Road Commissioner's Report

To the Citizen's of Topsham:

At our town meeting last spring a vote was passed requesting a more detailed report of highway work.

I herewith submit my report as Road Commissioner. The first work began the 16th day of March when, by request of the Selectmen, something had to be done to prevent the undermining of the Brick Shoolhouse. This was caused by the flow of water from the road through catch basins and 12 inch tile pipe which kept breaking back and washing out the sand several feet deep.

This has been going on for years, and last spring the caving bank was about 8 feet from the wall of the schoolhouse. One hundred feet of 12 inch pipe has been put in to take care of the water and a bulkhead of cedar ties built and filled with stone to keep the bank from caving more. This work had to be done in sand and only time will tell whether it will stand. \$267.19 was expended on this job. I think there is a question as to whether this should be charged to the highway account of any one year.

WINTER STREET WALK

This walk was made by removing the turf 4 feet wide to about 4 to 6 inches deep and filling with ashes. A small amount of gravel being put on top. 1606 feet of walk was built and repaired at the cost of \$153.75. The ashes used were taken from private residences and paper mill dump and cost nothing except hauling. The cost of this work is from the general Highway appropriation.

OAK TO MAPLE STREET WALK

This walk was built on west side of Bridge Street. There had never been a walk here before. The place was plowed and graded, the sods hauled away. Ashes were used to fill in 6 to 8 inches deep, 4 feet wide, and 264 feet in length. A small amount of gravel being used on top, not over one inch. Total cost being \$94.50 or about 36 cents per running foot of walk of above measurements.

ASH STREET FILL

This job was to make a fill on the north side of Ash Street. The work was done by plowing and using a scoop scraper. The job was completed at the total cost of \$58.00. The appropriation was \$75.00, leaving a balance of \$17.00.

BAY ROCK ROAD SPECIAL

The material used for this road was crushed rock. 1254 feet of road 14 feet wide, 7 inches deep, was built. 207 loads of rock were used. The hauling was done by the yard, 90 cents per yard being paid, loads averaged a fraction over 2 yards. The teams made four turns per day. Total amount road 1254 feet. Total cost \$1,070.40 or about 83 cents and a fraction per running foot of road. The following men gave one-half day or more, some giving a full day with teams:

FORESIDE GRAVEL ROAD SPECIAL

This road is of gravel from the farm of Henry Cornish and Wallace Quint. 2673 feet about 12 feet wide and 6 inches deep was built. Number of yards used, 587. This was hauled by the day, \$7 per, across fields too soft

FORESIDE GRAVEL ROAD SPECIAL

This road is of gravel from the farm of Henry Cornish and Wallace Quint. 2673 feet about 12 feet wide and 6 inches deep was built. Number of yards used, 587. This was hauled by the day, \$7 per, across fields too soft

which had been thrown out of Elm and Main Street, were used here over a drain. Total cost \$1,504.27. Ninety feet of 12 inch culvert was used on this job, also considerable fill of earth made at Carrier's Corner, Bridge Street.

ELM AND MAIN STREET WALK

C. A. Prest had charge of this work. This walk is of cement and consists of 72 feet of walk on Main Street also a driveway, wall and steps at the Walker property.

On Elm Street 393 feet and seven driveway approaches. 41 loads of gravel used, also a number of loads of stone for the wall and driveways. Total cost \$795.25, total feet of walk 465. Total feet of wall $43\frac{1}{2}$. Width of walk 4 feet, about 6 inches thick. The cost of this job is taken from the general Highway appropriation. There is a credit of \$76.27 coming to this job.

CATHANCE ROCK ROAD

F. B. Meserve had charge of this road and has given me the following approximate measurements. Number of feet built 300, width 12 feet, 16 inches deep at center. Total cost \$193.95. The rock used here was very near the road being built, no crusher was used.

There has been the following work done and paid for from the general Highway appropriation:

Cathance Road, over 1000 feet of rock road, 16 feet wide and 8 to 18 inches deep.

On the Foreside Road, 30 rods of rock road, 14 feet wide and about 7 inches deep.

The hills on both sides of Barn's gully on the Guptill Road have been put in good shape, good gravel being used. Also both hills at corner near Branch Schoolhouse.

Bridge Street on Topsham Heights has been graveled beginning near residence of Frank Crosman and on past residence of Charles Sawyer. A sidewalk of ashes and gravel has been made on the east side of Pleasant Street about 900 feet at cost of \$93.70.

