#### NH CONGRESSIONAL INCUMBENTS - LIKELY REELECTION

DURHAM, NH – Republican Congressmen Charlie Bass and Jeb Bradley and Senator Judd Gregg are all poised to win reelection in November. All lead their Democratic challengers by wide margins.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The Granite State Poll is sponsored by WMUR-TV, Manchester and the University of New Hampshire. Five hundred seventy-nine (579) randomly selected adults were interviewed by telephone between September 27 and October 3, 2004. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.1 percent. Included in this sample were 538 likely November 2004 voters. The margin of error for the likely voter sub-sample is +/- 4.3 percent. #### **US Senate**

Two-term Republican Senator Judd Gregg holds a commanding lead over his Democratic challenger, Doris "Granny D" Haddock. Haddock, a political activist from Dublin, is best known for her support of campaign finance reform legislation. It was widely believed that Gregg would prevail for a third-term reelection even before Granny D registered as a candidate and her candidacy has made little headway against the incumbent. In the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, 62 percent of likely New Hampshire voters say they would vote for Gregg, 21 percent would vote for Haddock, and 16 percent are undecided.

Gregg receives strong support from most New Hampshire voters, especially from Republicans, conservatives, men, and upper income voters. Granny D's strongest supporters are Democrats and liberals. An indication of the breadth of support for Gregg is that union households prefer him by a 60 percent to 20 percent margin.

### **First Congressional District**

In New Hampshire's First Congressional District, first term Republican Jeb Bradley appears to be on his way to a second term. His Democratic challenger is Justin Nadeau, an attorney from Portsmouth. Currently, 58 percent of First District voters say they will vote for Bradley, only 25 percent prefer Nadeau, and 17 percent are undecided. Support for Nadeau is slightly higher than it was in July while Representative Bradley's numbers are unchanged.

Bradley receives his strongest support from Republicans, conservatives, and men. Nadeau's strongest supporters include Democrats, liberals, and voters with post-graduate educations.

#### **Second Congressional District**

In the Second Congressional District, 5-term Republican Charlie Bass is also well-positioned to hold his seat against Democrat Paul Hodes, an attorney from Concord. Currently, 53 percent of 2<sup>nd</sup> District voters say they will vote for Bass, 28 percent prefer Hodes, and 18 percent are undecided. The race in the 2<sup>nd</sup> District is relatively unchanged since July.

Representative Bass' strongest support comes from Republicans and conservatives. Hodes strongest supporters include Democrats and liberals. Bass is known as a moderate Republican and his political moderation is appealing to political independents who currently favor Bass by a 62 percent to 9 percent margin.

#### **Granite State Poll Methodology**

These findings are based on the most recent Granite State Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from September 27 to October 3 2004. A random sample of 579 New Hampshire adults was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 4.1 percent. Included in this sample were 538 likely November 2004 voters. The margin of error for the likely voter sub-sample is +/- 4.3 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
