## WARRANT

To Wiliam Tomlinson, a Constable in the Town of Rangeley, in the County of Franklin, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Rangeley, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Town house in said Town, on the first day of March, A. D. 1920, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

#### Article 1

To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

#### Article 2

To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

#### Article 3

To hear reports of Town officers and take action thereon.

#### Article 4

To choose all other Town officers for the ensuing year.

#### Article 5

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High school for the ensuing year.

#### Article 6

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.

#### Article 7

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purchase of text-books for the ensuing year.

#### Article 8

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairs of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

#### Article 9

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay for apparatus for the schools for the ensuing year.

#### Article 10

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

#### Article 11

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways for the ensuing year.

#### Article 12

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of bridges for the ensuing year.

#### Article 13

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for breaking winter roads for the ensuing year.

#### Article 14

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay the interest on Town bonds for the ensuing ytar.

#### Article 15

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to build and repair sidewalks in Rangeley village for the ensuing year, and how same shall be expended.

#### Article 16

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day, and how same shall be expended.

#### Article 17

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Library association for the ensuing year.

### Article 18

To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes, and if so, how much, and how much money shall be raised to pay discount.

#### Article 19

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay Rangeley Water Company for the use of water for the ensuing year.

#### Article 20

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.

#### Article 21

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay the expenses of office of the Selectmen for the ensuing year.

#### Article 22

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

#### Article 23

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Town officers for the ensuing year.

#### Article 24

To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the

question of apropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State aid, as provided by section 18 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

#### Article 25

To see of the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$732 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18, chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

#### Article 26

To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to pay the Oquossoc Light and Power Co., for one street light at or near each of the following places: White Schoolhouse, Oquossoc Station, corner of road leadign to the residence of Walter Weld and others, Walter Weld's residence, H. O. Templeton's residence, and point where highway from R. L. Spotts' summer residence joins County Road at Haines' Landing.

#### Article 27

To see if the Town will vote to have the streets in Rangeley Village sprinkled and, if so, to raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

#### Article 28

To see how much money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to pay on Town debt.

#### Article 29

To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to pay for plowing and improving land recently acquired for addition to cemetery and for building a suitable fence around same.

#### Article 30

To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more fire wards, as required by chapter 108 of the Public Laws of 1913, and to take any action relative to the same that the Town may vote.

#### Article 31

To see what action the Town will take in regard to paying or extending \$5,000.00 of Town Bonds that were due December 1, 1919; if payment is extended, to see what sum of money will be raised to pay interest on same for one year.

#### Article 32

To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for keeping cemetery mowed and for general upkeep.

#### Article 33

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the Town hall at 12:30 o'clock in the afternoon on the day of said meeting.

### SCHOOL REPORT

Committee, C. C. Murphy, James Mathieson, O. R. Rowe.

To the School Committee of the town of Rangeley.

Gentlemen:—The following is the fourth annual report of the schools of Rangeley since the Union was established.

The past year has been very uncertain and discouraging. It may be that the coming year will produce a more critical condition than the year just closing unless we prepare to prevent it.

In Rangeley we have a total of ten teaching positions. We have corresponded with seventy-three applicants for these ten places. Thirty-one of these seventy-three parties have been offered places in our schools. Twentyone declined the appointment after they had agreed to · "consider" it or "would accept if appointed" or resigned after they had signed a contract. During the year we have had fourteen different teachers in our schools—since September 1919, and we know not what changes to expect before June 1920. In every instance, except possibly two, so far as correspondence shows, the cause for these irregularities was the "salary". If this is true, and there is a danger of crippling our schools, we have no other remedy to suggest except larger salaries. The members of the committee are in common agreement to take the matter to the town as a straightforward business proposition. We are paying per package for examination paper .64 which formerly cost .27. Our blackboard crayon farmerly sold for .07 to .10 per gross now sells

for .27. Pencils have advanced more than 100%. Text books made a bold stride upward of 25% on Feburary 1, 1920. And yet we pay all this without a murmur and with no apology.

Three musical concerts or festivals have been held during the past year. The festival closing the schools in June 1919 was exceedingly popular and a very gratifying performance, which included as nearly as possible every child in Rangeley.

In September we admitted to our High School the children from both the eighth and ninth grades. This policy is in keeping with progressive towns, but it is a little early to pass judgment on the working of the plan for this year. It reduces the expense of maintaining the Town Hall school and cares for all our children in one building.

At the close of last school year the following young people were graduated from our high school.

1, Reba N. Hoar, 2, Rachel M. Huntoon, 3, Marion Wilbur, 4, Ethel L. Philbrick, 5, Carrie I. Russell, 6, Carman S. Quimby, 7, Ruth E. Hinkley, 8, Clinton A. Hoar, 9, Everett S. Ross.

We are paying Mr. Ira D. Hoar \$3.00 per day for actual service for conveyance in the Kennebago District. The number of children conveyed varies with the seasons. There are about 15, probably, for an average for the year

We are paying Mr. Fred Pillsbury \$2.00 per day for actual service for conveyance from his neighborhood. At the present time he is taking in four pupils.

Mr. George R. Pillsbury is receiving \$2.00 per day for actual service for conveying children from the White District. At the present time he is bringing in five or six pupils. Mr. Pillsbury feels that a larger compensation should be awarded him for the service he is rendering.

We are then paying \$7.00 per day for the conveyance of about 25 pupils. This is an average of about .28 per pupil per day. This discussion of conveyance has to do

entirely with children in our elementary schools.

The Teachers' Registers indicate that the following pupils have a clear record for attendance for the past year:—

The average salary paid to our elementary teachers at the present time is a little less than \$19.00 per week. The school officials are unanimous in asking that the town make it \$25.00. If this should be acceptable to the town we shall need for the coming year for elementary schools:
