REPORT OF ISLESBORO FREE LIBRARY

To the Chairman of the Selectmen:

1950. A new half-century finished. Many changes we have had in these years!

The library is active; books go out and books come in; the bulletin board has new items placed on it, of the town's doings and the nation's doings. Take the new home of the U. N. O., in New York, on 42nd Street near the river—its permanent home, at last. Town reports go to the bindery, also school reports, and any special items which one wants preserved.

A word right here as to a letter which I received from an old resident. She was speaking of the monument that commemorates the 1780 expedition to our town. (I think the monument was mainly set up by Mr. Tufts, our Baptist minister at that time.) She spoke of the British holding Castine, and thought they were very broad to let the Lincoln Galley land in Islesboro when we were at war with them.

One public-spirited man in our town is Mr. Wellington Bertolet, Hewes Point summer resident. The Soldiers' flag was in bad shape, and a new one was bought and presented to the town. Still another flag was given to the Sailors' Museum; that was also in bad condition. And a third flag was given to the Post Office. By whom? The same man. Hats off, boys, to Mr. Bertolet.

One of our boys is on the battleship "Missouri," which was stuck in the mud for a while but is now afloat. It is, I believe, the biggest battleship in the world.

Alden and Hollis, sons of our Librarian, are both doing well, one in the New England States and one in Indiana. Our Librar-

ian is very thoughtful of all her readers; she remembers who wants a book, and when.

Mr. Kimball takes good care of the fires—quite important this cold weather; and our lawn, in the good old summertime, is kept nicely mowed and trimmed by Mr. James Pendleton.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

I take great pleasure in making this, my first report, to the people of Islesboro. I have found the school committee, Mr. Benedict Kelley and the town's people very cooperative and very much interested in the education of their children.

The teachers, janitors, music teacher, health nurse and bus driver all contribute to the success of the schools.

We are very fortunate in having such a capable teacher and principal as Mr. William Irvine. The high school has run very smoothly and efficiently under his direction. Mr. Irvine has the interest of the pupils at heart and has broadened their interests and experiences by taking them on trips to play basketball and to visit various institutions. Miss Joy Aldrich and Mr. Thomas Burdin have also contributed to the fine work accomplished by the school.

The grade teachers have done a fine job and I submit a short report from each teacher.

Mrs. Arline Pendleton, Pendleton School, reports:

The Pendleton Primary school has nine pupils in the subprimary grade, seven pupils in the first grade, and sixteen pupils in the second grade. The classes have completed the amount of work mapped out for the school year up to date.

In addition to Mrs. Mitchell's music periods we have learned the usual folk dances and songs that teach music appreciation. We have a rhythm band practice once a week and the children enjoy this activity very much.

The projects that accompany the different subjects are completed in detail each month. The Friday afternoon assembly programs create poise and an easy manner in oral work.

Special stress is laid upon acquiring good study habits and finishing tasks that have been started. The children are taught

and encouraged to be courteous and considerate of others at all times.

The room is too small for the number of pupils and restricts many activities pertaining to primary group work.

We feel that a word of thanks is due the teachers' husbands for supplying the children with drinking water each day.

Mrs. Virginia Nichols, Pendleton School, intermediate room, reports:

There are six boys and four girls in the third grade, one boy and three girls in the fourth grade, and two boys and one girl in the fifth grade.

The room presented some problem at first which made progress slow but there has been a marked improvement in the progress made to date.

In November, all the pupils of the Pendleton School participated in an entertainment at the Town Hall. On the evening of December 23rd they presented a Christmas Operetta at the Community Hall under the direction of Mrs. Burr Mitchell, Music supervisor, and Mrs. Anson Williams.

The children have been up to the high school several times to see motion pictures. These pictures are very valuable aids in teaching besides affording some pleasure.

The school has been fortunate in having been able to secure several speakers. Mr. and Mrs. George P. Taylor of Calipatria, California talked on "Our Travels in the United States"; Mr. Henry Hatch talked on "Forestry"; Mr. B. Kelley talked on "Construction of Roads"; and a member of the State Police talked on "The Work of the State Police".

During the winter term a half pint of milk was served each child daily.

Dr.Hinckley administered typhoid, tetanus, whooping cough, and diphtheria immunizations and vaccinations to those who desired them.

Mr. Charles Nichols, grades six to eight in the high school building, reports:

There are six boys and three girls in grade six; seven girls in grade seven; and nine boys and two girls in grade eight.

The children are progressing satisfactorily in their grades. and have shown decided improvement since the beginning of the year.

In November the pupils united with those of the Pendleton School in giving an entertainment at the Town Hall.

The girls have had weekly basketball practice with Miss Aldrich as coach, while the boys have practiced with Mr. Irvine and Mr. Burdin.

From sixteen to twenty-five pupils have had a half pint of milk each day this term.

