sixty-six (566) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between February 10 and February 21, 2018. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.1 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.2%.

The random sample used in the Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers. When a landline number is reached, the interviewer randomly selects a member of the household by asking to speak with the adult currently living in the household who has had the most recent birthday. This selection process ensures that every adult (18 years of age or older) in the household has an equal chance of being included in the survey.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
