All the town Cemeteries have been cared for as usual. Part of the new cemetery on the Monson farm has been allotted, and some of the roads, walks, and driveways made or in process of construction according to the plan. A wire fence was erected to seperate the cemetery proper from the gravel pit and rock crusher plant.

Thirty-two Dollars (\$32.00) received from sale of lots this year to non-residents has been added to the Town Cemetery fund. Funds controlled by the town are as follows:—Hannah J. Bailey fund, \$300.00: Town cemetery fund, \$151.00, both of which are on deposit in Houlton Savings Bank. As appears above, the income from same was used with the Cemetery appropriation towards the care of cemeteries—that from the Bailey fund for care and maintenance of the Bailey lot.

As per vote of the town at a special meeting held July 8, 1905, about ix acres off from the East side of the Monson farm has been conveyed to the Catholic Church of Houlton, to be used for a Catholic Cemetery in conjunction with adjoining land purchased by said church for that purpose.

The barn was moved to the gravel lot, and a new basement made under same for storage of tools and road machinery. It will take about \$150.00 next year to complete the work needed on the barn and to paint it.

We trust the work of laying out the new cemetery will be continued according to the plans made therefor.

For cemetery purposes we recommend \$650.00 be raised.

Most of the work of cleaning up and filling in was done this year besides making a new covering over the Bailey Brook. The balance required, and grading, should be done next year, and then the walks made and laying out and planting done according to plans. The Selectmen have had plans made by a competent landscape architect, both for the Public Park and Cemetery. Also a planting plan for each.

If the town decides this year to elect Park Commissioners, we think they should have control of the town cemeteries as well as the park and other public grounds.

We recommend \$250.00 be raised this year for park purposes.

In addition to the above payment on town debt, the Third Town Water Bond of \$800.00, due May 1st, 1905, has also been paid from dividends received on Houlton Water Company stock, owned by the town, as appears elsewhere in this report.

The net decrease of town debt during the past year was

\$2.750.00.

There is \$3,625.00 of our town debt due in 1906, and an appropriation for like amount should be made to meet it. The Fourth Town Water Bond of \$800 oo matures May 1st, 1906, but same will be paid from dividends on stock of Houlton Water Company, as heretofore.

We again call the attention of the voters to the need of a sinking fund to meet some or all of our town bonds as they mature. It is a business proposition and we trust that it will be decided to start such a fund, and recommend that at least \$1,000.00 be raised therefor, this and each succeeding year.

At the last annual town meeting Albert A. Burleigh, Walter Cary, John B. Madigan, James K. Plummer, and Thomas P. Putnam were elected Trustees of the Cary Library for five years. Said Trustees organized by electing Walter Cary, President, John B. Madigan, Secretary, and Thomas P. Putnam, Treasurer.

At a meeting of the members of the Houlton Public Library duly called and held Nov. 24th, 1905, it was voted to pay to the town the money in the Treasury and to make over and give to the Cary Library all its other property, including books &c., which has been done. The books of the late Dr. George Cary, have also been added to the Cary Library.

The total number of books now in the Library is 4085, of which 692 were purchased by the Trustees during the past year. Number of books loaned from January 1st, 1905, to January 1st, 1906, was 16,455. Number of books loaned in January 1905, was 1444, in January 1906, was 1752; and the increase of patronage has been continuous and becomes more marked each year.

Miss Anna Barnes, Librarian, has made monthly reports, which have been published in the local newspapers.

Since February 12th, 1906, the library has been open from 9 to 12 o'clock forenoons, from 2 to 5 o'clock afternoons, and from 7 to 9 o'clock evenings of every week day, holidays excepted, and will continue open at said hours until further notice.

During the year \$1,000 was received from the Trustees under the will of Dr. Cary, of which \$990.51 was expended for books and the balance remains in the Treasurer's hands, the book account being kept separate from the general expense account of the Library.

