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

REPORT OF ROAD COMMISSIONER

The Roads and Bridges account shows an overdraft of \$3,253.43 caused by unexpected expenses over which we had no control. The flood damages of April 20th last spring cost \$3,009.87 to repair and the two heavy rains on successive week-ends last November cost an expense of \$1,256.50 to repair the damages. This makes an emergency expense amounting to \$4,266.37 for which no provision was made when the appropriation was voted last March. Chapman Brook Bridge was entirely rebuilt with cement pier in the center at a completed cost of \$784.15, some other work anticipated, of necessity canceled.

We have plowed the past year from the New Hampshire line on Route No. 2 through Gilead and Bethel to the Newry line and we have plowed Route No. 26 from Route No. 2 through Bethel, Greenwood and Woodstock to the Paris line. In addition we have plowed and sanded Mason Township and a small part of Albany Township for the County of Oxford.

The Town Road Improvement Fund was used to complete the road from the home of Alice Barker to Route No. 2 at the home of Albert Kimball, and the balance was expended on the West Bethel Flat road near the home of George Taylor. Both of these pieces of road are completed and ready for tar this summer.

Our 1950 State-Aid money is unexepended and we hope with the 1951 State-Aid money there will be enough to complete the 1½ miles of State-Aid No. 9 from Middle Intervale to the home of Harold Stanley.

The rental of the trucks and plows have paid all the expenses of the trucks, all the expenses of the new garage, including heat, insurance, etc., paid for 1 new Wausau blade plow which cost \$380.00 and also paid for 1 new 2 Ton 1950 Chevrolet Dump Truck equipped with a $2\frac{1}{2}$ yd. Hercules Dump Body with Cab Protector costing \$2,375.57 and leaves a balance in fund unexepended of \$1,353.98.

ANNUAL REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICES BETHEL — 1950

The Public Health Nursing Program with the continued support of your Child Health Conference Committee has made progress during the past year. Because of the very good participation in the immunization program both in the schools and the Child Health Conferences it is felt that the majority of the children under twelve years of age have been immunized. This in one of the important methods of securing and maintaining optimum health for your community.

In January immunizations were finished in the village schools. The rural schools were completed by May. There have been 150 children age five and over immunized this year.

There were five Child Health Conferences held with a total attendance of 180. Fifty children under five years of age were immunized.

By continuing these conferences during the summer months we can hope to have most of the children entering school each year immunized. Immunizations to be most effective should be done long before the child enters school.

Physical examinations were done in the rural schools and in the 1st, 4th and 7th grades this Fall.

Audiometer tests were done on all students in the 4th grade and up. This is recommended procedure to be done every two years.

Home visits have been made as follow-up of the Child Health Conferences and the school examinations. Visits have also been made to give nursing services to families with other health problems.

It was through the facilities of the Department of Health and Welfare, the fine cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools and the people of the community that the pupils from the 2nd, 5th and 8th grades received four sodium fluoride topical treatments to their teeth. This was a demonstration carried out in this area for the purpose of encouraging local communities to sponsor such a program.

In the Spring several interested people attended the Annual Meeting of the Health Councils in District II. This was for the purpose of interesting community members in organizing a local Health Council which would actively participate in the health program.

At this time your nurse wishes to express her appreciation to all who have assisted in promoting the present community health program in Bethel.

WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST

R. S. 1944, Ch. 32, Sec. 54—Forest Commissioner to promulgate information and to designate areas where control is necessary. The forest commissioner is hereby authorized and empowered to promulgate by letter, publication, poster, or other means of information concerning the white pine blister rust and designate, by the aforesaid means of promulgation, areas within the state in which control measures are necessary or advisable. It shall be the duty of every land owner within such designated area, to carry out such control measures as are ordered by the forest commissioner, including the removal and destruction of any or all plants of the genus Ribes, commonly known as currant and gooseberries, and any white pine tree or trees, which are found to be infected with the disease. If the owner fails to destroy the above named plants

or trees within the time specified by the forest commissioner, the forest commissioner shall cause said plants or trees to be destroyed and shall charge the actual expense of same to the city, town, or plantation within which said plants or trees are found. Such amount shall be collected as a state tax and credited to the appropriation for said purpose. The city, town, or plantation wherein such plants or trees are found may assess the cost of the removal of said plants or trees to the owner of the real estate wherein the said plants or trees are found. The amount so assessed shall be collected in the form of a tax.

