Student learning outcomes:

The primary objective of this course is to provide a comprehensive introduction to human sexuality. This course will cover a broad range of topics that affect human sexual behavior. At the completion of this course, my hope for each of you is that you:

- 1. Feel more positively about yourself as a sexual human being.
- 2. Can take greater responsibility of your own sexual health.
- 3. Have learned the biological bases of sexuality (i.e., anatomy, hormones, physiology, diseases).
- 4. Are more tolerant and understanding of others who do not share your own sexual behaviors or values.
- 5. Have acquired greater knowledge on human sexuality topics.
- 6. Understand how human sexuality is a social concept that affects our understanding of gender roles, sexual orientation, development, and sexual disorders.
- 7. Have a greater understanding of the legal and ethical issues surrounding sex, sexuality, and policy.

<u>Evaluation</u>: I reserve the right to change the format of the syllabus, quizzes, and/or exam. You are responsible for the entire text and all class material.

- Attendance is mandatory and graded.
- Chapters from the textbook will be assigned each meeting according to the schedule attached.
- Lecture notes will be posted on Moodle at the beginning of the week for the appropriate

- chapter.
- You will be required to read the assigned chapters, review the notes, and do the chapter quizzes and exams.
- Grades will be assigned according to the following convention: A = 90-100%; B = 80-89%, C = 70-79%, D = 60-69%, F = 0-59%. Appeal procedures for attendance, quizzes, and exams are strictly structured, as will be explained in class.

Quizzes (40% of your final grade):

- There will be 1 quiz for each chapter that is worth 20 points each (16 quizzes total). The quiz will be 20 multiple choice questions worth 1 point each.
- Quizzes will be posted under Quizzes and Exams on Moodle.
- The quiz will be become available online after the class at the beginning of the date listed and be open for one week until 9:00 pm on the seventh day. You will have 30 minutes to complete each quiz once you start.

Examinations (40% of your final grade):

• Four exams will be given <u>in class</u> on the listed dates and have 50 questions each. Exams cover four chapters inclusively at a time (ie. Ch. 1-4, 5-8, 9-12, and 13-16). The exams are designed to measure your mastery of the material covered in the last four chapters you cover, motivate you to re-read, and help you remember the material.

Attendance (20% of your final grade):

• Class attendance is compulsory and attendance will be taken at all classes. You must sign the attendance sheet and actually attend. Do not have a friend sign for you or sign and then leave. Please be on time, but <u>please come to class even if you are going to be late!</u> <u>I'd rather that you came to class late than skip it</u>. I use sources besides the textbook, and you will miss valuable and testable information if you do not attend class. Only partial lecture slides will be posted online. You will need to fill in the missing information if you decide not to take detailed notes in-class.

The quizzes and exams can only be written at the times indicated so plan accordingly. There can be no make-up tests or special sessions for any student without formal Disability Accommodations (see below for more information) or valid excuse. Students with valid and documented reasons for missing a test or an assignment must consult the Dean of Studies office for their faculty. If, and only if, there is adequate written justification for missing the test or assignment deadline, such students will have the opportunity to make up the missed assignment or have their grades proportionately re-weighted, increasing the relative contribution to their final exam at the instructors discretion.
