IMPORTANT

All taxpayers should read the following requirement and comply with it.

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930

“Before making an assessment, the Assessors shall give seasonable notice in writing to the Inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or shall notify them, in such other ways as the Town at its Annual Meeting directs. to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists, of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner, after such notice, does not bring in such lists, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed.”

Millinocket School Health Service

To the citizens of Millinocket, I submit my sixth report of the School Health service—

Because of the rapid progress made in education in the past decade, any educational undertaking which does not advance along modern lines, is falling behind. A revision of curriculums is being accomplished throughout the country. This is particularly true of school health programs. The Maine Department of Education, in cooperation with the active health workers in the state, is attempting to standardize our curriculum in health.

That we may advance normally and be of greatest service to the community, your nurse spent most of the summer vacation at Simmons making a study of the modern school health program. May I state that throughout the course Millinocket received commendation for the unusual cooperation from janitors, teachers, and community which was evident from our program.

The modern program is divided into three divisions:

1st—*Health Protection.*

School Sanitation—in which nurse and teacher cooperate with the janitor to make the best use of facilities provided.

Communicable Disease Control — Morning inspection by teacher, reporting all suspicious symptoms to nurse and health officer. 860 were reported to the nurse and 180 excluded from school until permission to return was given by the Health Officer. 91 were given Toxoid and 105 were vaccinated. Unfortunately

finances have not permitted a Tuberculosis Clinic. Three children have been sent to the Sanatorium by private physicians and one is on the waiting list.

Routine Inspection—An inventory of the health of 1,448 in the grades show that 1,230 have some physical handicap. Of these, children with poor teeth, 1,108, head the list. As dental defects are a barometer to the child's nutrition, they are more serious than the above statement might indicate. Throat 109, vision 212, hearing 33, nasal obstruction 43, cervical glands 84, more than 10% underweight 261. Other defects may be more serious but the proportion is small. 1,743 notices were sent parents. In high school were found 56 vision defects and six hearing defects.

2nd—*Correction of Defects.*

Follow Up in Homes—It has not been possible to carry out the work with parents to the extent that was done last year. However, 140 visits to homes were made and 33 visits were made by parents to the nurse. It was intended to invite parents to be present at the nurse's inspection, but because of the scarlet fever epidemic and consequent pressure of work that the inspections be completed on schedule, this plan was abandoned. 409 additional visits were made in behalf of the work.

Clinics—Through the M. P. H. A. we were again privileged to have a clinic for our Hard of Hearing children. 25 were examined. Our records for three years show decided improvement in most cases and a complete cure in many, and we feel that they are well worth while. We cooperated with the P. T. A. in their Summer Round-up, but the attendance was small as it rained. A survey of crippled children was made and assistance given Dr. Porter in examining these children. If money is made available through the Social Security Act, some action will be taken. Assistance in making corrections has been given by welfare organizations. Arrangements were made for six children to have free treatment in hospitals.

Special Classes—It is not possible to have special classes for our handicapped children, so provision must be made in our class room, and this is done as much as is possible. Four applications were sent to special schools.

3rd—*Health Promotion.*

Education—It is under this division that we hope to benefit most by the new curriculum. The usual projects have been carried on this year. A total of 300 seven point pins were awarded, fifteen room awards in the Health Habit Activity, and three room awards in dental corrections. The project in Home Medicine Cabinets for sixth grades and Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick for sophomore girls have been continued.

Every handicapped child runs a risk of becoming a maladjusted child. The School Health Service consciously plans to help every child to make the best possible physical, social, emotional, and vocational adjustment, and parents are urged to discuss with the school nurse any problem which concerns their child.

Thanks is extended to all who have assisted in the work and the cheerful cooperation of each individual is appreciated.

Report of Health Officer

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Millinocket:

In accordance with custom the Health Officer presents his report for 1935.

During February and March sporadic cases of Measles and Chicken Pox were found; in May a much larger number developed. After May no contagious disease was reported until the latter part of September when one case of Scarlet Fever was found, from that time until date of this report many cases widely separated were reported and placed under quarantine. It is certain that many were un-reported, not only after September but during the summer months. The disease has been in town for several years and will continue until parents realize that they must share the responsibility.

