Northwestern stands on the threshold of the 1959-60 academic year, which will mark a new and significant step in the development of the institution. The addition of the third year of college this September is the initial step in the granting of the first baccalaureate degree in the newly-approved four-year academic program for teacher training.

It is encouraging to observe the continued growth of Northwestern. As indicated in this issue of the "Classic," three new teaching staff members have been added for the new year who have the earned doctorate degree. Moreover, during the past summer a large percentage of the teaching staff has continued with advanced graduate study. The campus facilities augmented by the new Men's Dormitory, are rapidly improving. There is a fine prospect for another excellent student body for the new year. Last month Northwestern completed its 8th consecutive fiscal year without a deficit in its operating fund.

These are a few of the encouraging highlights that forecast a "Great Future" for Northwestern. The continued and increasing support of our alumni, churches, and friends will insure Northwestern's goal of serving as a "Great Christian Educational Institution."