Acting according to instructions of the town, by vote passed at special town meeting of July 8th, 1905, the School Committee and Selectmen purchased a large lot of land on Bowdoin Street, so-called, for school purposes, giving in payment therefor the amount appropriated and the old School lot on North Street. The new lot contains two acres of land and is bounded on the East, North and West by streets four rods wide, as laid out by said Putnam Bros. A building can be erected here that will accommodate 200 or 300 scholars or more and at the same time be nearer Market Square than any of our Town School houses, except the Grammar School.

Proceeds from sale of old school building on North Street,

can be used towards the construction of a new building.

The extra water pressure from Reservoir and the assurance of a competent supply, for any fire within the reach of the hydrants, is a matter of congratulation to all our citizens. The only increase in cost to the town being \$25.00 yearly for each new hydrant located. This has been more than offset, this year, by the saving in coal and other economies in the fire department.

The fire alarm system has also been a great factor in the fire losses. We think the fire protection afforded in the village should materially lessen the risks of loss, and on that account the rate of insurance be less than heretofore. Would it not be well for our citizens to ask for a readjust of Insurance rates, in some formal way, from the Fire Insurance Companies doing business in our village?

New buildings erected in Houlton during the past year were 71, and denotes a continual growth of the town. 62 buildings were erected in 1903 and 90 in 1904. But the value of those built in 1905 will probably exceed that of either the year 1903 or 1904.

The overdraw in this account is apparent rather than real, as there is more than enough due from private parties for concrete, labor, materials, and work done by town teams to off-set the above balance. Most of this will probably be paid between

date of this report and town meeting.

More than usual has been done on roads this year. As far as possible all sections have received a fair share, and good work has been done in all parts of the town. We believe one good man to conduct this department is better than several, and that one man can and ought to do better work than several with different ideas. Unless he knows the road business thoroughly, the town has to pay the expense of learning the ordinary Road Commissioner how and what to do. Each year a competent man holds the office should make him more valuable to the town. We believe the town should retain a capable Road Commissioner as long as it can and give him full control of the work. On this point we quote the following from Report of State Commissioner of Highways:

"We would like to see every town elect one road commissioner and give him authority over the roads, subject of course to general supervision by the selectmen, but this supervision only to extend to passing upon the expediency of unusual expenditure for specific purposes, such as permanently improving certain sections of road, and the general character of the im-This settled, the road commissioner should be left unhampered to carry out the work according to his own best judgment. He should be authorized to employ such foremen as may be necessary when it is desirable to prosecute more than one job at a time in order to take advantage of the season of the year or other favorable conditions for doing work. than one crew is employed the commissioner should have general oversight over each crew. He should lay out the work and see it often enough to know that it is being properly executed, and that each foreman thoroughly understands his instructions and is carrying them out. The road commissioner stands between the tax-payer and results, and too great care cannot be used in selecting the proper man. The best road builder in each

town is the man who should occupy the position."

The opening of Spring will find this department better prepared for road work and with more material on hand, than usual. For the usual work on roads, bridges, and sidewalks and Road-Commissioner, we recommend \$9,000.00; and for all new roads and extra road work, extra appropriation should be made.

Mr. Thomas Traviss is also at the farm, but pays his board

regularly and is not a town pauper.

Mr. and Mrs. Taggett have continued as Master and Matron. All the inmates are well cared for and everything is kept clean and in good condition; and at the same time the interests of the town protected by economical management.

The produce sold and board received have made the net expense of the farm less than for several years. The cost of paupers off of the farm and at Insane Hospital, however, was nearly double that of a year ago. But the pauper claims collected from the State and various towns have made our net pauper bills smaller than they otherwise would be. There is still something due on pauper account, both from the State and other towns, which if paid, would enable us to pay up in full the overdraft of last year and show a good balance still unexpended.

For support of the poor, pauper insane and town farm, we

recommend \$3,200.00 be raised this year.