I would again urge all parents having children with any rash, particularly following a sore throat, however mild, to call a physician or report to me. While no deaths have occurred from the disease and most children have been hardly ill at all, remember even the mildest case may affect the child in after years. At date of this report there are only two

houses with three children under quarantine.

While there were some 150 or more Infantile Paralysis cases in Maine, Millinocket fortunately escaped. I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, School Nurse and the teachers for their cooperation.

Several nuisances were reported and promptly corrected upon notification. During the Spring months practically every street in town was visited and it was a pleasure to see the clean, orderly appearance of the householders grounds.

Report of Plumbing Inspector

To the Citizens of Millinocket—

Your Plumbing Inspector reports for the year 1935.

During the year the following plumbing installations were made:

19 toilets, 15 bath tubs, 22 lavatories, 7 sinks, 6 hot water tanks.

There were nine complaints of unsanitary conditions, and defective plumbing. There were three installations of plumbing that did not comply with the plumbing code. They were investigated, and satisfactory adjustments made to comply with the plumbing code.

There were three backhouses taken down, and one cesspool was filled in.

\$48.75 was collected for permits and sent to the State Department of Health, Augusta, Maine. Of this amount \$36.55 was returned from the State Department to your inspector, who in turn paid \$36.55 to the town treasurer.

Report of Milk Inspector

The Selectmen of the Town of Millinocket—

Gentlemen :

During the past year tests were run at monthly intervals on milk and cream. Bacteria as well as butter fat tests were run on the milk so as to give the dealers a better idea of the quality of their product. Milk from the individual shippers was tested from time to time for bacteria and butter fat. As a result of this check-up some shippers were warned and others dropped, when the bacteria count was found to be excessive. Because of the fact that the Milk Control Board regulates the quality and prices of milk and cream in this town; many farmers were intercepted and their cream tested from time to time to see that they were selling according to the specifications of this Control Board.

In November samples of milk from four of our dealers were submitted to the Annual Community Milk Contest held at Lewiston. Scores of 76.85, 84.90, 91.2 and 91.1 points out of a possible 100 were obtained, which I think very good considering that it was the first time that we had ever submitted samples to any State contest. Lewiston won first place with a score of 94.125 points and Westbrook second with a score of 93.162.

During the year over 300 tests were run on milk and cream and the results obtained have been very satisfactory.

I made a careful audit of all transactions entered into by the town during the fiscal year ended January 31, 1936 and found that all disbursements were duly authorized by warrants approved by a majority of the Board of Selectmen. I have verified all postings to the books kept in the General Office, and errors or discrepancies have been corrected. I have made further detailed audits, as follows;—

TAX COLLECTOR: Your Tax Collector's records were in first-class shape. He has fully accounted for all moneys collected by him including town taxes and interest, and automobile excise taxes. I have accepted his report of Uncollected Taxes, detail of which will be found in another part of this booklet.

TREASURER: Your Treasurer has correctly accounted for all moneys paid to the town. He has made no disbursements except upon warrants authorized and approved by the Board of Selectmen. He had no cash on hand at time of audit—all funds being on deposit in Millinocket Trust Co., his bank balance was given a thorough check-up and was found to be correct and in agreement with cash balance shown on books kept in Selectmen's Office.

PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND: In this fund are Sewer Bonds aggregating \$10,000.00 which I found in a safe-deposit box in the Millinocket Trust Co. Cash in the fund is carried in a savings account in the above named institution, the sum of which is as shown in detail in another part of this booklet. This amount has been verified and found to be correct.

I HEREBY CERTIFY that in my opinion the within report, insofar as it pertains to the town's financial transactions and affairs, is true and correct.

I wish to again specifically call attention to the following:

SEWER BONDS, \$10,000.00 — Although these Bonds matured April 1, 1924, they remain outstanding and unpaid.

BOOKS NOT IN BALANCE — I have previously called attention to this discrepancy due to back years' taxes and outstanding Tax Deeds which were never taken up on the Town's books. This discrepancy amounts to \$9,468.15.

Comments By The Selectmen

To the Citizens of Millinocket:

The chief topic of discussion again this year among the citizens, has been the Care of the Poor Account. We therefore wish to call your attention to the following facts:

First: The amount expended during the year 1935 on our own cases was \$54,242.60, as compared with \$43,148.18 in 1934. This represents an increase of \$11,094.42, or 25 per cent plus.

