Dear Kathleen, Francois and Committee members,

The Peace Studies Program is organizing our eighth annual Peace Week at the University of Maine for the week of October 21-25, 2002. Our general theme this year is "The Courage for Peace." As we did in 2001, we will be focusing most of our attention this year on hosting a "mini-residency" with our special guest Dr. Louise Diamond.

Dr. Diamond is a professional peacebuilder, educator, consultant, author, and President Emeritus and co-founder, along with Ambassador John McDonald, of the Institute for Multi-Track Diplomacy in Washington, D.C. Most recently she has created a new organization, PeaceTech, whose mission is to make the tools and human technologies for peace widely available to people for use in their lives, homes, workplaces, communities and world. Dr. Diamond has written extensively on peace issues; her recent publications include: *Multi-Track Diplomacy: A Systems Approach to Peace* (with John McDonald), *The Courage for Peace: Daring to Create Harmony in Ourselves and the World*, and *The Peace Book*.

While at UMaine, Dr. Diamond will meet with various campus constituencies: classes, student organizations, staff, faculty, and others to be determined. Additionally, she will deliver a keynote presentation on October 21 or 22, open to the entire campus and wider community, followed by a reception and book-signing. The total cost for her visit will be approximately \$4600. We hope to have a good part of that amount from various university sources (please see the enclosed budget statement for a breakdown of income and expenses). We are asking the Cultural Affairs/Distinguished Lecture Series Committee to contribute \$2400 towards this special event.

Thank you for considering this request. We would be glad to meet with the committee to discuss this further.

FINAL REPORT FOR PREVIOUS PEACE WEEK GRANT

Paul Loeb, Peace Week 2001

We want to once again thank the Cultural Affairs/Distinguished Lecture Series Committee for its support of our keynote speaker for Peace Week 2001. On October 22 and 23, Paul Loeb participated in a "mini-residency" at UMaine, during which he met with many campus and community groups, including: Student Leadership group, Orono High School students, staff of the Division of Lifelong Learning, Introduction to Peace Studies classes, faculty, community social change organizations, and others. Additionally, Loeb presented a keynote address on "Soul of a Citizen: Living with Conviction in a Cynical Time." Several hundred UMaine students, staff, faculty and community members attended these different events.

We are pleased to note that 21 UM offices, programs, colleges and departments contributed funds towards Peace Week 2001. The \$2500 grant from the Cultural Affairs/Distinguished Lecture Series Committee was part of the honorarium paid to Paul Loeb.
