Socially Engaging

Art (SEA):

An “artistic or creative practice that aims to improve conditions in a particular community or in the world at large.”

without a **fire.**”

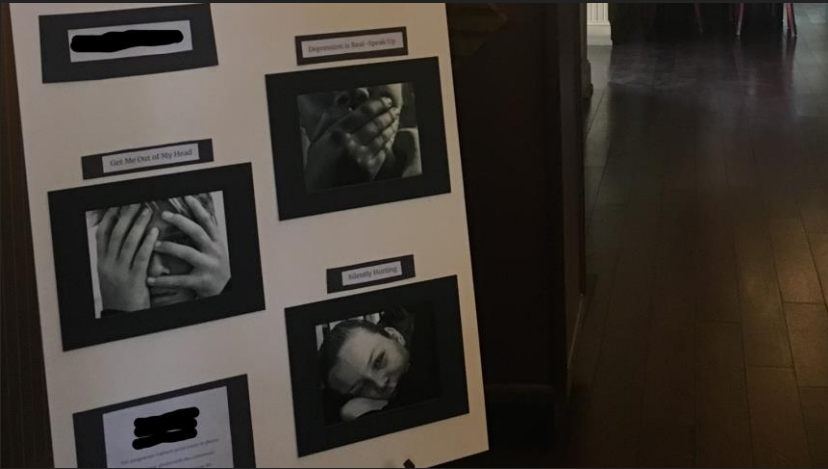

The Problem

Art classes are often thought of as:

- Only a “creative outlet” class.
- Not necessary to provide for every student.
- An easy “A” elective course
- A class that does not teach skills that are transferable to other subjects.

And yet there is research
that **shows art is important.**



Art has transformative power,
the ability to express deeper
thoughts and emotions, and
can give a voice to those who
do not have one.

The Literature

The History of Visual Arts in Public Schools

- Immanuel Kant (1724-1804) believed **art made self governing citizens**
- Pestalozzi created a curriculum based on Kant and Schiller's ideals
- Art Crusaders tried to bring this idea to the U.S. public school

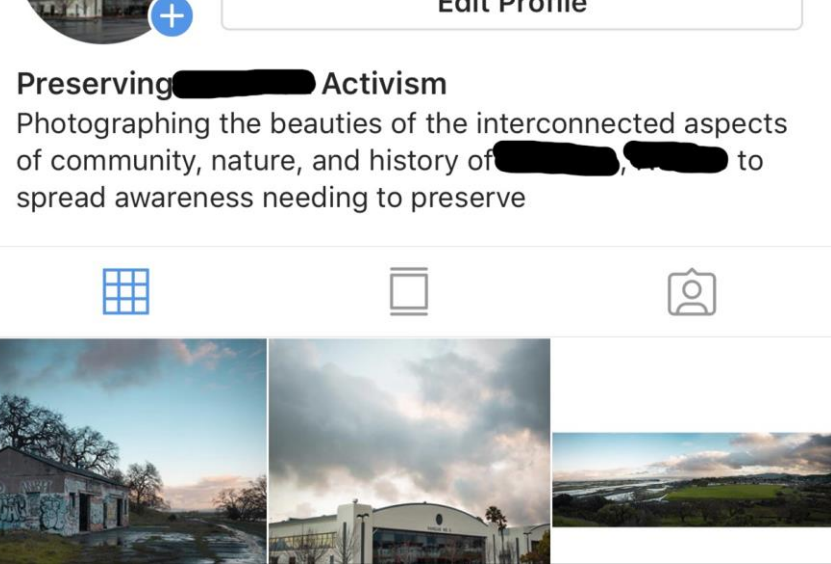
What Art Teaches

- Empathy- a key skill in being a "good citizen"
- Creative-Critical thinking
- Reflection
- Perseverance
- Open-mindedness
- Analyzing and Observing
- Connecting learning to an experience

Art, Ethics, and Civil Society

- SEA projects can teach character education
- Art can have purpose
- SEA projects allow for community connection
- Art can be a grey space in civil space
- Art has a voice for those who need it

There was little research showing **what the students thought** about completing a SEA project.



How does completing a SEA project affect high school students' engagement with a community on topics that the students care about?

