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Conference Presenters



Kevin Kling (Keynote) graduated from Gustavus Adolphus College. He has performed his plays at the Guthrie Theater, Actors Theatre of Louisville, Seattle Rep. The Goodman, Second Stage Theater (Off Broadway). Denver Center Theater, the Jungle, and Frank Theatre. He is the author of Lloyd's Prayer, 7 Dwarfs, The Ice Fishing Play, Mississippi Panorama and Gulliver, A

Swift Journey. Favorite roles include Sean Keogh in The Playboy of the Western World and Peter Quince in A Midsummer's Night Dream at the Guthrie, Hepheastus in Interact Theater's Cloud Cuckooland, Joseph in A Holiday Pageant for Open Eye Figure Theatre. Vladimir in Waiting for Godot and Madman in Diary of a *Madman* at the Jungle Theater. He has hopped freight trains. joined a circus, been to Mardi Gras and eaten things before knowing what they were. He loves Mary Ludington, their dogs, and motorcycles, in that order. His commentaries can be heard on National Public Radio's "All Things Considered" and he is a proud member of the trio Bad Jazz.

Open Eye Figure Theatre (Special Presentation) creates original work with a specialized interest in the puppetry arts. This event features one of their works-either The Elusive It, a traditional trick marionette show presented with comical wordplay, or The Adventures of Juan Bobo, a world turned upside down, inspired by Latin folktales—both of which are part of Open Eye Figure Theatre's "The Driveway Tour." Open Eye co-founders Michael Sommers and Susan Haas will speak about their company following the conference kick-off performance on Thursday.

Porter Anderson is the first Senior Producer with CNN Pipeline. the new breakthrough multi-live-feed broadband initiative of the Time Warner CNN News Group. CNN Pipeline is the only Internet service to offer the user a choice of up to four simultaneous live feeds from wherever in the world news is being reported. Before going to CNN-USA as a News Anchor in 1995, then to CNN International before moving to CNN.com in 1999. Anderson was a theatre critic with The Village Voice in New York, and a theatre and dance critic and reporter with The Dallas Times-Herald. The Dallas Observer. The Tampa Tribune and The Sarasota Herald Tribune. A former Vice President of the International Theatre Critics Association (based in London, Paris and Athens) and past International Chairman of the American Theatre Critics Association, Anderson was commissioned by the Kennedy Center in Washington to write its production notes on the national premiere of Martha Clarke's Vers la flamme in 1999. For Actors Theatre of Louisville, he has delivered addresses on John Steinbeck and Anne Bogart in the Brown-Forman Classics in Context Festival (those speeches are published in 500 Years of Theatre History, Smith & Kraus, 2000). And in March 2006, he gave a talk on theatre, criticism and the new media in Torino at the World Congress of the International Theatre Critics Association as an invited guest of the Premio Europa per il Teatro (the Prize of Europe for Theatre), which was awarded to Harold Pinter.

Special Session: Travel and the Dramatic Imagination

In 2003, the Guthrie Theater received support from the Bush Foundation to send eleven playwrights anywhere they chose to go in the world and then write plays for the Guthrie, and destinations included Liberia, Cambodia, Turkey, and the Palestinian Occupied Territories. After playwrights discuss the dramaturgical challenges of using cultural explorations as inspiration for new plays, the entire group will break into brainstorm sessions for other ways to connect theater to global events, opportunities, and stories.

In contrast to the commercial environment of Broadway, the Guthrie is dedicated to producing the great works of literature, to cultivating artists' talents and nourishing the audience. Joe Dowling, the Theater's Artistic Director since 1995, has led the Guthrie to unprecedented growth; subscriptions have reached an all-time high, and he has led the campaign for the new Guthrie—a national center for theater arts and theater education. The new home of the Guthrie Theater is a 285,000-square foot theater center located in the historic Mills District on the banks of the Mississippi River in downtown Minneapolis. The project includes three theaters, expansive lobbies, rehearsal rooms, classrooms, administrative offices, production and support facilities, restaurants, bars, and parking. The new building replaces the former facility at Vineland Place in Minneapolis.

The Playwrights' Center, one of America's most respected resources for new play development, welcomes LMDA to its 23rd Annual PlayLabs Festival, one of the nation's most prestigious developmental events. After two weeks of rehearsal room dramaturgy with the Twin Cities' finest actors, dramaturgs, and guest directors from across the country, 8 featured playwrights present their scripts-in-progress readings to packed houses at The Playwrights' Center's intimate Waring Jones Theater.