The New School House lot known as the Crescent Grounds was purchased of Edward H. Hastings for the sum of \$3,200.00. This lot contains about 11½ acres.

\$88.00 was expended on the Steam Mill cemetery for mowing, raking, cutting bushes and disposal of waste; also the sum of \$89.00 expended on the West Bethel Flat cemetery for the same purposes and in addition the fence was painted. There are no vacant lots in the Flat cemetery and we advise the purchase of George Taylor of a piece of land adjoining the present cemetery the same size as the old cemetery and located on the Mason side of it. It did not seem advisable to spend any money on the few old cemeteries in town which have all grown up to timber land and which have not been used for more than 50 years. We have carried the unexpended balance of \$898.00 forward so it will be available for 1951.

For a location for a Dump we took a place on a steep bank on the Town Farm away from the river and not visible from the road. We spent \$438.45 in cutting the timber, building a road and the necessary fences. We believe this Dump will last many years and be satisfactory without causing any difficulty. The balance of the appropriation amounting to \$561.55 we have put into the surplus.

COMMENTS

Town of Bethel

January 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949

An audit has been completed of the books and records of the Town of Bethel for the year ended December 31, 1949.

The records maintained by the Selectmen, Assessors, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Town Clerk were audited. The system of internal control was reviewed. Accounting records and other supporting evidence were examined or tested by methods and to the extent deemed necessary under the circumstances.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet together with the related financial statements fairly present the financial position of the Town at December 31, 1949, and the results of its operations for the year then ended,

ASSETS

Cash on Hand and In Bank (\$19,502.85)

The Treasurer's cash balance consisted of funds available for current use on demand. This balance was reconciled with the depository bank as follows:

Accounts Receivable (\$799.82)

Accounts receivable were determined by direct examination of the Treasurer's receipts and an analysis of departmental charges. The balance is accounted for as follows:

No verification was made of the accounts receivable as they had been paid in full prior to the audit of the accounts.

Taxes Receivable (\$5,586.94)

The Assessors' valuation book for 1949 and the related commitment of taxes were examined. The records of collections were reviewed, and the individual uncollected balances were tabulated and found to be in agreement with the control accounts.

All transactions affecting prior years' uncollected taxes were reviewed and the unpaid balances listed. Requests for verification were mailed to a representative number of taxpayers whose accounts were outstanding at the year end. Should any variations be noted as a result of these verifications the proper municipal officers will be notified,

Tax Liens (\$923.26)

Transactions affecting the 1948 tax liens and those of prior years' were reviewed. Payments received were traced to the credit of the individual accounts. Other credits were found to have been properly approved. The unpaid liens, on file with the Treasurer, were checked in detail.

Tax Deeds (\$1,180.14)

No tax deeds were acquired during the year and payments on old deeds amounted to \$176.38. The reserve of \$678.26 for possible losses in collections on tax deeds is still being carried, however.

As a result of the current year's operations, the unappropriated surplus of the Town reflects an increase of

\$5,439.53 over the corresponding period one year ago. The principal contributing factor to the increase was the net gain from operations of \$5,731.50. A complete analysis of the changes in the account are shown on Exhibit C.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES

Net Gain from Operations (\$5,731.50)

A comparative analysis of revenue and expenditures for the years 1949 and 1948 is presented on Exhibit B. The year ended December 31, 1949 shows a net gain from operations of \$5,731.50 as compared with a net gain from operations of \$4,771.97 for the same period one year ago.

