III. Summary of program requiring funding (title; featured artist(s); speaker(s); scheduled date(s):

The University of Maine Dept. of Communications and Journalism will host a distinguished author and photojournalist, David Bacon on April 19, 2010. His talk, to be presented at 1 PM in DPC 115 is entitled, "Immigration and Free Trade, The New Realities." Note that the Diversity Committee of the College of Education, the School of Policy and International Affairs and are all cosponsors of this visit.

David Bacon is the author of the book, *Illegal People*, a powerful look at the human side of globalization and the effects of trade policy on migration patterns. Publisher's Weekly's 2008 review calls it an "...incisive investigation of the global political and economic forces creating migration . . . Bacon's timely analysis is as cool and competent as his labor advocacy is unapologetic. In mapping the political economy of migration, with an unwavering eye on the rights and dignity of working people, Bacon offers an invaluable corrective to America's hobbled discourse on immigration and a spur to genuine, creative action." As outlined in the budget, we seek \$300 or 50% of our local funding for this program from CADLS. We will use this funding towards David Bacon's honorarium. No CADLS funds will be used for the refreshments accompanying his talk. The talk is free and open to the public and will be advertised broadly to the campus and to specific courses offered by the cosponsoring departments.

We also note that additional funds for his honorarium, his travel from his home in San Francisco, and his local expenses are being provided by PICA, the local community group that is the overall organizer of his multi-stop trip to Maine: this funding -- not reflected in the UMaine portion of the budget attached here -- amounts to \$1800.
