Johann Sebastian Bach wrote a total of six unaccompanied sonatas and partitas for the violin in 1720. Bach was employed by Prince Leopold at the time of the sonatas' and partitas' conceptions. His output also included the Brandenburg concertos and the Inventions of Book I for the keyboard at Cothen court.

Rodion Schedrin was a Russian composer who wrote his earlier music in a style resembling Soviet-period Prokofiev. He became popular after using aleatory and serial techniques in the 1960's. He is known for *The Little Humpbacked Horse, Anna Karenina*, his opera, some ballets, symphonies, quartets and piano music.

Nicolo Paganini was an Italian violinist and composer. His virtuostic technique and and daredevil approach to performance influenced successive violinsts such as Vieuxtemps, Ernst and Beriot. He is known for his ingenious technique in left hand pizzicato, double stop harmonics and ricochet bowing.

Johannes Brahms wrote three violin Sonatas (proceeding the Second Symphony) in G Major, A Major and d minor. The three Sonatas were followed by the composition of his violin concerto and the Fourth Symphony. He was a composer of the Romatic era noted for developing his variations throughout all his works.
