<u>COURSE OBJECTIVES:</u> To develop performance, improvisation, section playing, and reading skills in a small ensemble environment.

<u>OVERVIEW:</u> We will rehearse several arrangements for public performances during the course of the semester. Students are encouraged to bring their own original arrangements and creations as well. Performance dates will be announced well in advance so as to avoid scheduling conflicts. From time to time the meetings will function as a master-classes providing an opportunity to discuss a variety of music topics.

REQUIREMENTS: Your instrument and a small amplifier (guitarists only) It is the student's responsibility to learn the music in his/her assigned book in a timely fashion. Any playing difficulties, which cannot be addressed during class-time, should be taken up at one's private studio lesson. Since attendance is crucial to developing a good ensemble sound it is essential to attend all rehearsals. If you have a serious conflict with a scheduled rehearsal, you must notify me in advance and arrange for a suitable substitute. IF YOU MISS ANY PUBLIC PERFORMANCE WITHOUT PRIOR WRITTEN NOTIFICATION, YOU SHOULD EXPECT AN AUTOMATIC FAILURE.