Second: The number of town families aided in 1935 was 183, as compared with 158 families in 1934, an increase of 25 families, or an increase of 15.8 per cent.

Third: The amount of money received from the Federal Government in 1935 for E. R. A. and W. P. A. was \$46,128.-73, as compared with \$51,819.99 received from the same source in 1934. In other words, the amount of funds received from the Federal Government in 1935 decreased \$5,691.26 or 10.9 per cent.

Fourth: It has been estimated that the price of groceries and clothing has increased from 10 per cent to 30 per cent during the past year. (The taxpayer is the best judge of this statement.

Fifth: It is a known fact that the number of men employed on woods operations decreased considerably this past year; that whereas several hundred men were employed on the North Twin Power Development in 1934, not more than 70 men

were employed in 1935, and then, only for a period of three or four months; that due to a new method of handling wood in the wood room of the G. N. P. Co. mill, a number of men were laid off and others cut down to a point where they are only receiving three days employment a week.

Sixth: That \$8,169.10, or 15 per cent of the cost of the Care of Poor was expended for medical, hospital and funeral charges.

We therefore believe the statements enumerated above are a clear explanation of the additional increase.

When the above order has been filled out by the person requesting aid, it is submitted to the Selectmen. If the order is approved by them, it is then submitted to a grocer and no grocer is authorized to substitute any article on the order for another. AIRPORT

The Airport project was originally started by the town. Later, this was taken over by C. W. A., and continued as an E. R. A. project. When E. R. A. was terminated, and W. P. A. substituted the Millinocket Airport project was the second of its kind to be approved in the State. The Selectmen have been since informed, that due to the location of Millinocket, the War Department is very much interested in its completion.

The north-south runway is now completed to such an extent that ships such as Col. Chamberlain's, carrying 25 passengers, can land and take off without difficulty.

During the past winter, much progress has been made towards the completion of the east-west runway, and this should be usable before the middle of the summer.

PUBLIC SCHOOL BUILDINGS

Under E. R. A., the G. W. Stearns High School was completely renovated inside, receiving several applications of paint, all hardware was replaced, and a number of bookcases, etc., constructed. Two ceilings were replaced in the Oxford Street School, and the building completely painted inside.

The Aroostook Avenue School was also completely painted inside under this project.

AROOSTOOK AVENUE EXTENSION

This roadway was constructed from Penobscot Avenue, down Second Street, to Aroostook Avenue, and thence, along Aroostook Avenue, to Penobscot Avenue, at a total expense to the town of \$172.57.

SIDEWALK CONSTRUCTION

The Selectmen originally presented this as an E. R. A. project, and later had it taken over as a W. P. A. project. Approximately 2800 feet of sidewalk was constructed of bitumuls, beginning at Fuller Furniture Co., and continuing along Central Street and Katahdin Avenue, to the end of the cement road. This sidewalk was constructed six feet wide, to Colby Street, and five feet wide for the remaining distance.

The original W. P. A. project for this work called for the construction of 7200 feet of sidewalk but due to winter conditions, it was necessary to terminate the project for the time being, at least.

SCENIC HIGHWAY PROJECT

A W. P. A. project was approved for 77 men, for the construction of the so-called Abol-Ripogenus Road, through the right-of-way cut by E. R. A. men. This project is now under way and considerable work has been accomplished to date, despite the severe storms.

This highway has been attracting more and more attention each year and it is hoped that the project will be completed in the near future.

SEWING PROJECT

The first sewing project in this district was started in Millinocket, and at the present time, ten women are working on it. They are making sheets, pillow cases and pajamas for the Federal Government, in addition to dresses for the Town of Millinocket.

ADMINISTRATIVE

Under E. R. A., we had an administrative project, employing an auditor and stenographer. This project was discontinued under W. P. A., and altho the number of men employed increased from approximately 50 to 150, all administrative work must now be handled through the Selectmen's office. This has placed a very heavy burden on the office staff, especially during the month of February, when there has been so much additional work, preparing the town report, the warrant, and securing information for the budget committee.