As appears above, the dividends received on the Water Company stock owned by the town, have paid the interest on the Town Bonds given for the purchase thereof, and also paid the Third bond of \$800.00. By good management, it is expected that this can be done each year, until all said Town Bonds are retired, and thus make the Water Plant pay for itself and become town property without any outlay by the Town.

Much work in improvement of the plant and extending the water pipes was done during the year. Following is a statement of the extensions made and new pipe laid:

SERVICES.

Four services have been relaid with larger sized pipe, and 118 new services put in this year making a total of 675 registered since the system was first installed, 303 of which have been added since July 1st. 1902, when the plant was acquired by the town.

On account of the high pressure from the new reservoir several leaks have developed in service connections in the streets, the cost of these repairs have been charged to the service account. Two leaks in the main pipes have been repaired this being a better record than was expected with the additional pressure.

RESERVOIR.

The new reservoir on Pearce Hill has been completed this year and in service since July 23d, when water was turned on. It is built in a true circle 158 feet 7 inches inside diameter at the top, with an average depth of 133/4 feet, capacity 2,097,500 gallons when filled to overflow pipe one foot from top. It is divided by a cross wall 6 feet high so that one side can be cleaned out leaving a supply of about 350,000 gallons on the other side which is nearly three times as much as the old standpipe will hold.

The concrete wall is built in 30 feet sections to prevent cracking and allow for shrinkage. These sections were built alternately and bonded together by bars of iron and a system of tongues and grooves. The bottom is made of concrete in blocks 4 feet square troweled to a smooth surface, with a V shaped groove between each block. This is done to allow for shrinkage and prevent the blocks from cracking across the centres. It is intended to fill these V shaped grooves with roofing pitch or some other insoluble substance after the concrete is thoroughly seasoned. The reservoir is located in a ledge which was excavated in 1904 to a depth from surface varying from 4 feet to 11 feet. The concrete walls are on solid ledge which was thoroughly cleaned and washed. Seventy-five carloads of white sand and 2975 barrels of Alpha & Atlas cement were used in the concrete. This is more material than was at first estimated.

It was necessary to buy an extra piece of land in order to obtain sufficient earth grading to cover up the rock fill.

An iron fence 6 feet high is now being placed around the reservoir and is nearly completed, same going around the foot of fill at about 52 feet from wall.

Part of the lumber used to build the forms for reservoir has been used to build a storehouse on the pumping station grounds

and charged to that account.

Also a part has been used in sewer work which has been

credited to reservoir account.

Total cost of reservoir to date, including land, fence etc., \$28,107.26. \$500 of this amount, the price paid for the first piece of land, was charged to the Extension account, making the total amount of reservoir as shown by report, \$27,607.26.

This is \$2,020.42 more than the previous year. Our estimate in last year's annual report was \$2,225.00 per quarter. This coming year we think the rates will average at least \$2,-

700.00 each quarter.

The amount received from the rent of hydrants was \$3,191.62 and the amount received from the Houlton Electric Light and Power Company \$3,000.00, making the total income, including rents, &c, received, a little more than \$17,000.00 during the last year.

In addition to the above amount of cash on hand, there is some \$548.00 due on services, and a small amount for rates still uncollected.

The present indebtedness of the Houlton Water Company is \$130,000.00 as follows:—Bonds \$124,000.00, bills payable \$5,500.00. The first of the Houlton Water Co. bonds matured July 1st, 1905, being \$500.00, and was paid out of the earnings, according to calculations made therefor.

There will probably be some further extensions of the mains in different parts of the village, during the coming summer, but not on so extensive a scale as during the past three

years.

According to instructions from the town at a special meeting held last summer, a contract for electricity has been made by the Water Company with the Maine & New Brunswick Electrical Fower Company, Limited, to develop power at the Aroostook Falls and transmit electric current to the pumping station lot in Houlton, to be from there distributed by the Water Company to various parts of the village, for both light and power purposes. The pumping of water from the "B" stream to the Reservoir, also to be done by electricity instead of steam. To install and perfect this new lighting system and procure machinery and materials to construct same in all its parts, and for the purchase of new pumps required for same, a bond issue will be required, and an article has been placed in the town warrant for that purpose. We believe that electricity can be sold, from this source, at lower prices, than now given by our local Electric Companies.

