

Rural School Betterment.

No man should find it necessary to remove from his farm home to educate his children. A good system of rural schools is Maine's best aid to the development of Maine agriculture.

A Program of Improvement.

The teacher:	A properly qualified teacher—with adequate pay—for every country child.
The building:—	A comfortable and attractive building, with proper heating, ventilation and lighting. Sani- tary out-buildings kept clean and decent through daily inspection.
The Grounds:—	Ample school grounds with plenty of space for play and some provision for school gardens.
The equipment:—	A full supply of good textbooks in clean and wholesome condition. A few up-to-date maps, a globe, necessary reference books including dic- tionaries, a school library with books both for the school and the community and a few good pictures.
The course of study:—	A reasonably, but not rigidly, classified or graded course of study, with adequate attention to the fundamentals, with large opportunities for hand work and with every possible connection between the experiences of the school and the actualities of life.
Supervision:—	Expert supervision—made possible to all towns through the system of unions of towns with state aid.
	The school building a social center, used under the leadership of teacher and superintendent to promote all the educational interests of the community.

The foregoing program is not radical. It involves only the fundamental points of a good school system. There is no reason why all these factors may not soon be realized by all communities as they are already realized by some. To accomplish them is the work of superintendents, teachers and public spirited citizens. Will You Help?

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee of Belgrade :

In accordance with the provisions of the State school laws, I herewith submit to you and to the Citizens of Belgrade my annual report for the town year, 1915-16.

HIGH SCHOOL

The High school has been in charge of the same teachers as in the preceding year and the work accomplished has fully justified the policy of retaining, for as long a time as possible, teachers who have demonstrated their ability and fitness.

The course of study has been broadened somewhat to meet the needs of our boys and girls and the standard of requirements has been raised. The work of the school has been highly satisfactory.

The total enrollment for the year was 34. During the present term there are 25, of whom three are tuition pupils.

COMMON SCHOOLS

With one exception, each school in town has been in charge of the same teacher throughout the year, consequently the loss due to frequent changes of teachers has been avoided. All our teachers are experienced and the work of the schools is steadily improving.

The length of the school year has varied from 30 to 33 weeks owing to local conditions governing the different schools. This somewhat longer year has been made possible by a larger State appropriation last year and larger tuition payments from Rome and Mt. Vernon. As these conditions are likely to be temporary, however, they cannot be depended upon as a permanent addition to our school fund. Many towns no better situated than Belgrade, are providing 36 weeks of school, and the average for the whole State is about 34 weeks, so we are still considerably below the average in that respect.

The course of study has been made more complete and much more has been required of the teachers in methods of instruction. A modern method of penmanship, based upon the muscular or forearm movement, has been introduced during the year and the pupils have made excellent progress in it.

The schools are now fairly well supplied with text-books but much supplementary material is needed. We hope to obtain this from time to time as our finances will permit.

The attendance during the winter term has been somewhat broken up, as is usually the case, on account of stormy weather, sickness, etc. The attendance for the year, however, has shown a marked improvement. Owing to the highly efficient services of our truant officer, Mr. Howard Gowell, the cases of truancy have been reduced to a minimum. There is still some room for improvement, however, in the attitude of some of the parents in this matter. There are a few parents who still keep their children at home quite frequently for a day or more at a time when it is not necessary at all. These absences sadly interfere with the efficiency of the school work and retard the progress of the pupil. Once in a while we hear the remark, "My child hasn't made any progress this term," or "My child hasn't learned anything since that teacher has been in the school," when, in nine cases out of ten, the child in question had been kept at home on one petty pretext after another, from one-third to one-half of the time and sometimes even more. It would surely require a wonderful teacher and a wonderful pupil to effect much progress under such conditions.

The attendance at the Lakeside school having fallen below the legal requirement of eight for the year, your school officials were required by law to close the school. The five pupils in the district are now being conveyed to the Washington school.

The eye and ear examination, as required by law, has been given during the year, and notice of defective sight or hearing mailed to parents. In many cases, even when the defects were serious, no attention has been paid to these notices. I wish there was some way to make every parent realize the importance of this examination and the serious results which may arise from neglect in attending to notices of defective sight or hearing. Eye trouble is much more prevalent and much more serious than ear trouble. Most of the cases of headache are due to eyestrain, which in time affects the nervous system to such an extent that the whole physical organization is upset. These defects of vision could be easily and cheaply remedied by competent medical advice if taken in time, whereas, if allowed to continue, they are liable to result in permanent and serious injury.

Repairs for the year included new blackboards in the High, Franklin, McKinley, New Century and Washington schools; new stoves in the High and Lincoln schools, new front porch, and repairing plastering at the High school; a new fence around the Washington school yard, and minor repairs at various schools.

As we could not secure the necessary help during the summer vacation we were unable to do some of the repair work which we had expected to do, but, by making arrangements in advance, we hope to complete all necessary repair work this summer.

Your superintending school committee recommends the following appropriations for the coming year, viz.:

High school	\$ 850 00
Common schools	$1,250\ 00$

Superintendent's salary	135 00

This represents a total somewhat less than last year. Having a balance to carry over in the common school account, we have asked for \$100 less than last year and hope that amount may be sufficient, especially if the tuition payments from the other towns continue.

We have asked for \$50 less than last year for repairs as we have a balance to carry over in that account. It must be borne in mind, however, that some of the work has been carried over from last year, also. Three or four of our school buildings should be painted this year. The Washington school needs new front steps and a thorough repairing. The toilet arrangements at the High school have been condemned by the State High school inspector, which will necessitate enlarging the shed and making a new vault. Several of the school yard fences are in bad shape and should be renewed. These items, with the usual minor repairs, will require the amount asked for.

In conclusion I wish to state that it is with a full appreciation of the increased interest on the part of the parents and citizens in their schools, and of their kindness and coöperation with the school officials, that this report is respectfully submitted.

WARRANT

To Percy H. Yeaton, Constable of the town of Belgrade.

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Belgrade, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Belgrade Grange Hall in said town on Monday, the sixth day of March, A. D. 1916, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

First — To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second — To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Third — To see if the town will vote to have one or more Road Commissioners.

Fourth — To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

Fifth — To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Sixth — To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of five hundred and thirty-three dollars (\$533.00) for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Seventh — To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State and State Aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Sections 9 and 18 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913. Eighth — To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for snow bills of the winter of 1915 and 1916.

Ninth — To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.

Tenth — To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the repairs of schoolhouses.

Eleventh — To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the purchase of school books for the ensuing year.

Twelfth — To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Thirteenth — To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of a Free High School for the ensuing year.

Fourteenth — To choose one member of Cemetery Committee.

Fifteenth — To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cemetery purposes.

Sixteenth — To see if the town will vote to grant and raise one hundred and thirty-five dollars (\$135.00) for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the ensuing year.

Seventeenth — To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for electric lights to light the streets at Belgrade Depot.

Eighteenth — To see if the town will appropriate and raise two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be expended on the road from John M. Cummings' driveway to John M. Weaver's driveway.

Nineteenth — To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars (\$100.00) from Edna Hutchins, the income of which is to be expended in the care of the lot of Parker P. Hutchins in Woodside cemetery.

Twentieth — To see if the town will accept one hundred dollars (\$100.00) from the estate of David A. Blaisdell, to be held in trust, the income only to be used for the care of his lot in Pine Grove Cemetery No. 2.

Twenty-first — To see if the town will vote to accept the list of names for jurors as prepared by the municipal officers.

Twenty-second — To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money for the use of the town, if necessary.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at Grange Hall, at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