We feel that 1935 has been an exceptionally hard year, insofar as the unemployed have been concerned. However, as we are now practically assured that a new postoffice building will be constructed in 1936, together with an underpass at the Bangor and Aroostook Railroad, and a \$10,000 Federal Aid road construction job on the Millinocket Lake Road, in addition to all W. P. A. Projects, the year 1936 should show a very substantial reduction in the care of poor account.

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE 1936

To the Citizens of the Town of Millinocket—

The Moderator at the last Annual Town Meeting was delegated to appoint your Budget Committee for 1936. This he did, appointing a committee of fifteen members and a Secretary.

The procedure of the Committee was similar to that of the past few years in that three of the eight meetings were open to the public in the form of hearings. As stated in previous reports, we wish that you would feel more free to attend these public hearings. The Selectmen, and heads of various departments are always represented at these hearings, and it is an excellent opportunity for you, as well as your Committee, to acquire first-hand information on how your money is expended.

Again we have prepared a tabulation showing the accounts which appear on the Town Books. On this tabulation you will also find our recommendations which in a good many instances are self-explanatory. Those items which need further explanation, however, are covered in the following paragraphs:

It is recommended that \$50.00 be raised to advertise the Natural Resources of Millinocket, and that to this, the sum of \$110.00 be transferred from the Automobile Excise Tax Account to make a total of \$160.00 available. It is further recommended that this \$160.00 be spent under the auspices of the Millinocket Chamber of Commerce to pay for suitable advertisement in the "Maine Publicity Bulletin."

As you probably know, work on the Aviation Field has been carried on by means of various government projects. It is our understanding that the Federal Government and War Department are very much interested in our airport and wish to have both runways completed. This being the case, it is very likely that they will furnish additional money as required, so we have recommended no appropriation for this year.

You will note that a new Cemetery account appears on the tabulation this year. The purpose of this account is to build up a

fund from receipts of sale of lots in the Town or Protestant Cemetery. As this fund increases, it will be available for any work which may be required on the Town or Protestant Cemetery.

For the Cemetery Maintenance Account we are recommending for this year that \$2,000 be raised and that the Selectmen have the authority to use \$1,000 additional from the Special Account, if necessary, to make a total of \$3,000. It is understood that this \$3,000 will be spent approximately as follows:

Completion of fence (around old Protestant Cemetery)	\$1.250
Graveling roads and paths in Catholic and Protestant Cemeteries	1.000
Regular Maintenance	500
Repairs to Vault	250

For the Care of the Poor, we recommend the same sum as last year, namely, \$20,000. In connection with this, we are recommending \$10,000 for the Special Account. As stated in other sections of the report, the Selectmen may use part of this money to provide work for men who would otherwise have to receive Town Aid, for work on the Cemetery, and also to finance the materials on the W. P. A. projects that we are recommending. Similar to last year, any balances in this fund are to be transferable to the Care of the Poor Account if the Board of Selectmen find it necessary to do so. It would seem that with the Federal Government building a new Post Office in town, the Bangor & Aroostook Railroad Co. and State Highway making a grade crossing elimination on the road to Mt. Katahdin, and with the W. P. A. projects that are recommended, that the incoming Board of Selectmen should be able, by careful administration, to take care of our poor with the above funds.

There was considerable discussion at the last year's Annual Town Meeting in regards to the necessity of a new piece of fire fighting apparatus and at that meeting a sinking fund of \$1,000 was set up toward purchase of same. Your Budget Committee has made a careful investigation into this matter and it is our opinion that a new piece of apparatus is actually required to replace the present Knox equipment. We recommend, therefore, that the sum of \$6,600 be raised this year for purchase of a new piece of fire apparatus. In order to be certain that suitable equipment is obtained at the best possible price, it is further recommended that a special committee be appointed to secure bids from all leading manufacturers of fire apparatus, and then make final selection; said committee to be composed of the Chairman of incoming Board of Selectmen, the Fire Chief, and three additional members to be appointed by the Moderator at this Annual Town Meeting.

Note (a): \$37,000 was borrowed from the Bank during the past year for the Care of the Poor Account. As this amount has not been assessed, it must, therefore, be raised this year to pay off debt to Bank.

Items starred are Overdrafts.

With reference to the Fire Department and the Police Department, the Budget Committee wishes to recommend to the Board of Selectmen that the Chief of each department use the same car.

