#### BUSH APPROVAL RATINGS STILL LOW IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

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DURHAM, NH – New Hampshire residents are largely dissatisfied with the job George W. Bush is doing as president. Approval for Bush's handling of the economy has improved somewhat but he receives poor marks for his handling of foreign affairs, especially Iraq.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. The Granite State Poll is sponsored by the WMUR-TV, Manchester and University of New Hampshire. Five hundred nine (509) randomly selected adults were interviewed by telephone between July 6 and July 20, 2004. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-4.3 percent. #### **Approval Holds**

With less than four months remaining before the November presidential election, President George W. Bush continues to be plagued by poor job approval ratings in New Hampshire. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 46 percent of New Hampshire adults say they approve of the way Bush is handling his job as president, 50 percent disapprove, and 4 percent are neutral. This marks the first time that half of Granite State adults say they disapprove of Bush's performance as President. "Bush's continued low approval ratings make him increasingly vulnerable in New Hampshire, a state that he narrowly won in 2000," said Andrew Smith, Director of the UNH Survey Center.

#### **Economic Approval Rating**

Approval of the job Bush is doing handling the economy has improved, but remains low. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 49 percent of New Hampshire residents say they approve of the job President Bush is doing handling the economy, 47 percent disapprove, and 5 percent are neutral. The percentage who approve of Bush's handling of the economy is up from 43 percent in April. "The US and New Hampshire economies have been growing strongly in the past year and it appears Bush is starting to get some credit for the economic recovery," said Dr. Smith.

#### Foreign Affairs & Iraq

With the economy improving, the greatest challenge facing the Bush administration continues to be the situation in Iraq. New Hampshire adults give Bush low scores for his handling of foreign affairs in general, and Iraq in particular. In the most recent Granite State Poll, only 41 percent of New Hampshire adults say they approve of the way President Bush is handling foreign affairs, 56 percent disapprove, and 3 percent are neutral. In the Spring Granite State Poll, 48 percent approved of Bush's handling of foreign affairs, 48 percent disapproved, and 4 percent were neutral.

Despite the handing of sovereignty to an interim Iraqi government, Granite Staters are more dissatisfied with the Bush administration's handling of Iraq than at any time in the past. When asked if they approved of the way Bush is handling the situation with Iraq, only 42 percent approve, 55 percent disapprove, and 3 percent are neutral. The percentage who approve of the Bush administration's handling of Iraq is down from 49 percent in April.

And for the first time, less than half of New Hampshire residents support having gone to war with Iraq. Currently, only 47 percent of New Hampshire adults support the United States having gone to war with Iraq, 47 percent oppose the U.S. having gone to war, and 6 percent are neutral. Support for the war in Iraq has decreased 12 percentage points since the April Granite State Poll.

#### **Subgroup Analysis**

Bush gets his highest approval ratings from Republicans, conservatives, Protestants, those making more than \$100,000 annually, Protestants, and people who attend church weekly. Democrats, liberals, union households, residents of Western New Hampshire, and those with post-graduate educations have the most unfavorable opinion of Bush.

Republicans and conservatives are the strongest supporters of U.S. involvement in Iraq while Democrats and liberals are most opposed to the war.

#### **Granite State Poll Methodology**

These findings are based on the most recent Granite State Poll conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center from July 6 to July 20, 2004. A random sample of 509 New Hampshire adults was interviewed by telephone. In 95 of 100 cases, the statewide estimates will be accurate to plus or minus 4.3 percent. Included in this sample were 464 likely November voters. The margin of error for the likely voter sub-sample is plus or minus 4.5 percent. Results reported for other subgroups have potential for somewhat larger variation than those for the entire population.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.