TRUST FUNDS

The savings accounts representing the deposits of Cemetery Perpetual Care and Ministerial and School Funds, were verified at the Bethel Savings Bank. All income accruing to the funds had been properly credited and all expenditures properly authorized in accordance with the terms of the trusts.

GENERAL

Overdrafts were noted in several appropriation accounts, the summary of which is shown on Exhibit D. The Attorney General has rendered an opinion on this point and it is included for the benefit of the municipal officers.

"The municipal officers are bound by the terms of the articles in the warrant calling the meeting providing for the expenditures of money. The officers should not spend more than the taxpayers appropriated at town meeting, unless the statute expressly authorizes an expenditure in excess of the appropriation."

The provisions of Chapter 84, Section 81 of the Revised Statutes of 1944, however, relate to expenditures of monies for highway purposes and permit overdrafts in cases of emergencies to the extent of 15% of the appropriation.

The excise tax collections for the year amounted to \$10,510.53. The following receipts, the copies of which were

RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations appear worthy of consideration by the municipal officers:

- (1) That, supplemental taxes be covered by a warrant from the Assessors. This is in accordance with Chapter 81, Section 29, of the Revised Statutes of 1944.
- (2) That, all transfers between accounts be recorded by the use of journal entries, rather than by Treasurer's receipts and Selectmen's warrants.
- (3) That, the original invoices, supporting school expenditures, be submitted with the roll of accounts and placed on file with the municipal officers.
- (4) That, the state system of accounting for town owned property and equipment be adopted so that a record will be available to show values and other pertinent data for municipal capital investments.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Bethel:

Following is my fifth annual report on the Bethel Schools.

When my report went in last year the enrollment in the Bethel elementary schools was 464, and the number of pupils enrolled in high schools was 102. At the present time the elementary enrollment is 488 and those in high schools number 113.

It became necessary to employ three more teachers this year to help care for increased numbers and crowded classrooms. Mrs. Frances Gunther was hired to act as helping teacher in grade five and to do remedial work with the other upper grade pupils. Mrs. Thelma Van Den Kerckhoven is acting as helping teacher in the first grade at the primary building. A second room was opened at West Bethel for grades four, five, and six, and Mrs. Doris Lord was hired for this position.

At the present time there is every reason to believe that the new school building will be ready to start school in next September.

For 1951 increased funds will be necessary in several items of the maintenance account. More is being asked for instruction. Extra teachers have already been added and one more will be needed next year. With conditions as they are teachers' salaries should be raised. In order to replace most of your teachers it would be necessary to offer between \$2200 and \$2400. The work of the present staff of teachers is very commendable. Your unfailing support will assure its continuance. Janitorial costs are expected to be higher. More is being asked for supplies. This will be necessary because of additional materials needed to open new rooms and to pay for large paper shipments ordered in the fall as an economy before

large price increases came about. The other item which again will require more funds is high school tuition. The per capita cost and numbers enrolled are still increasing.

The major repair this year was ceiling insulation. Some fuel savings have already been noted because of this, but more important, the pupils in the rural schools have been more comfortable during the cold days. This is the first time in some years that the repair account has not shown an overdraft. With an overlay of one hundred dollars your committee feels that an appropriation of \$1000 this year will allow them to carry out the repairs that are immediately necessary.

Participation in the school lunch program has again increased. The daily average of lunches now being served is running over 215. The price of twenty cents per meal has been retained so far in spite of the increased costs of food. How long it will be possible to hold this price is indefinite. For the second year the town is not being asked for any funds to support this program.

May I at this opportunity express my gratitude for the continued support you are giving to the expanding school program.

D. 1951 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

The polls will be open for balloting on elective officers upon order of the Moderator and will be closed at seven o'clock in the afternoon.

