Scope/ Description of Course	Students will continue their progress in the language mainly through written and reading exercises. The variable parts of speech will be studied/reviewed. Use of simple and compound tenses, as well as of the different moods, distinction of pronoun forms and their function are the main thrust of this class. The class is taught in Spanish.	
Learning Outcomes	At the completion of this course the students should be able to read and write at a near native level. Oral skills will be less stressed (due to the time restraints of the class and the amount of grammar/syntax covered—this skill is developed further in Spanish 3031 which we suggest be taken concurrently with this course).
