

MEET SHERRI OLLAND

he's traded the sunshine of Virginia for the snowstorms of upstate New York, but Sherri Holland considers it a small price to pay for the chance to work with Syracuse University and its alumni.

As the new executive director of the Office of Alumni Relations, she brings an energetic vision to the job that presages good things for alumni.

"I want there to be more reasons why alumni like returning to Syracuse than just nostalgia," Holland says. "There are so many opportunities here for them."

Holland brings considerable experience from her post as director of alumni affairs at William and Mary College in Williamsburg, Virginia. While leading that program, she was responsible for such events as Homecoming and Reunion, all chapters and clubs, alumni publications, and special-interest activities. Under her leadership, the office won a prestigious national award for best alumni programming in the country from the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE).

After growing up in Newport News, Virginia, Holland did undergraduate work first at Randolph-Macon Woman's College and then at William and Mary. Later she received a master's degree in public administration from Old Dominion University.

During her part-time graduate schooling she worked at a variety of jobs, including managing a children's retail clothing store. "My first son was very well dressed," she laughs. Ultimately she went to work for the parks and recreation division in Newport News, where she did hands-on special events programming. That experience led to a position in alumni affairs at William and Mary, where she worked her way up to heading the office.

"I always wanted to work for my alma mater and was very content there. But you get to a point where you're ready for the next set of opportunities," she explains. "Syracuse offered the chance to take what I'd done at William and Mary and expand it to an alumni population that's more than double in size."


Holland wants to tie alumni programming more closely to academics. "To me that's the ultimate mix of what alumni programming is all about," she says. "At William and Mary we instituted an academic festival on the Friday of Homecoming Weekend that allowed alumni to return to a variety of classrooms and listen to their favorite professors or learn about a new topic. It was immensely popular, and I'd like to see the same kind of program at Syracuse. It will remind alumni what a gem this University is. I'd like there to be an academic component to just about everything we do."

She is excited about the new Goldstein Alumni and Faculty Center. "Then when alumni return to Syracuse, they'll have a place to call home," she says.

Holland brought her two young sons, Marshall, 7, and Spencer, 2, to Syracuse just ahead of January's snowy one-two knock-out punch to the East Coast. But it didn't scare any of them. She says the children are adjusting well and so is she.

"One of the things that attracted me to Syracuse is that it has been ranked among the top 50 universities in the country," she says. "I'm very anxious to meet Syracuse's alumni. If they're anything like the gracious people who greeted me here, it's going to be great."


JAM helps students in their junior year at SU explore career directions and opportunities, according to Chris Weiss, project coordinator. "First we match alumni and students according to their professional interests," he says. "We look for mentors who live in the student's hometown or in the Syracuse area."

Mentors and students can have conversations face to face, during school or during vacations, over the phone, or by e-mail.

"We hope the mentors talk with students about how they got their current positions, what their daily work patterns are like, and the job market in their field or organization," Weiss says. "We certainly don't expect them to provide jobs, merely to give students guidelines for the job search."

The program targets juniors so they can begin networking early with professionals in their fields. Weiss hopes the students will retain the connections through their senior year.



THE WAY IT WAS



SURPRISING SIMILARITIES

It was June 25, 1945. I was a slightly anxious (correction: totally terrified) incoming freshman. A stranger, Ellen, was my assigned roommate.

Last year Ellen Rochlin Godwin and I celebrated the 50th anniversary of an enduring friendship that started that day. How did we note the occasion? We went back to school on an Elderhostel, together again in a dormitory room, with the bathroom down the hall. Frankly, it was an improvement over SU's Waverly Cottage (a private home converted to college residence), where other students walked through our room to get to the bathroom.

During Elderhostel we found similarities in renewed campus life: hiking to the dining hall, dashing between buildings, enjoying sleepy late-night talks, learning new things, going places together, and meeting people from different places and backgrounds. What a wonderful way to commemorate college comradeship!

The anniversary prompted looking back to Syracuse days. At our arrival during World War II, veterans already abounded. Then in August we celebrated victory, chain-dancing through downtown streets. Now even the Cold War is over. Our class, present at the dawn of the nuclear age, currently witnesses the dismantling of these weapons. It is tempting to focus on the myriad changes over time: incredible technological and social upheavals, campus building booms, increased college costs, and student diversity.

Surprise! The way it was, in some ways, is the way it remains. As I remember varsity debating (my favorite extracurricular activity), I am struck by the continued controversy on the national forensic issues we debated then. Consider the 1947 topic: "Resolved: That the federal government should provide a system of complete medical care available to all citizens at public expense."

We also debated federal aid to state-supported schools to equalize educational opportunity, appropriate use of tax funds, and financing pensions. I'm confident Syracuse continues to provide an academic atmosphere in which people can seek solutions to intractable public policy problems. Debating also taught me an invaluable lifelong skill: how to argue both sides of an issue equally convincingly.

Let the record show, I married my debate partner, Harold. Ellen also married a Syracusan and for decades both our families lived in different suburban areas of Washington, D.C., and both had tours overseas.

For me, nostalgia is noting the nexus between past and present and attributing appropriate meaning to these connections. My conclusion? Syracuse was pivotal in preparing me well for my future. Thanks, Syracuse, for my excellent education, college experiences, and for assigning Ellen as my first roommate.

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