Edgecomb's Hill on the Meadow Road is graveled and graded, also a ditch blown through ledge on the west side of the hill. This piece of work joins that of the Meadow Road Special. making in all, over 1700 feet of heavy gravel road.

School Report

To the Citizens of Topsham:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of the schools of the town. This is the fourteenth annual report since the organization of the Brunswick-Topsham School District.

The conditions for a successful school year were favorable during the spring and fall terms, and during that time the teachers registers indicate an unusual regularity in attendance. At the beginning of the winter term, however, severe storms, deep snows and some of the diseases common to childhood interfered greatly with school work.

THE GRADED SCHOOLS

For several years the town has been fortunate in avoiding frequent changes in the teaching force of the graded schools. At the close of the spring term Clara M. Phinney (now Mrs. Clyde Eaton) resigned her position as teacher of the second and third grades in the village, after several years of faithful and efficient service. This vacancy was filled by the election of Susie F. Bowen, who had previously been employed as teacher in the primary department at Pejepscot.

At the close of the fall term, Elizabeth K. Purinton, teacher of first grade, resigned, and her place was filled by the election of Edith W. Davenport.

Hazel J. Kingston, who had for two years taught the fourth and fifth grades, resigned in June to accept a position in Portland. Her place is now filled by Mildred F. Edwards, a former teacher in this position.

The other village positions are held by the same teachers as last year.

Excellent work has been done the past year in all the village grades, and a continuation of the present teaching force is very desirable.

At Pejepscot the town has also been fortunate in securing the services of excellent teachers. Esther Powers has charge of the intermediate department, taking the place of Cleora F. Maxwell, now Mrs. John Tarbox.

During the fall term the attendance at all the rooms at Pejepscot was excellent. Since that time, however, the deep snow and an epidemic of whooping cough and the grip have made the attendance in the lower grades very irregular. This has been most noticeable in the first and second grades, where the attendance has been reduced more than one-half.

The following pupils were granted diplomas from the 9th grade, village school, in June. With scarcely an exception all the graduates entered the Brunswick High School in September: Herbert H. Fernald, Russell I. Sprague, Mildred M. Moore, Emily F. Eaton, Henry Pagurka, Franklyn E. Thorne, Walter E. Cimon, Llewellyn E. Leavitt, Hortense L. Williams, Zilpha R. Ross, Olive F. Colby, Raymond H. Foster, Marshall H. Metcalfe, Hazel Everard, Arthur C. Fickett, Ernest A. Cunningham, George R. Groves, Clyde E. Atwood, Berniece A. Barrows, Cecil A. Prest and Emily K. Fox.

HIGH SCHOOL

At the last annual town meeting the citizens voted to continue for another year the arrangement with Brunswick for the accommodation of the high school pupils. Sixty-five boys and girls have taken advantage of this opportunity. Topsham has, at the present time, a larger number of students in high school than it has ever had in its entire history. Even with this large number for which the town is paying tuition, it is saving at least \$2000 a year by the present arrangement.

Topsham students have maintained a good average in scholarship, and in proportion to the whole number in attendance, they have carried off their proportion of class honors.

As has been the case in the past, the school officials desire to carry out the wishes of the majority of the citizens of the town. They would suggest, however, that when Topsham decides to maintain again its own high school, it should make the date of opening one year from the beginning of the school year in September. This would give those students now in attendance at Brunswick an opportunity to adjust their work to the new conditions, and would also afford the school officials ample time to prepare for the change.

At the last annual town meeting a committee of three was appointed to report concerning the desirability of the purchase of a lot for a new school building. Without anticipating in any respect the report of this committee, it seems best to state that the necessity for a new school building depends entirely upon the action of the town in regard to its high school. At present. the village grades are very comfortably situated. high school is again opened in Topsham in the present high school building, it will be necessary to provide new quarters for the three lower grades. This statement is not advanced as an argument either for or against the continuation of the present arrangement with Brunswick, but simply to call the attention of the citizens to an existing condition.

SCHOOLHOUSES

The greater part of the appropriation for repairs made at the last annual town meeting has been expended on rural schoolhouses. This was found necessary in order that Topsham might comply with the law passed by the last Legislature in regard to schoolhouses. Briefly, the law provides that all toilets in rural schoolhouses shall be located in attached buildings provided with separate compartments for the sexes, accessible only by separate ventilated passageways from schoolrooms or corridors, and constructed in such a manner that the vault shall be at least ten feet from the schoolroom wall.

As this law does not go into effect until 1924, the school officials selected for repair those buildings which most needed attention, and as a consequence the toilets at the Branch, Mallett, Alexander and Cathance districts have been entirely remodelled and comply fully with the requirements of the State Department. In two cases—Cathance and Alexander—entirely new closets were constructed.