Recommendations for the coming year:

The second room of the Pendleton School should be painted this summer. That would make the room more attractive, easily cleaned and lighter for the pupils. The grammar school room in the high school building needs painting and the store room should be removed to give the grammar grades more room. There should be cupboards built in the laboratory to accommodate the laboratory supplies and do away with the confusion which results from students passing to and from the store room where it is now located, in the grammar school room.

The commercial room needs another light or so to help out on dark days.

Again I wish to thank all those people who have given their support to the educational program. It is only by the combined efforts of all the people that we can offer an education to the children that will help them to live successfully and be good citizens.

REPORT OF ISLESBORO HIGH SCHOOL

The enrollment of Islesboro High School has decreased somewhat this past year. The total enrollment is now 21 undergraduates and two post-graduate students. The breakdown by classes is as follows: Seniors, 2; Juniors, 3; Sophomores, 5; Freshmen, 11. The enrollment for the school year 1950-51 will increase to about 30.

The High School continues to offer three courses; including the General, Commercial, and College. It has been suggested to the superintendent that some steps be taken to include industrial arts at least on a part time basis to help in particular the boys who intend to remain in Islesboro.

It is encouraging to have two post-graduate students this year. Instead of being idle, both students, Frank Hatch and Betty Keller are endeavoring to improve themselves before they definitely decide what they want to do in another year. Frank presently plans to enter Gorham in the fall of 1950.

Both of the Senior boys have made tentative plans to continue their education beyond high school. I have strongly urged the seniors each year to make every effort to continue their education in one form or another. The importance of education beyond high school is very evident now; as the competition for employment constantly increases the requirements of many occupations.

During the present school year we have been very fortunate in having Mr. Burdin as our Math and Science teacher. His willingness to fulfill all phases of his work has been greatly appreciated. In the spring Mr. Burdin will serve as baseball coach. The high school was able to purchase 10 warm-up jackets for basketball, two footballs, two basketballs, one Ping pong table, two basketball nets and frames, Pingpong paddles, table tennis nets and a badminton racquet with the \$164.26 that was received from the sale of Town owned property over and above amounts due on tax liens. This gesture by the town was greatly appreciated. In addition to the above mentioned equipment, the high school is purchasing new baseball uniforms which will be paid for mostly by fund raising activities this spring.

I wish to commend Miss Aldrich for her continuous support and excellent work during the past year. It seems only proper to mention that a great deal of time has been given by Miss Aldrich and the high school students to the publishing of the Islesboro Observer. The cause is a worthy one and I'm sure we have all enjoyed reading our well written local paper which is so ably edited by Rev. Williams.

Again may I express my sincere appreciation for the valuable cooperation and support of all the citizens of Islesboro, to Superintendent Skidds, to members of the School Committee, to Stanford Robertson, and most important of all the students of Islesboro High School.

ANNUAL NURSING REPORT Town of Islesboro

The Public Health Nursing Service has been limited this year for two reasons, the existing shortage of available Public Health Nurses and the lack of an organized group of citizens interested in a Health Program. It is only possible to carry out an effective Public Health Nursing program when individuals in the community recognize the need for a more adequate Health Program and are willing to organize a group to help meet some of these needs. In spite of these handicaps, the nurse has visited your town 6 times.

Because of the handicaps, the program has been built around group activities. The nurse assisted at one Immunization Clinic in the school. 57 Audiometer tests to determine the percentage of hearing ability were done. 3 pupils were found to have a hearing loss. The schools have been visited 3 times, 6 conferences have been held with the Superintendent of Schools and teachers to discuss the health program and individual health problems.

Specialized services made available to the community were Crippled Children Clinics, Pediatric Clinics, Cardiac Clinics, Mental Hygiene Clinics and Chest X-ray Diagnostic Clinics. 6 persons have been X-rayed and 4 home visits have been made in interest of the Clinic patients.

This coming year, through a redistribution of towns assigned to the Nurse, each town will have a Public Health Nurse responsible for services offered to the community. This should mean that with the cooperation of an organized committee interested in a Public Health Program, your town can have a program that will more nearly meet the needs of the community.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Town Officials, School Personnel, and Health Officer for their assistance in making the health program available to the community.

REPORT OF ISLESBORO FERRY

The Ferry "Governor Brann" was sent to General Sea Foods yard in Rockland for annual overhaul. The repairs requested by the inspectors ran up a bill somewhat in excess of what was expected. The traffic during the summer months was somewhat heavier than it has been during the past few years. and it is appeared that this extra expense would be taken care of, however, the traffic this winter has been considerably less than in the past, so that the total income from fares, \$20,609.25, was about \$1,000-.00 less than the average for the past three years. This, with the added shipyard expense ends the year in red ink.