One new flush tank has been added to the system on Spring street and one flush tank at intersection of Highland avenue and Washburn street.

38 new services have been laid this year which have contributed only a small portion to this year's sewerage rates as they were mostly connected late in the season and some buildings are not yet completed and occupied.

There is about seven hundred dollars worth of pipe on hand

that was not used in this season's work.

A beginning was made last year of the new extensions of Sewerage sytem, according to plans made therefor. It is proposed to continue this extension this coming summer, and some \$12,000.00 to \$15,000.00 is the estimate to be expended on same viz.:—To complete the main pipe line from Watson's starch factory to and along the west side of the river to connect with pipe now laid at outlet on the A. T. Putnam farm; to extend sewer pipe lines to North street, Bangor street. Kendall street, Union Square and Market Square, and other places where most needed and time and estimated income will allow. To pay for these extensions and for the extensions made last year, a bond issue is now being made, as per vote of town at 1905 annual meeting.

The annual income from services now connected with Sew-

erage system is about \$2,300.00.

The present indebtedness of the Company is \$11,566 45. viz: —\$1,566.45 paid for Mechanic street sewer, as per vote of town and per town report last year, and \$10,000.00 bills payable, for money hired to make extensions during the past season. Said bond issue to cover all this indebtedness and pay for new extensions made this year.

Twenty per cent dividend has been paid on the Sewerage Company stock this year, which has paid the interest on the Water Company bonds given to purchase the plant and also paid the first \$500.00 of said bonds which matured July 1st, 1905. This can be done each year until all said Water Company bonds, amounting in the total to \$18,000.00, have been fully paid, and thus without expense to the Water Company or to the town. It is estimated that the income from the new extensions contemplated, will more than pay the interest on the cost of the same.

The officers of the Houlton Sewerage Company are the same as those of the Houlton Water Company, viz:—Clarence H. Pierce, President; Joseph A. Browne, Treasurer; Clarence H. Pierce, Joseph A. Browne, Frank W. Pearce, Preston N. Burleigh, Thomas P. Putnam, Directors; and Birdsall B. Mc-Intyre, Superintendent. Each of said Directors own one share of stock of the Water Company and one share of stock of the Sewerage Company in their own name and right and by such ownership are qualified to act as said directors.

Auditor's Report.

In my duties as Auditor, I consider it incumbent upon me to make a careful examination and investigation of all the receipts and expenditures of the several town officers intrusted with these accounts, which includes the Selectmen, Treasurer, Houlton Water Co., Houlton Sewerage Co. and the Treasurer of the Cary Library. This I have done.

The town at its meetings in which every citizen has a voice, appropriates certain amounts for the necessary expenditures of the town which are classified under their respective heads. It is then the duty of the town officials to expend these amounts and render a correct accounting of the same, and in this they

have all been faithful in the discharge of their duties.

I would respectfully call your aftention first to the Selectmen's report, which is given in detail elsewhere in this Report. This is a clear and concise statement of each account and properly supported with vouchers down to the minutest amount. Each voucher bears the corresponding number of the order given for its payment. There have been 1183 orders given this year, amounting to \$88,474.25, including \$27,500 for temporary loans, to pay the debts of the town. These have all been paid excepting two, each for \$750, given to A. T. and M. D. Putnam, on one and two years time respectively.

The Treasurer's report shows his disbursements to have been \$107,666.17, which are supported by proper vouchers. I would invite your attention to the items of debit and credit in his accounts which refer to unpaid taxes and tax deeds the unpaid taxes amounting to \$18,267 27 and the tax deeds \$168.44. His report sets forth the amounts due each year on account of unpaid taxes and also gives the amount of each separate tax

deed.

