Honors and Awards

March 2015 – Present

Taner Akçam (History/Holocaust and Genocide Studies)

received the *Heroes of Justice and Truth* award during the Armenian Genocide Centennial Commemoration, organized by the Diocese and Prelacy of the Armenian Apostolic Churches of America, in Washington, D.C. on May 9, 2015.

Taner Akçam will receive the 2016 *Friend of the Armenians* award from the Diocese of the Armenian Church of America (Eastern), at a banquet to be held on April 29 in Cleveland, Ohio. This award is given annually to an individual in the public arena who has been a solid advocate of the Armenian-American community.

Taner Akçam received recognition at a Congressional reception in September, 2015 organized by the International Raoul Wallenberg Foundation (IRWF), for a project he supervised on their behalf that involved identifying 180 “unsung heroes” – Turkish and Kurdish rescuers of Armenians during the Genocide of 1915. The reception was attended by the President of the Republic of Armenia, Serzh Sargsyan, leaders of the Armenian community, and two dozen members of Congress.

Taner Akçam presented the keynote address at the 2015 International Hrant Dink Award ceremony in Istanbul, in September. The late Hrant Dink was a prominent Turkish-Armenian journalist renowned for his efforts of reconciliation between Turks and Armenians and his advocacy of human and minority rights in Turkey.

Daniel Balel (V&PA) has been accepted and will join the cast of ImprovBoston Mainstage, 2016.

Michael Boyer (Physics) was awarded the *Edward Hodgkins Junior Faculty Fellowship* for 2015-16, for personifying the Clark ideal of excellence in research and in teaching.

Michael Boyer was awarded the *Larry Fechter '67 and Thomas Macke Stansbury Innovation Fund* in 2016 by Clark's Research Board.

Elli Crocker's (V&PA) art was selected by an art consultant for a six-month display at the corporate offices of Cell Signaling Technology, Beverly and Danvers, MA, September 2015 – March 2016. They also purchased a piece for their permanent collection.

Eric DeMeulenaere (Education) was awarded the 2015 *Ernest A. Lynton Award for the Scholarship of Engagement for Early Career Faculty* by the New England Resource Center for Higher Education, given to a faculty member who connects his or her teaching, research, and service to community engagement.

Gino Dilorio's (V&PA) short play, *Blue Tent*, was selected in 2015 to be produced at Studio 33 as part of the Montage Arts Festival in Beaumont, Texas.

Susan Foster (Biology) was appointed as the next *Jan and Larry Landry University Professor* for a three-year term, 2016-19. The Landry Chair is designated for an academic leader who, by his or her presence on campus, symbolizes the aspirations of the University in higher education.

Emily Isaacson (Director of Choral Activities, V&PA) was awarded third place in *The American Prize in Conducting: School & Community Chorus Division* 2015, citing her versatility, sensitivity and energy. The American Prize is a series of new non-profit national competitions in the performing arts.

Esther Jones (English) has accepted a four-month in-residence American Antiquarian Society Fellowship, funded by the AAS through the National Endowment for the Humanities, for work during 2017 on her book project, "Black Speculation and the African American Literary Tradition."

Ben Korstvedt's (V&PA) edition of Bruckner's Fourth Symphony, led by the British conductor Mark Wigglesworth, was performed with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra in Glasgow on April 16 and 17, 2015. The concert from Glasgow was broadcast live on BBC Radio 3.

Nina Kushner (History) was elected President of the Western Society for French History, in November, 2015 for a one-year term.

James McCarthy (Geography) was selected as Editor of the Nature and Society section of the *Annals of the American Association of Geographers*, for a term 2016-19.

Robin McLean (English) won the national *BOA Short Fiction Prize* for 2015's *Reptile House*, Rochester, N.Y.: BOA Editions.

Meredith Neuman (English) was awarded two fellowships in support of her current book project, "What's the Matter with Early American Poetry?". Valerie Sperling's 2014 book, *Sex, Politics and Putin: Political Legitimacy in Russia* (Oxford University Press) in November, 2015 won the Association for Women in Slavic Studies (AWSS) Heldt Prize for the "Best Book in Slavic/Eastern European/Eurasian Women's Studies."

Andrew Stewart (Psychology), along with a group of international scholars, won the 2015 *Otto Klineberg Intercultural and International Relations Award* from the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues, for the best paper or article of the year on intercultural or international relations, for "International Support for Arab Uprisings: Understanding sympathetic collective action using theories of social identity and social dominance."