At the Branch, in addition to the change just mentioned, the schoolhouse was shingled, the interior papered and the ceiling repaired and whitened.

The Alexander schoolhouse required new sills and the building was painted outside.

A new stove has been installed at Middlesex.

At the village school building a sanitary drinking fountain and lavatory have been placed upon the second floor. In this way much going up and down stairs is avoided, as there is also a drinking fountain on the first floor.

Next year the buildings at the Middlesex and Haley districts will require attention in order that they may comply with the state requirements.

The Branch schoolhouse is in great need of a coat of paint, and this is also the case with several other rural buildings.

The manual training building—formerly the old town hall—needs new underpinning and fresh paint.

At Topsham Heights the interior needs painting, the ceiling whitened and the walls tinted.

At Pejepscot the walls of the intermediate room should be tinted and the toilet repaired.

RURAL SCHOOLS

The same number of rural schools has been maintained as last year and, on the whole, with satisfactory results. The various changes in the teaching force may be seen by consulting the list of teachers in the last part

of this report. The average attendance in the rural districts is somewhat smaller than last year, by reason of the deep snow and weather conditions.

Principally through the efforts of the school children and the teachers a victrola has been purchased for the Mallett school and, early in the year, a victrola was also bought for the Cathance school by means of money raised by the teacher and pupils.

SPECIAL TEACHERS

The teachers of the four special subjects—drawing, music, manual training and domestic science—are the same as last year with one exception. Catherine V. Brown, who served for one year as teacher of domestic science, resigned at the close of the spring term. The vacancy caused by her resignation was filled by the election of Anne M. Mulcaster. Miss Mulcaster received her professional training at Simmons College, and she also has had several years of practical experience in public school teaching. She came here with excellent recommendations, and her success, thus far, amply supports the good report of her work in other places.

These four special departments of school activity do not need any explanation at this time, or any excuse for their existence. They have become a recognized part of all efficient public school programs, and their value in education is fully recognized.

The usual exhibit was made at the annual Sagadahoc Fair, and twenty-five dollars in premiums were awarded the various collections. The money has been expended for subscriptions to art magazines and for school equipment.

TRANSPORTATION

Topsham continues to transport, at the expense of the town, pupils from three districts where schools are not maintained. In addition to these, a number of the grammar school pupils from Pejepscot are brought to the village school, in order that they may have the benefit of special subjects and complete their preparation for high school.

While the entire sum spent for transportation seems large, it should be remembered that it is economy for the town to pursue this course, as the cost is considerably less than would be the case if the schools were all maintained.

As there is usually more or less discussion concerning the question of transportation, it may be well to print here an extract from a very recent article written by the State Superintendent of Schools:

"The law specifically provides that rural children, residing at a distance considered by the school committee as unreasonable for them to walk, shall be provided transportation. Judgment necessarily varies in the several towns of the state. It is generally considered that pupils who live within a mile and a quarter, where the roads are good, are able to get to school without assistance. There would seem to be no doubt here. Pupils who live more than two and a quarter miles are practically always in position to require transportation, and those who live between the mile and a quarter and two and a quarter limits are at the discretion of the school committee."

HEALTH FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

Through the favor of the local organization of the Red Cross, Topsham has had the assistance of Lillian M. Densmore and Louise E. Morrison, Red Cross nurses, in looking after the health of the pupils in Topsham schools. This service has been rendered without expense to the town, with the exception of a few dollars expended for necessary supplies. The work of these nurses has been helpful, and is greatly appreciated by pupils, parents and teachers.

We have laws which compel children of a certain age to attend school for a definite number of years.

Since school attendance is compulsory, is it any more than an act of justice that the child should be, as far as possible, protected from infection, and that everything possible be done to insure his physical health.

It is hoped that means may be provided for the continuation of this health service in Topsham. A report of the work for the past five months is here given:

sponsive and we are hoping with the spring months before us the parents will cooperate in aiding us in the corrective work.

A careful estimate of the needs for the coming year has been made by the school committee, and it is hoped that these amounts will be raised at the coming meeting.

The success of a superintendent of schools depends, to a great extent, upon the cordial cooperation of an intelligent school board. He is the executive officer of the committee. The relations between the committee and the superintendent have been so pleasant and helpful during the year, that the superintendent wishes to acknowledge publicly his indebtedness to the school board for their active cooperation in all his efforts to maintain successfully the school system of Topsham.
