





In Dedication

THIS CENTENNIAL YEARBOOK IS DEDICATED TO RALPH MOUW, TEACHER OF THE YEAR. IN GRATITUDE FOR HIS FAITHFUL SERVICE TO NORTHWESTERN COLLEGE.



The first annual teacher of the year award, which was presented during the convocation services on Wednesday, April 27 ironically went to the faculty member who has served Northwestern the longest - Dr. Ralph Mouw. Mouw, who has taught mathematics at the college for 36 years, says he has seen Northwestern "become a very strong liberal arts college, one that is concerned with the total individual."

Since being at Northwestern, Mouw has served as professor of mathematics, dean of men, and acting chairman of the Division of Natural Sciences. "I see Northwestern moving more as a distinctively Christian College," Mouw states, explaining that he feels it is the impetus of the college to see that every teaching member of the faculty is a Christian. "Academic quality and Christianity are side by side goals when looking for teachers," he said.

Mouw, who graduated from the Northwestern Academy in 1936 and the Northwestern Junior College in 1938, sees his 36 years of teaching here as a "response to God." In 1944, Mouw was selected to participate in the invasion on the Normandy beaches. "I was totally sure that would be my last day," he recalls. "But it wasn't. The Lord's protecting hand was over me and he's given me many days since then, so, each day I just give over to him." When he returned from the war. Mouw





knew he wanted to teach in Christian higher education, so he went to graduate school and in 1947 was added to Northwestern's faculty.

Mouw has since contributed much to the growth of the school, having served on the steering committee establishing institutional goals and purposes (1972-74), the academic affairs committee, and the committees to install Presidents Grandberg, Rowenhorst, and Radandt.

Mouw does not look at the ways he has helped Northwestern, though; rather, he says he will remember all that this institution has given him. "While I may have contributed something to Northwestern, I feel Northwestern has done much more for my life," he says. "I know of no other place where my life could have been enriched that much."

During his retirement, Mouw hopes to catch up on all his hobbies - gardening, fishing, reading, camping, hiking, and travelling. He and his wife plan to spend the winter months from now on in Florida, and are also planning a European trip.

Mouw is also making plans to keep in touch with Northwestern, claiming that he will really miss the students. "I hope I'll be able to get back and talk to them and visit with them," he says with a smile. "I want to stay young with them!"








Capture The Freddie







The Vicksburg Team

While in Vicksburg, students worked with We Care Community Services, an outreach to poor blacks of the area.

Perhaps the IO days could best be described by saying that cultural barriers were crossed. Days were spent repairing the homes of the poor and elderly while evenings provided time for getting to know host families and getting involved in other ministries of We Care, such as family Bible study. There was time each morning for group feedback on the people they had met and the things they had seen. Those who went came away with a better understanding of poverty, empathy for those who find themselves trapped in the cycle of poverty, and a larger vision of what it means to be a "world Christian". The group gave a lot to the people they came in contact with, but also learned so much from those same people. The project was sponsored by the World Missions Board of NWC.


The Red Raiders made the trip to the NAIA National Playoffs for the fifth time in the school's history to highlight the 1982 football season. Even a bigger highlight was the No. I ranking the Red Raiders received at the season's end. NW was finally beaten, after an undefeated regular season, in the semi-finals of the play-offs by William Jewel. The Red Raiders turned the ball over 9 times in the 23-10 loss.

NW finished the regular season with an II-O record and I2-I overall. Coach Larry Korver's football team also had one of the most productive seasons in his I6 years of coaching the Red Raiders. They carted off I8 new school records plus 3 NAIA National records. Those included:


Golf Team Shoots Below Par





The NW men's basketball team finished the year with a 19-12 record which is the most wins by a Red Raider team since the 1976-77 team, which finished 19-7. NW finished an impressive I3-3 in home games this season; and finished second in the Holiday Tournament they hosted during Christmas break.






























Another All-American; Another Successful Season



Jeff Vance, a senior from Griswold, earned All-American honors this year after finishing fifth at the NAIA National Wrestling meet at Minot, ND. Several records were also broken this year including most dual victories by Jeff Vance (58) and most takedowns by Vance (81).




















A Christmas Carol




Productions
