One characteristic all tours share is excellence. From transportation to escorts to accommoda-


tions, SU travelers can count on a first-class experience under the SU flag.

The Ultimate Trip: Around the World

Eighty-four-year-old **Jerry Prigoff '35, G'40** was sorely tempted to try bungee jumping from Skipper's Bungee Bridge in Queenstown, New Zealand, but reluctantly decided against it. Instead, he boarded a helicopter for a breathtaking trip over the scenic volcanic mountains.

While Prigoff may have been the oldest person on the 24-day trip around the world via supersonic Concorde, the Fayetteville, New York, native didn't skip a thing. On his 1995 trip, Prigoff strolled along the Great Wall of China, spent an elegant black-tie evening at the famous Sydney Opera House in Australia, and peeked at a pride of lions in Kenya.

"Perhaps because I taught ancient history, I've always had the desire to see faraway places," Prigoff says. His travels began years ago and intensified after he retired from teaching at the old Fayetteville High School. He and his wife traveled the United

States, later branching out to traverse 25 countries together. She passed away three years ago but Prigoff continues touring.

"In the past few years, I've found more and more people traveling alone, so it's never a problem," Prigoff says. "Our planeload of 96 became family in a very short time."

Prigoff calls his three-day stay in the Masai Mara Game Preserve in Kenya his favorite memory. From a hot-air balloon floating near the treetops, he spied a herd of 1,000 zebras and watched hippos frolicking in a Masai River tributary.

His advice to other would-be around-the-world travelers? "Go now. There will never be a better time."

At SU's Alumni College in the Swiss Alps

Newly retired **Dr. Walter Zukof '50** just can't get enough education. "I never stop trying to learn," he says. "My wife, Helene, and I had never been to Switzerland, and when the Syracuse

brochure arrived about Alumni College in the Alps, we knew it combined all the things we like."

The couple, from Louisville, Kentucky, loved the experience. "Switzerland has always intrigued me," Zukof says. "How did they develop the idea of neutrality? I found out that percentage-wise they are the most armed people in the world. Every citizen serves in the military and they take their guns home. The Swiss have peace with strength."

The Zukofs and other SU travelers were headquartered in Meiringen, a charming rural village in the lush Hasli Valley, about an hour's drive from Lucerne.

"Our mornings were spent in informal seminars about whatever area we were visiting that day," Zukof says. "A knowledgeable guide would tell us about the Swiss government, economy, geography, and history. The subject was our host country."

From their first-class hotel, the group took alpine meadow walks in the mountains, visited museums, saw a glacier, and rode on the Brienz Rothorn Cogwheel train. Travelers had plenty of free time to wander on their own and shop.

"We decided on an SU trip because we wanted to be with people of similar interests and education," he continues. "That's just what we experienced. We had a wonderful time in a very beautiful country and learned quite a bit at the same time."

Adventures in Scandinavia

It seems **Anne Conover Merrell** of Lowville, New York, had always longed to see Scandinavia—her grandmother, after all, was Swedish—but the time never seemed quite right.

"I finally realized that you never know when the opportunity will come around again, and if I were ever going to go, I should do it now," says the 1952 graduate. She invited her daughter, Martha Benedict of Elmira, New York, to accompany her on the 16-day land and sea tour of Finland, Denmark, Norway, and Sweden.

"Copenhagen is beyond belief; you never want to leave," Merrell says. "It retains a great deal of its old world charm, with canals throughout the city." Next the group sailed to Oslo through the North Sea past the stunning fjords, including the 60-mile-long Oslofjord. After Oslo they traveled by motorcoach through the spectacular scenery for which Scandinavia is known: thundering white waterfalls, groves of birch trees, fields of flowers, and craggy mountains.

She is a paralegal with Merrell & Merrell, a firm in which her late husband, **Edgar II G'52**, was a principal. Now she works with her two sons, **Edgar III G'78** and **Charles G'84**, who attended SU's College of Law in their father's footsteps.

"The trip was wonderful," Merrell says. "It's the first time my daughter and I have ever taken a trip alone together and she mothered me. We enjoyed the alumni from other universities and it was all very friendly. It's a wonderful way to travel."