The accounts of the Houlton Water Co. and Houlton Sewerage Co. deserve special mention. The system of book-keeping has been modernized and improved upon until it would be difficult to make further improvement. The detail in this accounting has been very large and it has been carefully and correctly done, and the management of the business of these Companies is, in my judgment, in good hands. Certainly, the book-keeping reflects credit on those having it in charge.

The Treasurer of the Cary Library, Mr. T. P. Putnam, has had about \$2000 to expend in books and the maintenance of the library, and these amounts are all properly vouchered.

Report of the S. S. Committee.

The annual enumeration taken in April, 1905, showed that there were 1544 scholars between the ages of 5 and 21 years belonging to the town. An increase of 100 since 1900. We have received from the State this year the sum of \$4,230.12, based upon this registration.

A complete detailed account of the receipts and expenditures of all school money can be found in the report of the Selectmen.

Nearly all of the rooms in the village schools are very much crowded. In two rooms in particular there are over 70 scholars registered in each. Forty-five scholars are all that most of the rooms were intended to accommodate and this number is all that one teacher can efficiently teach. Owing to the fact that there were over eighty at the beginning of the Fall term in the sixth grade we were obliged to hire a room in Mr. Frisbie's block to accommodate part of the grade. This necessitated the hiring of another teacher and janitor. The rent for this room is \$12.50 per month, not including heat and lighting.

The School Committee gave M. D. & A. T. Putnam the old school house lot on North street and \$1500 for a two acre lot back of it. This lot is bounded by Bowdoin, Maple and Hartford streets. For every school year, including the present one, that the present lot is used by the town the Committee

agreed to pay the owners \$100.00.

The North street school-house should be replaced by a modern and much larger one. There should also be a school-house built to accommodate that portion of the town between the B. & A depot and Fairview. With this additional room it would be possible to add a ninth grade to the course of study. This is a step that should be taken at once.

The school-houses throughout the town are all in very good condition. Painting and other general repairs, however, will be required upon some of the buildings during the summer vacation.

The common schools of the town have been in session 34 weeks during the past year, except when some of them have been closed for a short time on account of diphtheria.

The average attendance throughout the year has been good

except where sickness has interfered.

The teachers have worked with the same commendable zeal and earnestness that we have learned to look for from them.

FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

The teachers are:

Geo. C. Purington, Jr., A. B. Bowdoin College, Principal. Sciences and Mathematics.

William F. Coan, A. B. Bowdoin College. Latin and Greek.

Mrs. Belle L. Briggs. French, Arithmetic, Physiology and Bookkeeping.

Miss Bessie C. H. Cooper, A. B. Bates College. English

and History.

Miss May Sincock. Music.

There are three regular courses of study. The English course is intended to give those students who do not intend to continue their studies beyond the High School a thorough training in the common English branches and also in the sciences and higher English. Realizing the deficiency of students of the present time, in their ability to write and speak the English language well, an effort has been made to give as thorough a course in English Grammar, Rhetoric and Literature as possible.

The Latin-Scientific course includes the study of Latin in

addition to English and the sciences.

The College Preparatory course prepares pupils for admis-

sion to any college in the State.

Our school has been approved by the New England College Entrance Certificate Board, so that we now have the right to send pupils on certificate to all colleges in New England which admit students in that manner. While this is gratifying it must be understood that it makes necessary a strict system of ranking pupils who are candidates for certificates.

The High School has kept 36 weeks in the last year.

The fifth annual graduation occurred in the Opera House, June, 1905. As usual the exercises reflected much credit upon both the members of the class and teachers. Those graduating in the class of 1905 are:

Report of Road Agent.

To the CITIZENS OF HOULTON MAINE:-

I herewith respectfully submit to you my report. for the

past year as road agent.

