There are always some outstanding bills at the close of each year which are not presented for payment in season to be included in the annual report. This year we have tried to settle bills as soon as due, and we made special effort at the end of the year to call in and pay all proper claims, in order to leave a clearer field for our successors. This however makes the expenses for the past year seem larger than they actually were; about \$900 of the expenditures were for old bills (\$477 for poor, \$65 for poor farm, \$160 for roads, and \$190 for contingent expenses); the decrease of the debt *during the year* is for the same reason not so large by some hundreds of dollars as it would otherwise have been.

The amount received this year from poor farm sales (\$96.03) appears much smaller than the receipts from the same source last year (\$351.91); but the latter sum was much increased by the sale of cows, hogs, sheep, &c., while the \$96 is money received from the sale of butter and eggs only.

The condition of the suits at law in which the town is interested is as follows:

Fairfield vs. Old Town. This action was finally decided against us, the Court refusing to grant us a new trial.

State vs. Old Town. Mrs. Conway's indictment. Still pending.

Doyle vs. Old Town. Still pending.

Severance vs. Old Town. Still pending.

Old Town vs. Samuel H. Blake. Mr. Blake declined to pay certain taxes, on the ground that the valuation was too high and that the property was not properly described by the assessors. The case was carried to the full bench and was decided in our favor. Mr. Blake has since paid the taxes and the costs.

Old Town vs. J. M. Lord's heirs. Still pending.

Old Town vs. Jos. S. Smith. This was a tax-suit, which was settled by Gen. Smith before it came to trial.

Eugens King vs. E. R. Alford, Collector. Suit arising out of the arrest of King by the collector for refusing to pay his poll-tax, in which the town assumes the defence. Still pending.
