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

Instead of focusing on what I was accomplishing with these issues, I began to drown my mind with thoughts of failure and doubt, focusing on unresolved and unfulfilled areas in my life. I waited too long to get the help and guidance that I needed. Within weeks, I found myself lost in a surreal world. I was dealing with my anger, sadness and worry in the wrong ways. I lost touch with my vitality, compassion, and hope for my future. Worst, I kept it all in my head to myself. Then some amazing friends came back into my life, and my walk of faith became more real and meaningful than ever. The vision of a promising life became clearer. It still took a while to get out of bad habits but the more I asked to be shown, the more I was able to find reasoning, worth and hope. I would not have broken the wall I unknowingly built around myself if I didn't allow people to eventually help me break it down. Perfectionism and depression have been issues in my life and sometimes the world and everything in it seems so bleak and meaningless. Sometimes it feels as if God is so far away, even though I know He is always with me. This poem is a letter to God. It has helped my find answers to many of my questions. God began to teach me more about His promises. Through this poem God assures me that He is in control; that my future is in his hands; that I can't mess up His plan. Ultimately, he gives me hope; he is my hope. Life has brought so many adventures to my family lately. From my father suffering major brain damage and moving to a nursing home, to a major car accident on Christmas which has left my mother homebound for months, to a driver ramming & totaling my boyfriend's car -to name a few things - some days have felt like slices of hell for all of us. As we go about surviving this, though, we're thinking a lot, we're talking a lot, praying a lot (you know, prayer becomes a do-or-die thing when life goes down the toilet) - and in some ways, this is getting us back to the things that really matter. All of this junk this season - is going to alter the course of our lives. It's so painful, but it's giving us a sweet opportunity as a family to look at our relationships and our priorities in new ways. Some members of my church and I decided to hold a celebration expressing our love for he—a night devoted to her. As my contribution, I composed this piece. It Wasn't Me This skit reminds me that I can't justify my actions by pointing my finger at someone else and saying they're "worse" than me. My T-Shirt says 'keep.' At the end of last summer, God asked me to give up dancing. I was on a hip-hop dance team at the time, and it was extremely hard, because I felt like I was losing that season of my life. But God had another season in store, and He gave me the vision and the people to form *beNdEd kNeE. *beNdEd kNeE is a Christian dance group at Chapman, committed to inspiring worship within God's people. At first, I chose to choreograph in dance styles other than hip-hop because I didn't want to go back to my old ways. Now, I've realized that though God asked me to change the way I danced, He hasn't changed the gifts He's given me. Hip-hop dance is one of those gifts, and He's allowed me to keep it, as long as I use it for His glory. We never know when the tide will completely change, but when it does, we will readily accept it, for God has already told us: "To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven" (Ecclesiastes 3). In creating this piece, each dancer looked at their lives and explored what it meant when God said there would be a time to be born, a time to reap, a time to heal, a time to dance, a time to embrace, a time to gain, a time to speak and a time to keep. God has been phenomenal at ensuring that each of these concepts of time be lived out by each member of *beNdEd kNeE. Just ask them.