The year was very favorable towards making and repairing highways inasmuch as the weather was all that could be desired. On petition from George Donnelly and others, the Selectmen located and laid out a road from the Letter B road north along lot lines to south line or land of said Donnelly, including in same the McSheffrey road, so-called, a total distance of about 1½ miles. Damages were awarded to David T. Armstrong, William Ross and Walter F. Niles. This road will accommodate all parties owning land there as well as the five dwellings located along it. I have cut out right of way, removed fences, and rocked the swamp at north end of said road. Used for this purpose two hundred fifty cubic yards of stone.

A large amount of gravel was used on the roads this year, from gravel pits, bed of stream and wherever it could be ob-

tained.

BRIDGES.

A new and substantial bridge was built at Cary's Mills. Some repairs been made on bridge across Moose Brook at Porter Settlement. This bridge must have extensive repairs next summer in order to preserve it. One abutment is in bad shape and both approaches should be repaired and filled in. It will take quite a little money to put this bridge in good condition.

The bridge across Hodgdon stream on Military road at

Cary's Mills was re-painted.

Iron bridge at foot of Union Square was partly re-covered and new walks built on each side of bridge. Iron bridge at foot of Mechanic street was partly re-covered, with new walks and stringers on one side. Have repaired bridge on Foxcroft road across Cook's brook but this bridge will need extensive repairs next summer. Bridge on John Smith road across Smith brook has been repaired and is now in good condition.

A new bridge will have to be built across Phalon brook on North road next season. A new bridge will have to be built on Pearce brook. Court St., also on Pearce brook, Columbia street. Bridge on Brook street was repaired the past season. Some repairs will be needed on approaches for this bridge and I have hauled rocks there for that purpose. Also the rocks are hauled for approaches for Columbia street bridge. Bridge across Pearce brook on Green street will have to be built over new next season. Rocks are hauled for the repairing of approaches of

this bridge. I would respectfully call your attention to bridge across Pearce brook on Bangor street, commonly known as the Cressy Bridge. This bridge will have to be repaired. A great amount of travel has to pass over this bridge. The sides of the road on each side of the water course, cave in more and more each year. Something must be done to stop this trouble as the travel on this street requires wider instead of a narrower street at this point. There are other minor repairs that will have to be made from time to time, aside from those enumerated above, on other bridges and culverts.

I have put in six new and permanent culverts composed of heavy iron piping; have repaired and replaced many others. Have used two carloads of sewer pipe in making new and repairing old drains.

SIDEWALKS.

The question of sidewalks in this town is a serious one. Every one who builds dwellings on new streets want sidewalks built. It costs lots of money to build and maintain them. I have not built any new plank walks the past season. Have repaired the old plank walks where needed. Have taken up a lot of old plank walks, filled in with rocks and gravel preparatory to covering with concrete.

The plank walk on Main street east of Burleigh street will have to be taken up next season and I have rocks on the ground to make the heavy fills with. Have laid concrete sidewalks as follows:

Private walks have been laid for various parties for which a charge has been made to cover cost of the work and material.

A test has been made with Asphalt for cossings with following result. Four crossings have been put down which proved very satisfactory as a whole. One crossing, in Union Square, was put down that has proved unsatisfactory. Probably due to mixing the material for part of this crossing.

ROCK CRUSHER.

I was unable to have use of the Crusher the past season as it was used on other town work, viz.—In crushing rock for construction of the new reservoir on Pearce Hill. When it was moved from there we had it put up near the gravel pit on County road where we will have plenty of material to use in operating it. We have a good rock-crushing plant, all except the roller. The roller we have weighs 4,000 lbs. The town ought to exchange the same for a good steam roller. I hope the tax payers will consider this important matter at the next annual meeting.

Tools.

The road and other tools belonging to the town are in good condition. I have been obliged to buy one sidewalk plow, two sand-heaters and other minor tools. In moving the barn on the Monson farm we were able to put a basement under the same in its new location, thus giving the town a good storage for tools.

MATERIAL.

I have bought and had delivered 6094 ft. of cedar to be used as repairs next season. This lumber is to be paid for from next year's appropriation. Have also contracted for bridge plank from M. Wilson on same terms.