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To hear and act upon the report of selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor, treasurer, collector, superintendent of schools, road commissioner, clerk and other town officers.
- Art. 3. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor, Treasurer, Road Commissioner, Clerk, and other town officers.
- Art. 4. To establish the price to be paid for collecting taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of defraying the expenses to be incurred by the action taken under Articles 3 and 4 above.
- Art. 6. To choose all other necessary Town Officers, not to be elected by Australian Ballot.
- Art. 7. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school maintenance.

- Art. 8. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on school buildings.
- Art. 9. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance on school buildings.
- Art. 10. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for services of a School Physician.
- Art. 11. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary of Superintendent of Schools and office expense.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$125.00 for public health nursing in Bethel. Said sum to be expended by the Maine Department of Health and Welfare, Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 13. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended on the town ways and for the repair of bridges.
- Art. 14. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of winter roads.
- Art. 15. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for bituminous surfacing of town ways and streets.
- Art. 16. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 17. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining 3rd class highways and for cutting and removing bushes therefrom.
- Art. 18. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to remove the snow from business and other congested sections both from streets and sidewalks.
- Art. 19. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for street lighting.

- Art. 20. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be paid the Bethel Chamber of Commerce to be used for advertising and publicity.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages, and attractions of the State of Maine, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 22. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and construction of sewers.
- Art. 23. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for relief of the poor.
- Art. 24. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to take care of abatements as made by the Assessors.
- Art. 25. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to procure from the Bethel Library Association the free use of books during the coming year for all inhabitants of the town under such restrictions and regulations as shall insure the safety and good use of the books.
- Art. 26. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for decorating the graves of veterans (soldiers and sailors) and for the observance of Memorial Day.
- Art. 27. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for Treasurer's Bond.
- Art. 28. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for Collector's Bond.
- Art. 29. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Fire Department.
- Art. 30. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for fire hose for the Fire Department.
- Art. 31. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for miscellaneous expenses.

- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chap. 32, Sec. 54.
- Art. 33. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance on all of the motor driven vehicles owned by the Town.
- Art. 34. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense and Public Safety.
- Art. 35. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and construction of sidewalks and install suitable surface drains when necessary.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act.
- Art. 37. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to care of Article No. 36.
- Art. 38. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay interest on notes and temporary loans.
- Art. 39. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to install a six (6) inch water main to the new Elementary School Building.
- Art. 40. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for grading the grounds of the new Elementary School Building.
- Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to pay Serial Note No. 1 on the new Elementary School Building.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to request the next Legislature to repeal the law now on the Statutes closing Vital Statistics records to the public.
- Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen or other authorized officers to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of pay-

ing obligations of the Town; such loans or loan to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to obtain money by loan to pay the debts of the town and take up outstanding notes against the town or renew the same with new notes, and to execute and deliver the notes of the town therefor signed by its Treasurer and countersigned by the Selectmen.
- Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town Treasurer, upon approval of the Selectmen, to sell and assign unmatured tax mortgage liens for not less than the amount unpaid and interests and cost.
- Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell and convey real estate owned by the town under tax deeds or under tax liens to such persons for such prices and upon such terms as said Selectmen and Treasurer in their judgment and discretion may determine for the best interests of the town and to execute in behalf of the inhabitants of said town such deeds or other instruments of conveyance as may be required to complete such sales and conveyances.
- Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to purchase of George Taylor a piece of land adjoining the West Bethel Flat Cemetery of equal size and dimensions as the present cemetery and located on the Mason side.
- Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of 12 to be known as the Budget Committee.
- Art. 49. To choose any committee, hear the report of any and act thereon.
- Art. 50. To choose by ballot the following Town officers for the ensuing year, to wit: Town Clerk, Three Selectmen, Three Assessors, Three Overseers of Poor, Treasurer, one member of the School Committee for three years, Tax Collector and Road Commissioner.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Selectmen's Office on Monday, March 5th, 1951 for the purpose of correcting the list of voters from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until time for the polls to close.
