PMA News

Price supports for 1951 Sioux County Farmers along with farmers in the United States will have the advantage of price supports to encourage the production of the needs brought on by the present emergency.

The minimum 1951 support for corn reflects a 7 cent increase from the 1950 average, and is expected to be somewhat higher by Oct. 1st. The 90% of parity level will be in effect again in 1951.

The 1951 Soybean price will be supported at 75% of parity based on a national average of \$2.45 per bushel. State and County figures are not yet available.

Higher Farm Production Needed The main production increase in Iowa and Sioux County centers around corn and farmers are asked to increase their production around 16% over the 1950 figure.

Other counties in the State are reporting a like condition. Livestock numbers must be kept high and in this connection Sioux County farmers are being asked to increase their hog and cattle production by approximately 8%.

To make this contribution to our defense effort will require very careful planning and the use of all conservation measures possible by all farmers. High production may be needed for many years to come.

The completion of Heemstra Hall constitutes the culmination of many years of effort. President Heemstra himself led the campaign for funds for several years. The school shared also in denominational campaigns, and by 1949 a considerable amount—about \$85,000 was in hand.

The building has been in use since September, 1950. It has living accommodations for 80 girls. The dining-room is used by both girls and boys, and has space for 160 students.

It is most fitting that this building should be named Heemstra Hall. Hereby permanent honor is being paid to President and Mrs. Heemstra. Dr. Heemstra has served as president since 1928. He was educated at Northwestern Classical Academy, Hope College, Princeton and Western Theological Seminars.

The name Heemstra Hall serves to recognize also the life of Rev. John F. Heemstra, who was a vigorous and scholarly preacher in the denomination, and served as Principal of Northwestern Classical Academy from 1906 to 1910.

Land Tax Credit Funds Paid Soon

Payments Will be 92.79 percent Maximum Allowed
Agricultural land tax credit refunds will be mailed out in the near future from the county auditor's office to farm owners in school districts having a tax levy of more than 15 mills for the general fund.

the taxes collected above the 15 mill general fund minimum were refunded but this year the returns will be 92.79 percent of the maximum. The amount returned depends on the amount of money the state has on hand for this purpose.

The forty acres considered under the homestead credit exemption do not apply for refunds but all other land in the school districts is eligible. Agricultural land in independent and consolidated districts with a tax levy of more than 15 mills for the general fund has been considered in the auditor's tabulations for refund checks.

Board Proceedings

September 19, 1950
The Board of Supervisors of Sioux County, Iowa, met pursuant to adjournment at 10 o'clock, A. M., Chairman C. H. Sedgwick presiding. Members present were: P. E. De Vries, Jake H. Hop, John H. Dykstra, Ed Moss, and C. H. Sedgwick.

Minutes of September 11th, 1950, were read and on motion and vote stand approved. On motion and vote, the Board purchased a stoker for County Jail from Jansen Plumbing Co. of Alton, Iowa, for \$428.85 this includes old stoker in a trade-in and full installation. Two bids were filed: Groen & Sons and the above.

It appears from the record that in Court Case No. 11828, Fox vs. Silent Sioux, the Court costs which are taxed against the Plaintiff are still unpaid, and that over \$350.00 of this amount is due to Sioux County, Iowa. Therefore, on motion and vote, it is de-

cided that the County Attorney be asked to collect the amount due to Sioux County, Iowa. The Board of Supervisors of Sioux County, Iowa, ordered this account to be collected and to proceed with action at once.

The Bond and Permit of Stanley D. Anderson of McNally, Ia., for a Class "C" Permit was on motion and vote stand approved.

On motion and vote, Mulder and wife were hired as helper at County Home at \$140.00 per month. This includes dwelling at County farm and some other items, starting October 1st, 1950.

On motion and vote the Board purchased two cars of Lumber from Nebraska Bridge Lumber & Supply Co. and one car from Pioneer Lumber Co. and one car from Wheeler Lumber Co.

On motion and vote the Board adjourned to September 26, 1950.