We have on hand, 33 bbls. of tar, 5 bbls. of pitch, 6 ft. of 8-inch tile, 52 ft. of 2-ft. tile, 4000 brick, 150 sleepers, 2000 ft. hemlock planks. 1000 ft. hard pine, 2000 ft. spruce, all of which are paid for.

I respectfully refer you to the report of the Selectmen where you will find an accurate account of all money expended by me the last year. There are no outstanding bills to my knowledge.

Report of Board of Health.

The Board of Health of the Town of Houlton, respectfully submit their annual report for the year ending March 1st, 1906.

There have been reported to the Board during the year, contagious diseases as follows: Small Pox. 3 cases, no deaths; Typhoid Fever, 9 cases, 1 death; Diphtheria, 19 cases, 1 death; Scarlet Fever, 7 cases, no deaths; Measles, 2 cases, no deaths.

Whooping-cough is not as a rule, reported, but we have tried to keep it out of the schools as much as possible. This is found to be very difficult, as the disease begins so mildly that a child goes to school several days before the trouble is recognized.

Although we have had three (3) mild cases of Small Pox imported into our midst, there have been no cases developed from them. It is also gratifying to note the gradual decline of the number of cases of Typhoid Fever during the last few years. This is undoubtedly due to the improved sanitation, and the development of the sewer system.

In this connection we would respectfully recommend that the sewer system be extended as rapidly as possible into such places as have no natural drainage. We would also suggest that the outlet be carried further down stream, some distance below

the Foot Bridge, so-called.

The epidemic of Diphtheria during the fall, seemed to be due to some mild and unreported cases that we could not trace. Everything possible was done to stamp it out as quickly as possible without interfering with the schools. In this we believe we have been successful, as there have been no cases during January and February.

The school house on North street is in a very unsanitary condition, and we believe is responsible for some of the cases of Diphtheria, and we would recommend that something be done to put this building in better shape.

We wish again to thank the Physicians and others, especially the School Superintendent, for valuable aid in our work.

WARRANT

To WILLIAM H. GUIOU, one of the Constables of the Town of Houlton, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said Town of Houlton, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs. to assemble at Heywood's Opera House, in said Town, on Monday, the nineteenth day of March, 1906, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more Road Commissioners, and what sum of money will be raised for services of said Commissioner.
- ART. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and other necessary expenses of the Town for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of schools.
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairs upon school houses and how the same shall be expended.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purchase of school text books.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the services of the Superintendent of Schools.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of a free high school for the ensuing year.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for School apparatus and appliances and insurance on School Buildings.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for support of Cary Free Library.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the repairing and building of roads, bridges and sidewalks.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to be expended on the "State Road."

- ART. 14. To see if the Town will accept a town way leading from the Letter "B" road, so-called, northerly on the dividing line between Ranges Eight and Nine in the North Division of Houlton, as laid out by the Selectmen, on the 22nd and 29th days of May, 1905, on petition of George F. Donnelly and 47 others, and what sum of money the Town will raise to complete said way and pay land damages for same.
- ART. 15 To see if the Town will vote to build a new school house on the school lot on Bowdoin street, so-called, and what sum of money will be voted therefor and how the same shall be raised and expended.
- ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to buy a steam road roller and what sum of money will be raised for that purpose.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for lighting the streets of the village, town hall, engine house and town lockup.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department, and rent of hydrants.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for police and police department.
- ART. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for observing Memorial Day.
- ART. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Militia purposes.
- Aki. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise toward paying off the town debt.
- ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a loan or loans for the purpose of paying the debts of the Town.
- ART. 25 To see if the Town will vote to establish a Sinking Fund, and what sum it will raise therefor this year.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will elect Three Park Commissioners according to the Statutes, and what sum of money the Town will raise towards grading and laying out the Public Park, and for other park purposes.

ART. 27. To see if the Town, as owner of 1,995 shares of stock of the Houlton Water Company will instruct the Selectmen at any legal meeting of said Houlton Water Company to vote said stock for and in behalf of the Town in favor of the following propositions:

FIRST. To elect Directors of said Houlton Water Company.