Methodology

Mixed Methods Approach

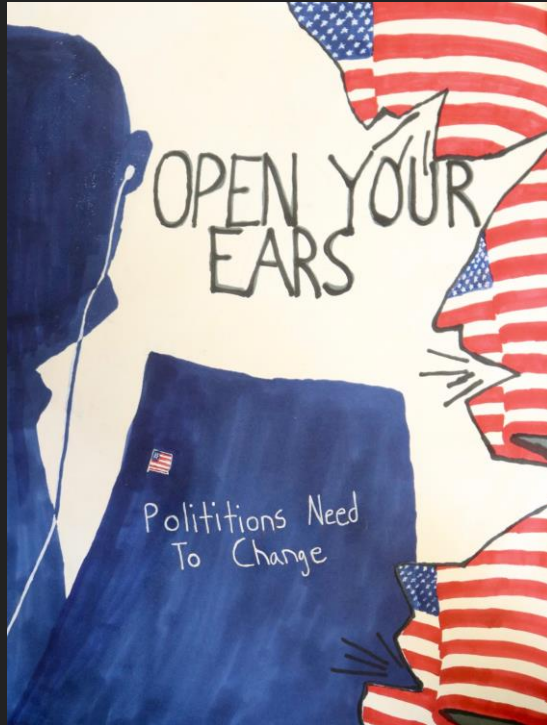
- 1 School Site
- 2 Teachers
- 2 Mediums
- 3 Classes

- 30 Surveys Returned
- 21 Student Interviews
- All 3 classes were a part of a specialty art program

Findings

The Power of Art and Student Voice

- Students found the project to be empowering.
- They discovered their art can have a voice and purpose.
- There was student growth in communication.

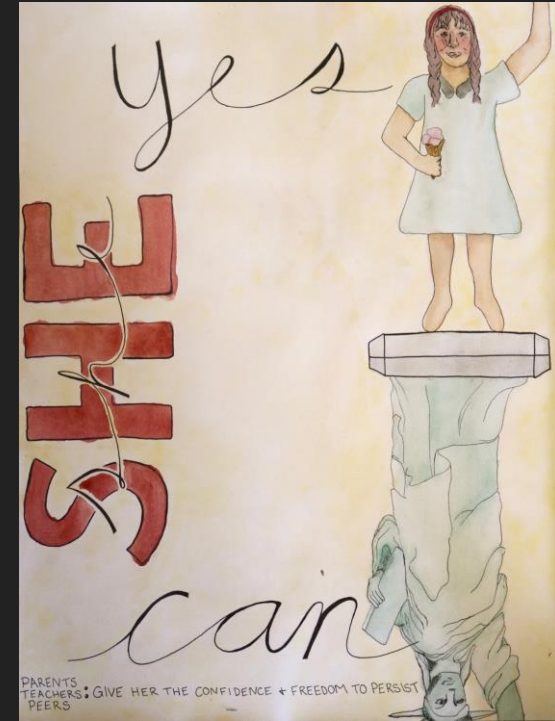


Findings

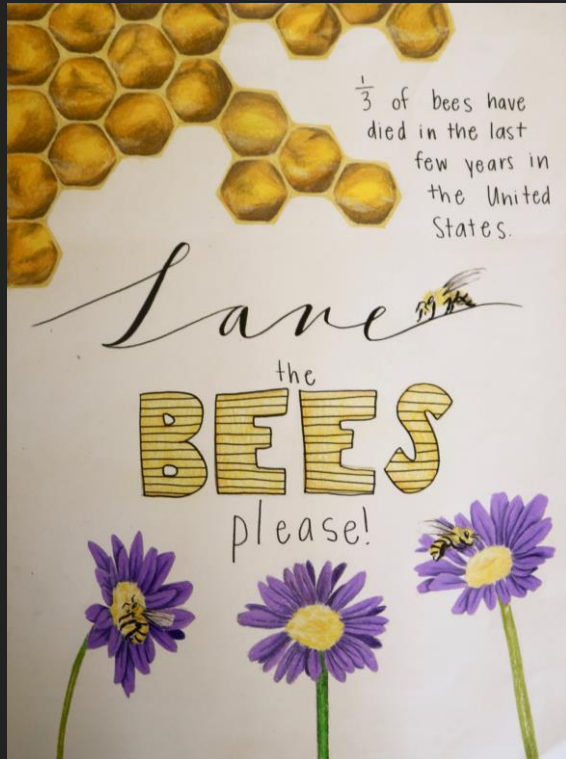


Community Through Art

- Students connected with a community.
- Those who did not reflected on why.
- Students liked the community engagement.
- Students felt art could help them become better citizens.



Findings



External Influences

- The projects were different in each class.
- The teachers taught and held different expectations.
- Both teachers loved the project and the real world aspects.

Implications

- This project was more open than those in the literature.
- Students appreciate the chance to share their views.
- SEA projects can prepare students to be active citizens.
- They also allow for learning critical skills like professional communication.
- More art teachers should try creating a SEA project.
- SEA projects should become a part of CA Art Standards.