The Millinocket Band requested an additional \$100 this year, but as the commitment is running high, we are not recommending any increases except where absolutely necessary. Our recommendation, therefore, is \$700, the same as last year.

Estimates on all of the school accounts were submitted by the School Committee, and after analyzing, accepted by this Committee. The School Committee would, however, like to purchase a stoker for the Stearns High School this year, if the Town could afford it. This would cost in the vicinity of \$1,150, and we are not recommending it for this year because of the reasons that are stated in the preceding paragraph. We suggest, however, that the Moderator at this Annual Town Meeting appoint a special committee of three to thoroughly investigate the economies of a stoker installation, and to report their findings to the Budget Committee before the next Annual Town Meeting.

For the Roads and Bridges, the sum of \$10,000 has been recommended with the understanding that \$2,000 of this amount shall be transferred to the Tarvia account, to finance the purchase and application of Tarvia or Asphalt to the streets which are in need of same. Out of this \$10,000 it is also understood that the Town will purchase one truck to replace their oldest one. With the savings in repairs taken into consideration, possibly the Road Commissioner can run his department so as to purchase two trucks this year.

Street Light recommendation of \$6,715 is to include three new lights. One light to be installed on Aroostook Avenue Extension (built last year); one to be installed at end of Highland Avenue (at junction of North Terrace); and the third to be installed on Katahdin Avenue near the Remi Michaud residence. All three of these lights are needed to correct present dangerous conditions.

The State has taken over the Soldiers' Pensions, so we recommend that this account be closed by transferring the existing balance of \$85.38 to the Memorial Day Observance Account, with the understanding that only \$50.00 of this sum be spent this year, and that it be spent under the auspices of the American Legion.

For the Selectmen's office, we recommend the same as last year, \$4,000. This added to the balance left over from last year is to provide them with ample funds to buy new files which are badly needed. It will also provide funds to fix up a fireproof room

in the Aroostook Avenue School to be used as a vault for storage of all important town records.

Two accounts (1) the Firemen, and (2) the Hydrant Rental, show overdrafts this year, totaling \$729.95. It is our recommendation that these overdrafts be eradicated by a transfer of this amount from the Automobile Excise Tax Account to the above mentioned accounts.

The Swimming Pool property is in need of quite a few repairs this year and although \$1,000 was asked for this account, we are only recommending \$700. This provides \$150 more than last year, and it is understood that this extra money is to be used for repair work only.

Relief for World War Veterans and their dependents has steadily increased until it has reached quite a sizable amount. It is recommended that this item be set up as a separate account on the books, but that it be financed the same as previously, from the Miscellaneous Account.

There are balances in Town House Operating Accounts Nos. 1, 2 and 3 amounting to \$217.47. We recommend that these balances be transferred as additional income to the Miscellaneous Account.

The \$2,425 recommended for the W. P. A. projects is to pay for the materials on the projects that were authorized during the past year and are still in progress. These are Scenic Highway (Ripogenus Road), Airport, and Sewing projects. Project on sidewalks was discontinued during early part of the winter. Your Budget Committee recommends that the Selectmen try to secure the following projects for this year:

(1) Painting and puttying of all School Window Sash;
(2) Elm Street Storm Sewer; and (3) Additional Tarvia or Asphalt Sidewalks, with the understanding that the Selectmen are authorized to pay for the necessary materials required for these projects out of the Special Emergency Account.

The Committee wish to take this opportunity to thank the present Board of Selectmen, their office help, and all others who have cooperated in furnishing any information which was requested of them.

In Conclusion: If the Town votes to accept the recommendations of the Budget Committee as shown on the tabulation, and if the County and State Taxes and Town Valuation remain approximately the same as last year, the tax rate for 1936 will be about

\$62.00 per \$1,000. As this is quite an increase over the past few years, we sincerely hope that our recommendations will not be exceeded at Town Meeting.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the town of Millinocket, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the ARMORY BUILDING in said town on Monday, the Second (2nd) day of March, A. D. 1936, at Nine (9) o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose by ballot, a Moderator to preside at the said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by ballot, according to the provisions of Sections thirty-eight (38) to fifty-two (52) inclusive, of Chapter