SECOND. To construct new works and extend, repair and improve the present works of said Company to such an extent and amount as to said Directors may seem wise and prudent.

THIRD. To pay the existing debts of said Houlton Water Company.

FOURTH. To issue bonds of said Houlton Water Company to an amount not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars, to aid in said construction, extensions, improvements and repairs of said works and the payment of said debts and to authorize the Directors of said Water Company to fix the date, amount, denomination, rate of interest and maturity of such bonds and to execute, negotiate and issue them.

FIFTH. To issue bonds of said Houlton Water Company to an amount not exceeding Thirty-five Thousand Dollars, for the following purposes, viz:—To contract for, buy, make, generate and use Electricity and to transmit, conduct, distribute, sell and supply such electricity in the Town of Houlton, and to build, erect, construct, maintain and operate necessary works and lines of wires and to purchase and procure all machinery, apparatus or other material needed therefor; and to authorize the directors of said Water Company to fix the date, amount, denomination, rate of interest and maturity of such bonds and to execute, negotiate and issue the same.

ART. 28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen for and in behalf of the Town to vote such stock of the Sewerage Company as may be owned and controlled by the Town, by virtue of its ownership in said Houlton Water Company in favor of the following propositions:—

FIRST. To elect Directors of said Houlton Sewerage Company.

SECOND. To construct new work, repair, extend and improve the present works, to such an extent and amount as to the Directors of the Sewerage Company may seem wise and prudent.

ART 29. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to paint and repair the Town Hall building and the barn and storage building on County road.

- ART. 30. To see if the Town will accept that part of Putnam Ave., so-called, that runs west from North St., so-called, Bowdoin St., and Mapie St., all four rods wide, as shown on plan of Putnam's Addition to the village of Houlton, made by P. N. and E. E. Burleigh May 17, 1905, and on file in the Aroostook Registry of Deeds.
- ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Section 22 of Chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes as amended by Chapter 148 of the Public Laws of 1904, of the State of Maine, relating to voting shelves and compartments with swing doors
- ART. 32. To see what instructions the Town will give the Assessors as to assessment of taxes on the Hospital building erected by Dickison & Gibson
- ART. 33. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to establish a Town liquor agency.
- ART. 34. To see if the Town will accept deed from George L. Bidwell, dated June 16th, 1905, of Hillside street, Reservoir street and Outlook street, so-called, each forty feet wide, as shown on plan of Broadview Heights, so-called, according to surveys made by E. E. Burleigh, June 8th, 1905.
- ART. 35. To see if the Town will adopt the following town ordinance for the preservation of good order and police regulation:
- SECTION 1. No person shall offer for sale and sell any goods, wares, fruit or other thing, except wood and local farm products, at public auction or otherwise in any street, lane, or upon the sidewalk or other public place within the Town of Houlton, without a written permit from the Selectmen, or some person by them authorized.
- SECTION 2. Any person who shall be guilty of a violation of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay a sum not less than One Dollar nor more than Twenty Dollars, on complaint before any Trial Justice. It shall be the duty of Police Officers to enforce the same.
- ART. 36. To see if the Town will vote to sell all that part of Lot No. 12. Range 8, in the North Division of Houlton, lying east of the center of the horseback running across said lot, containing 40 acres, more or less, and will authorize the Selectmen, for and in behalf of the Town to make and execute deed thereof.
- ART. 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of jurors prepared by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Clerk.
 - ART. 38. To see if the Town will fix a time when taxes shall be

due and payable; and will vote to make any discount upon taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what per cent.; also to fix a time and rate for interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid.

ART. 39. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen, whereby they have abated the taxes published in the Town Report, March 1, 1906.

ART 40 To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as published by the Selectmen, March 1, 1906.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Selectmen's office in said Town, on the 15th, 16th and 17th days of March, 1906, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
