Program Notes

The White Rose

At a concert by the Sousa Band in York, Pennsylvania, a civic committee requested the composition of this Sousa march. The march was to be used at the York Flower Festival, commemorating "White Rose Day." The white rose is the emblem of the House of York in England, from which the city of York, Pennsylvania took its name. The actual White Rose Day celebration was canceled, owing to priorities of World War I. Nevertheless, Sousa's march was played at a public concert by combined bands and given some measure of publicity in a recording by the Victor Talking Machine Company. It never became popular however. By request, Sousa incorporated several themes from the opera Nittaunis, composed by York banker C.C. Frick.

Examination of the Basis of a Thought

Examination of the Basis of a Thought was composed for the Lawrence University Symphonic Band, conducted by Dr. Matthew Arau. The piece is a reflection on the effect of external events on the way in which we think, feel, and behave. After a murky, nebulous status quo is interrupted by something completely different, the two sound worlds slowly develop towards - and then pass - each other.

Suite Française

In 1945, the publishing firm of Leeds Music commissioned Milhaud to write an extended work for band as part of a proposed series of new works by contemporary composers. The result was *Suite Française*. The composer provided the following notes about the work:

"The five parts of this suite are named after French provinces, the very ones in which the American and Allied armies fought together with the French underground for the liberation of my country — *Normandy*, *Brittany*, *Île-de-France* (of which Paris is the center), *Alsace-Lorraine*, and *Provence*. I used some folk tunes of the provinces. I wanted the young Americans to hear the popular melodies of those parts of France where their fathers and brothers fought."

Suite Française was given its first performance by the Goldman Band in 1945. It was so successful that Milhaud was requested to rescore it for orchestra, in which medium it was first played by the New York Philharmonic.

Machu Picchu: City in the Sky - The Mystery of the Hidden Sun Temple Machu Picchu was commissioned for the thirtieth anniversary concert of the Ensemble Liberte Wind Orchestra, Kawaguchi City, Japan. Machu Picchu is a mountaintop Incan city that was discovered 378 years after the Spanish conquistadors invaded and destroyed Cuzco, the capital of the great sixteenth-century empire that unified most of Andean South America. At the central high point of the city stands its most important shrine, the Intihuatana, or "hitching post of the sun", a column of stone rising from a block of granite the size of a grand piano, where a priest would "tie the sun to the stone" at winter solstice to insure its seasonal return. It is believed that the royal lineage of the empire may have escaped to Machu Picchu during the Spanish invasion.

Yagisawa writes the following about the composition: "After considering these remarkable ideas I wished to musically describe that magnificent citadel and trace some of the mysteries sealed in Machu Picchu's past. Three principal ideas dominate the piece: 1) the shimmering golden city of Cuzco set in the dramatic scenery of the Andes, 2) the destructiveness of violent invasion, and 3) the reemergence of Incan glory as the city in the sky again reached for the sun."
