

Balance in treasury...

In preparing this report we have tried to give a clear and accurate account of the expenditures for the past year. We regret exceedingly that the road accounts have been overdrawn so heavily but it has seemed unavoidable under the present system, as many times there are several hundred dollars worth of orders out that the Selectmen have no knowledge of. We would respectfully suggest to the incoming board to have a weekly report from the road commissioners, stating parties employed on the highway, giving their time and the work accomplished. This information, with a small amount of bookkeeping in the selectmen's office, would show at all times, the standing of each commissioner. Road maintenance is one of the great problems of the day and one that

will give us more than our share as we have not the materials available or good surface conditions.

Several of the larger bridges will need extensive repairs this year so that it will be necessary to increase the amount for this account this year.

The town has no outstanding notes, bills or liabilities of any kind. The balance in the treasury should, under ordinary conditions, last through the year.

West Gouldsboro, Maine, Feb. 10, 1917. To the Members of the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Gouldsboro:

I have the pleasure of submitting my second annual report of the condition of our schools and of the work done during the past year.

We have striven to bring the schools not only to a higher standard of efficiency, but also to find the weak points in the system.

In a well regulated school system there should be definite progress from year to year and from grade to grade. That is, there should be a continuous line of upward growth from the first grade to the high school. One of the greatest weaknesses of the Gouldsboro school system has been the breaking of this line. There have been too many places either above or below the normal line of progress. It has been our problem for the year to find these places by observation and conferences with teachers and then to make a conscious effort to remedy the condition.

One of the best measures of the success of teaching is the number of pupils who are repeating the work of any grade. Of course, this assumes that the work of the grade is not too difficult for that age; in other words, that the course of study is adapted to the child's ability.

During the present school year the per cent. of repeaters

is 6.4 per cent.

This is fairly low and can be made lower by individual promotion of pupils when they are capable of doing the work; by semi-annual promotions and attention to individual differences in pupils. When we consider that two years ago more than 9 per cent. of the pupils were repeating the work and in previous years a higher per cent., we may rest assured that progress is being made.

By establishing the school at Gouldsboro Point, the S. S. Committee saved, at the least calculation, \$200.00 of

the common school money.

Not only have they saved the town money, but have given more satisfactory school privileges to the people in that vicinity.

We would strongly advise the continuance of this school.

Teachers and Teacher's Improvement

A complete list of the Gouldsboro teachers is given with their training and experience. On the whole it is a strong list. Most of them have had some professional training, and several are normal graduates.

While this is not the only test of a teacher's worth to a community, yet we must admit that other things being equal, the trained teacher has the advantage, especially if she also

has had some experience.

We have been pleased with the manner in which the teachers have responded to opportunities to secure professional advancement. During the fall term two district meetings were held, one at West Sullivan and one at Sorrento. Both these meetings were very helpful to all who attended.

Nearly all the teachers attended the County Convention held in Ellsworth in January.

Most of our teachers are getting a professional attitude toward their work and are not willing to rest upon low standards of work in any subject, but express a sincere desire to improve their teaching power and to study their problems in the light of modern methods and tests.

Text Books

During the past year we have paid from two to four times as much as formerly for paper and supplies for the schools. That is, it now takes \$3.00 to buy what \$1.00 would pay for two years ago.

The text book publishers have also announced an increase in price of 25 per cent.

During the past year we have paid the overdraw from the preceding year and introduced new language books into a few schools.

It is absolutely necessary to change the arithmetics this year or buy an entirely new supply of the present kind, and the exchange plan is by far the better of the two.

Repairs

During the past year a concrete platform was laid at the Corea schoolhouse, and the interior of the Prospect Harbor and Gouldsboro buildings given a much needed coat of paint. This work, with minor repairs, was the only work attempted, owing to the scarcity of labor and the high cost of material.

The State is now entering into a campaign for "Better School Buildings," and I am publishing a copy of a report on the condition of one room school buildings that I have recently filed with the State educational department. The State department recommends that we remodel one building each year and is willing to assist us to the full extent of its power, and it seems to me that it is a good business proposition to take hold of this matter and adopt a program to remodel and modernize one school building each year.

In closing, I wish to thank the school board, teachers and citizens of the town for their splendid support and cooperation.

I wish to assure you of my best service for the coming

year.

TO JOHN F. JONES, CONSTABLE OF GOULDSBORO, IN THE COUNTY OF HANCOCK:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify the inhabitants of the Town of Gouldsboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday, March 5th, A. D. 1917, at 10 o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2—To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3—To hear report of town officers and act thereon.

Article 4—To choose selectmen and assessors for the ensuing year.

Article 5—To choose overseer or overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.

Article 6—To see if the town will vote to fix compensation of collector and treasurer.

Article 7—To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 8—To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 9—To choose one member of the superintending school committee.

Article 10—To see if the town will raise a sum of money for teachers' meetings, to be expended under the direction of superintendent of schools.

Article 11—To raise money for salary of superintendent of schools.

Article 12—To raise money for school books.

Article 13—To raise money for repair of school property.

Article 14—To choose constables for the said town.

Article 15—To choose fence viewers for said town.

Article 16—To choose harbor masters for said town.

Article 17—To choose pound keepers for said town.

Article 18—To choose surveyors of lumber and measurers of wood and bark for said town.

Article 19—To choose fire ward or wards for the ensuing year.

Article 20—To see if the town will nominate by ballot, three road commissioners, one for Gouldsboro district, one for Prospect Harbor district and one for West Gouldsboro district.

Article 21—To choose all other necessary town officers.

Article 22—To raise money for support of poor.

Article 23-To raise money for common schools.

Article 24—To raise a sum of money for repair of roads.

Article 25—To raise a sum of money for repair of bridges.

Article 26—To see if the town will raise a sum of money for cutting bushes along the highway.

Article 27—To see if the town will vote Yes or No on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Article 28—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19, of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Article 29—To see if the town will instruct the road commissioners to construct one stone culvert in each district.

Article 30—To see if the town will raise money to help defray the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 31—To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay all overdraws.

Article 32—To raise a sum of money for the contingent fund.

Article 33—To see if the town will vote to put in a suitable crossing at James A. Hill's driveway and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 34—To see if the town will raise the sum of \$500 to be expended on the road around Gouldsboro Point. Beginning at the town line near the residence of J. R. Perry, thence to the corner near the residence of O. W. Whitaker, thence to the town road at Chicken Mill (so-called) and a branch road from Whitaker's Corner to the residence of J. B. Shaw.

Article 35—To see if the town will pay \$5.00 for double team and \$2.00 for men, per day, for labor on the town roads.

Article 36—To see if the town will raise a sum of money to build one hundred feet (100 ft.) of road in Corea, leading to Winslow Young's house.

Article 37—To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to lay out and build a section of road at Bunkers Harbor, beginning at the terminus of town road in Bunkers Harbor to the residences of Arthur Rice and Charles Noonan and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 38—To see if the town will raise a sum of money for repairs of road from Birch Harbor to Bunkers Harbor.

Article 39—To see if the town will raise a sum of money to purchase an adding machine for the selectmen's office.

Article 40—To see if the town will raise a sum of money to purchase a fire proof receptacle to preserve the town records.

Article 41—To see if the town will vote to hold its annual meeting in March, 1918, at Columbus Hall, Prospect Harbor, in said town.

Article 42—To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to make temporary loans if necessary.

Article 43—To act on any other business that may come before the meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the Town House, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.