In the Wake of Lewis & Clark

It was a book that first got **Amelia Mele Greiner '39** of Syracuse interested. "I read *Undaunted Courage*, a best-seller about Lewis and Clark's historic journey, and decided I wanted to see it myself," Greiner says.

Greiner retired from a successful career in real estate some years ago, but recently was persuaded to act as interim director of Aurora, a nonprofit group offering services to people with disabilities. She persuaded her housemate,

Ruth Wharton DeHerrera '39, a retired controller of United Way, to accompany her on the trip.

Their cruise started in Portland, Oregon, on the 70-

passenger Sea Lion, and traveled more than 450 miles upstream to the mouth of the Columbia River. The alumni travelers were shepherded by historians and naturalists rather than conventional tour guides. "I was impressed with those experts," Greiner says. "They made us feel their enthusiasm and led us on fascinating side trips."

Along the way they saw some of the most spectacular scenery in the United States. The Columbia and Snake rivers cut through a geologically rich area featuring waterfalls streaming from high basaltic cliffs, and forested valleys that change suddenly to harsh desert canyons. Often tour members zipped ashore in small motorized landing crafts.

They also passed through eight locks, each of them 100 feet deep. "I was awed thinking about Lewis and Clark making this journey by canoe and portage," Greiner says.

A decided plus was the small size of their ship, according to DeHerrera. "Enough people were on board to be interesting but not overwhelming," she says. "There was only one gathering room and one seating for dinner, so you got to know everyone."

Greiner also relished an open train ride through the orchards at the base of Mount Hood. "We stopped at a local grange where people served us coffee and homemade pie. That's a special memory," she says.

Ski Switzerland

When Tamara Farmer's 13th birthday was coming up, her parents, Tara and **Robert Farmer '66** of Canandaigua, New York, tried to think of a special gift. "A trip," they decided. "Let her choose some nice resort for next summer and we'll all go." To their astonishment, their daughter declared, "Switzerland!"





Akira Ohtomo '51 estimates between 500 and 600 alumni live in the country. "If we can locate students from summer language courses, alumni could number more than 1,000," Ohtomo says.

Currently the group is based in Tokyo, but Ohtomo hopes to have meetings in other major cities. Club members are also discussing holding joint meetings with alumni in Korea by alternating locations. "This is an excellent idea and could be expanded to other Asian countries," he says.

Ohtomo explains that in the past, a number of small groups existed with very little contact. "Since 1970, I have worked in my spare time to organize one association." He says the visit of Chancellor Melvin A. Eggers and the football team to the Tokyo Bowl in 1989 provided a real impetus to establish the group.

"The world today is borderless," Ohtomo says. "Most Japanese alumni found their experience at Syracuse very valuable in promoting mutual understanding between our countries. In talking to more than 100 alumni, I discovered an overwhelming number wanted to maintain contact with the



University and be involved in developing SU activities, academic and social."

THE UNSUNG HEROES OF SYRACUSE

I arrived in Syracuse in August of 1988 with a sense of excitement, adventure—and culture shock. I was far away from my native Emerald Isle, a tired and bewildered young Irishman when I landed, bag and baggage, on the steps of the Office of International Services (OIS).

Pat Burak, the director, and program assistant Riet DeKleermaeker welcomed me with open arms into the international student community. Meeting Pat and Riet was a positive experience for someone so very far away from home, and I felt an immediate sense of belonging and connection to this new place.

They took me to the International Living Center (ILC), where I spent two weeks before moving to Vincent apartments. In the ILC, I met Angelo Rivera, then its director, who became a good friend and fellow doctoral student in the international relations program.

Over the next few weeks, the OIS staff went out of its way to make sure every new international student was looked after and fully integrated into the community. In a sense, the OIS became home to more than 3,000 students during this time. A very special relationship developed between the OIS and this energetic young Irishman.

During my six-year stay at Syracuse, I became very involved in OIS activities. For example, staff member Skip Greenblatt and I set up an international soccer match during the 1992 and 1993 fall semesters that brought together both new and old students. Our lively and entertaining game developed new friendships and helped build that shared sense of community within the international student body and the OIS.

Every international alumnus knows what a special place the OIS is during those days spent on the Hill. The OIS becomes family, friend, recreational center, meeting place, cultural institute, and teacher. International students also realize what a special bunch of people the staff of the OIS really is—they're the unsung heroes of Syracuse University.