What next years repairs will be, or what the traffic will be, cannot be forecast with any degree of accuracy. However, expecting the repair bill to be lessened, the operating expense to remain about the same and anticipating the traffic to hold up to at least this years amount, it is believed that the fares will take care of the operating expense outside of Bonds, Notes, and Insurance.

In 1949 the town raised money to pay for one-half of the insurance, \$1,300.00, the total insurance of \$2,600.00 a year is being asked as an appropriation for 1950.

The Ferry committee met to discuss the pertinent business on March 21, March 31, May 31, and September 15th.

To the credit of the Ferry it should be stated that State owned, or controlled, vehicles and personnel, travel without payment of fares. This past year this traffic, computed at regular rates, amounted to \$1,285.25.

REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

I have been asked by several of the citizens to submit a report in behalf of the Fire Department, and in reply, submit the following:

The Fire Department has answered twenty calls during the year which were considered as alarms, a few more calls were answered during the summer season, while the Fire Patrol was in effect, but were not considered as alarms. These twenty calls consist of eleven grass fires, five chimney fires and four house calls.

Property damage resulting from these fires is limited to the Lilljequist house and barn, the barn being destroyed and the house badly damaged.

Since the Fire Engine was purchased by the town in 1939, the Fire Department has, at no cost to the town, with funds collected from the Annual Firemans Ball, plus contributions from the summer residents, purchased many important items of equipment for the use of the Department. Included are several hundred feet of hose, of the various sizes used on the engine, with proper fittings, one portable pump with accessories, several Indian fire pumps, smoke masks, rubber boots, raincoats, rain hats, liquids for the booster tank to make the more effective "wet water" chimney fuses for chimney fires, and furnished the gasoline used on the fire patrol of last summer.

The Department also has two more portable pumps with accessories, presented to the Department by Mrs. Marshall Field, a gift that is greatly appreciated.

The pump of the engine was completely overhauled this past year by the Maxim Motor Co., from whom the engine was originally purchased. This overhaul was paid for by the town out of the Fire Department appropriation, which, needless to say, shortened up on the funds for the year.

I wish to take time to personally express my appreciation for the assistance given me by the regular firemen, and all others for their valuable help at the fires during this past year. Thank you.

- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be paid to the State of Maine, Publicity Bureau in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95 R. S. Maine as amended.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to reimburse Mrs. F. R. Kellogg in part for the expense incurred in running a cable to Kellogg's Island.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to provide boat service from Grindles Point to Lincolnville Beach, at the time of the ferry is laid off for repairs.
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to procure a temporary loan or loans, not exceeding \$20,000.00, in anticipation of taxes, and to execute and deliver in the name of the Town its note, or notes therefor, said loan or loans to be paid during

the municipal year out of money raised by taxes during such municipal year.

- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any and all Real Estate acquired by the Town for the non-payment of taxes thereon, at such price, and on such terms, as they may deem advisable as being in the best interests of the Town, and to execute and deliver in the name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Islesboro, its Quit Claim Deed therefor.
- Art. 21. To see what wages the Town will vote to pay for men, teams and trucks for work on the highways for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Daylight Saving Time for the summer season of 1950, if such adoption is in harmony with adjacent sections of the State.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sections 46 to 60 inclusive of Chapter 80, of the Revised Statutes of Maine, as amended, providing for the election of Town Officers by secret ballot. Such action to become effective at the annual Town meeting of March, 1951.
- Art. 24. To see what officers the Town will vote to have chosen by such secret ballot.
- Art. 25. To see what action the Town will take regarding the disposition of the old Ferry engine, spare parts for same propellers and shafting now in the Town's possession.

- Art. 26. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the Town owned truck by voting on the following:
 - (a) To maintain the present truck
 - (b) To authorize the Selectmen to sell the present truck and appropriate the money so received to some account.
 - (c) To authorize the Selectmen to trade in the present truck on a new one, and to further vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to enable them to do so.
- Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to let snow removal work out to contract, and to further determine, if so desired, the conditions of such contract.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, lease, or rent, the Dark Harbor Schoolhouse, so called, and if so desired, to determine the conditions of such sale, rent, or lease.
- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to have the minutes of this meeting read before adjournment of said meeting.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to convey to the Town Manager any or all of the duties and powers as prescribed by law to act as Road Commissioner, Tax Collector, Treasurer, and-or Overseer of the Poor.

Art. 31. To choose, by written ballot, any or all of the following Town Officers not already provided for in Article 30.

Selectmen

Overseers of the Poor

Treasurer

Tax Collector

School Committee Member

Ferry Committee member, or members, as neccessary.

Art. 32. To choose, or authorize the Selectmen to appoint, any or all of the following Town Officers not already provided for in Article 30.

Constable

Fire Chief

Road Commissioner

Sealer of Weights and Measures

Clam Constables

Other necessary Town Officers