Five (5) of the Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930, three Selectmen, who shall be Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Road Commissioner, one member of the Superintending School Committee for three years, Chief of the Fire Department, and Auditor. The Polls for the Election of these officers will be open at Nine (9) o'clock in the forenoon and close at Seven (7) o'clock in the afternoon.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to elect or to have the Moderator appoint a Budget Committee. Also, to fix the number of members and their term of office.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid after a specific time. Also, to fix such rate and time.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to allow an abatement to be made to those who voluntarily pay their taxes to the collector or treasurer at certain periods, and the time within which they are so entitled. Also, to see if the town will vote to fix the rate for said abatements.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to fix the salary of the Road Commissioner for the ensuing year.

Article 7. To choose a Sewer Commissioner for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to continue the Free High School as established.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of One hundred and ten dollars (\$110.00), from the Automobile Excise Tax Account to Advertising Natural Resources of Millinocket Account.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to transfer to the Miscellaneous Account the sum of Two hundred seventeen dollars and forty-seven cents (\$217.47), as represented by unexpended balances in the following accounts:

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of Eighty-five dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$85.38), from

Soldiers' Pensions Account to Memorial Day Observance Account.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of Seventeen dollars and ninety-five cents (\$17.95), from Automobile Excise Tax Account to Hydrant Rental Account to pay overdraft in the Hydrant Rental Account.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of Seven hundred and twelve dollars (\$712.00), from Automobile Excise Tax Account to Firemen Account to pay overdraft in the Firemen Account.

Article 14. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to transfer from the Miscellaneous Account to an account for the support of War Veterans, their widows and dependents.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to install the following three street lights, one at the corner of North Terrace Street and Highland Avenue, one on Aroostook Avenue, between the corner of Second Street and Penobscot Avenue, and one on Katahdin Avenue near the residence of Remi Michaud.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary,

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to employ a School Nurse. Also, to see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the same.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended on the Sourdnahunk Road between the Bangor & Aroostook Railroad Station and Spencer's Carry, so-called.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Thirty-seven thousand dollars (\$37,000.00), to pay for Perma-

ment Loans negotiated during the fiscal year ending January 31, 1936.

Article 20. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing a new piece of fire apparatus. Also, to see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the same.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways, and Bridges, under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, of Chapter 75, Public Laws, 1933.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise a sum of money for the maintenance of the State Aid Highway, according to the provisions of Sections 18, 37 and 38 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930. Also, to see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the same.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Municipal Officers of the town of Millinocket to petition the State Highway Commission on or before November 1, 1936, under the provisions of Sections fifty-two (52) and fifty-three (53) of Chapter twenty-eight (28) of the Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930, to lay out a winter route over the State Highway which begins at the Millinocket Stream Bridge and extends towards Mattawamkeag to the town line. Also, to see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay for the same.

Article 25. To see what sum, if any, the town will recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, Public Laws, 1931.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to establish and establish a rate per cent for the collection of taxes, or fix a salary for the same, for the ensuing year.

Article 27. To see if the town will authorize the town treas-

ure), with the approval of the selectmen, to hire as temporary loans this current fiscal year, such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and to pay town notes and bonds becoming due, and for these purposes to issue and negotiate notes of the town to be paid during the year in which said loans are made, out of money raised during such current year by taxes, said loans not to exceed an amount in the aggregate the total tax levy for the preceding municipal year, less the total amount of temporary loans previously authorized to be made in anticipation of this current year's taxes, and to ratify said loans.

Article 28. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to hire as a temporary loan after February 1, 1937, and before our next annual town meeting, to meet current expenses accruing at that time, and for this purpose, authorize said town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to issue and negotiate notes of the town to the amount of said loan; said temporary loan to be paid during the year 1937 out of money to be raised during such current year by taxes.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to delegate to the Board of Selectmen, or to some other Board or Committee, the right to exercise the powers granted in Sections One (1) and Five (5) of Chapter 213, of the Public Laws of Maine, 1931, relative to Municipal Airport, the maintenance, operation, and regulation of same.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to give the town treasurer authority to sell all Tax Deeds remaining in his hands which have not been redeemed within the period prescribed by law, and authorize him for and in behalf of the Inhabitants of the town of Millinocket to assign these deeds to the purchasers.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to enter into an agreement with the Millinocket Water Company for a supply of water for fire protection and other municipal purposes. Also, to see if the town will vote to enter into said agreement in accordance with the terms and specifications of a form of agreement which will be submitted to the meeting, or what terms and specifications said agreement shall contain. Also, to see what duration of time shall be covered by said agreement. Also, to see if the town will authorize and direct its Selectmen to sign and

execute such agreement for and in behalf of said town with said Millinocket Water Company.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to fix the salary of the Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor, the Town Clerk, the Town Treasurer, the Town Auditor, the Health Officer, the Chief of the Fire Department, the Fire and Building Inspector, the Sealer of Weights and Measures, and the Milk Inspector, for the ensuing year. Also, to fix said salaries.

Article 33. To see what action, if any, the town will take relative to changing the location of the Town Dump. (By request).

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to secure permission from the Superintending School Committee, for the use of a room in the cellar of the Aroostook Avenue Schoolhouse for the purpose of making as near fireproof as possible, a vault for the storage of town records, and for this purpose, use such sums of money as may be necessary from the Selectmen's Office Account. Also, to grant them permission to use door of present existing vault in fire station, if needed for the purpose.

Article 35. To see what action the town will take relative to plowing the road leading from the Medway Road in a northerly direction to the buildings owned and occupied by Arthur H. Russell. (By request).

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to amend the following sections of Chapter twelve (12) of the by-laws of Millinocket, which Chapter relates to Hawkers and Peddlers :

- (a) To see if the town will vote to amend section one (1) of said chapter which now reads as follows: "No persons shall expose for sale or sell upon the public streets of the Town, nor go from place to place in the Town, exposing for sale and selling goods, wares, or merchandise, until he shall have procured a license so to do as hereinafter provided," so that as amended said section will read: "No person shall expose for sale or sell upon the public streets of the town, nor go from place to place in the town, exposing for sale and selling goods, wares, or merchandise, at retail until he shall have procured a license so to do as hereinafter provided."
- (b) To see if the town will vote to amend section two (2) of said chapter which now reads as follows: "The Selectmen may

grant a license to expose for sale or sell upon the public streets of the Town, or go from place to place in the Town, exposing for sale, and selling goods, wares, or merchandise," so that as amended said section will read: "The Selectmen may grant a license to expose for sale or sell upon the public streets of the Town, or go from place to place in the town, exposing for sale, and selling goods, wares, or merchandise at retail."

- (c) To see if the town will vote to amend section eight (8) of said chapter which now reads as follows: "The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to commercial agents or other persons selling by samples, lists, catalogs, or otherwise, goods, wares, or merchandise for future delivery, persons selling fish, farm, dairy, or orchard products, and persons selling bark, wood, or forest products, and persons selling newspapers or religious literature," so as amended said section will read: "The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to commercial agents or other persons selling by samples, lists, catalogs, or otherwise, goods, wares, or merchandise for future delivery, persons selling fish, or persons selling farm, dairy, or orchard products, of their own production, and persons selling bark, wood, or forest products, and persons selling newspapers or religious literature."

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to designate a plot of land on the town farm, or purchase with funds from the Miscellaneous Account, a suitable plot of land to be used, free of charge, by the Inhabitants of the town of Millinocket as a burial place for household pets. (By request).

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to elect or instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee to investigate the features of Town Manager form of Government, so-called, fix the number of members and their term of office, define their duties, and instruct such committee to report its findings at a Special Town Meeting to be held not later than December 15, A. D. 1936, such committee to serve without compensation or pay. Also, to see what action the town will take to defray the actual expenses of such committee. (By request).

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Overseers of the Poor to engage the services of a Welfare Worker, to

work under the supervision of the Overseers and perform such duties as may be legally delegated to said worker by them, and grant said Overseers the authority to fix the compensation of said worker and pay for the same out of the appropriation raised for Care of Poor.

Article 40. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Municipal Officers for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1936.

Article 42. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Selectmen's Office in Millinocket, in the "Gonya Block," so-called, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the twenty-seventh (27th), twenty-eighth (28th), and twenty-ninth (29th) days of February, A. D. 1936, from Nine (9) o'clock in the forenoon to Five (5) o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding on applications of those claiming the right to have their name upon said lists.
