# Report of Supt. of Schools

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TO THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE AND  
CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF HOPE:

I herewith submit the annual report of the condition of the schools for the past year.

The degree of progress made by pupils in their respective studies depends quite largely upon the ability and faithfulness of the teacher. She is by far the greatest single factor in a successful school. Her influence has a decisive effect upon the child's habits and thoughts. His whole future is often determined by the teacher's advice and personal example. Children readily copy the ways and manners of the teacher, repeat her thoughts and all unconsciously reproduce her mental attitude. On my visits to the schools, not only here but elsewhere, I have seen this fact demonstrated again and again. The teacher who is quiet, unobtrusive, speaking in gentle tones, yet alert and forceful, causes a similar reaction on her pupils. The one who is nervous, tense, hurried, exacting, talkative, produces a like condition of mental strain in her pupils.

It is, therefore, important to secure and retain the services of good teachers. I am glad to report that we have been fortunate in this respect in having good teachers. Discipline has been good, pupils have made progress and an excellent spirit has prevailed.



## HELPING TEACHER

I wish to call your attention here to the work of the helping teacher and to say that it offers an effective aid to school progress. She has visited all schools in town Saturdays, no school being held Monday of that week.

In order to explain her work I will quote from her report of one day's visit to one of the schools.

Taught fifth grade arithmetic.

Made suggestions for teaching English.

Gave a talk on sanitation.

Had physical exercises.

Taught music.

Had pupils salute the flag.

Supervised hot lunch and played games with the children at noon.

Took out suggestions and patterns for seat work.

Of her visit to another school she says:

Observed arithmetic work in fifth and seventh grades.

Had physical exercises; wrote them out in full for the teacher.

Heard primary reading classes. They have made remarkable progress during this (fall) term.

These extracts are sufficient to show the quality of the work she is doing and the assistance it offers, especially to untrained teachers.

## PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Under the present law instruction in physical exercises and recreational games is required; and in order to secure the best results I would recommend that another year the several towns of this district unite in employing a director of physical education. The state will reimburse towns to the amount of one-half of his salary,

not to exceed eight hundred dollars.

A small appropriation only would be necessary. The other towns made appropriations last year.

### TEXT BOOKS

For text books I would recommend a substantial increase in the appropriation over that of last year. School supplies, paper, crayon and seat work for primary pupils are also paid for from this account. Considerable reading material, histories, spelling books and physiologies are needed.

### REPAIRS

At South Hope new out-buildings were erected during the summer according to plans specified in the state law requiring all toilet facilities to be re-modeled not later than the first day of September, 1924, according to methods prescribed by the state. Other minor repairs have been made leaving a large unexpended balance. However, for another year the appropriation should not be lessened as the money is all needed for new out-buildings and for changing the lighting of all the school houses. In order to have the new requirements completed by 1924 it will be necessary to remodel one each year.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the support you have given to your schools and to invite the continued co-operation of all citizens in the interest of good schools.

# Town Warrant

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## STATE OF MAINE

KNOX, SS.—To J. S. Pease, a constable in the town of Hope, in said County.

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Hope, qualified by law, to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday the 13th day of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting,

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the reports of town officers.

Art. 4. To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To choose member of the school committee.

Art. 6. To choose a sexton.

Art. 7. To see what method the town will take to repair the roads for the ensuing year.

Art.. 8. To see if the town will vote to have one, two or three road commissioners.

Art. 9. To see what method the town will take to collect the taxes for the ensuing year.



Art. 10. To choose a collector of taxes.

Art. 11. To choose a treasurer.

Art. 12. To choose one or more constables.

Art. 13. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of schools.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for tuition of scholars at secondary schools.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to purchase text books.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of school buildings.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads and bridges.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads in winter.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money per hour the town will vote to pay for labor on the highways.

Art. To see if the town will vote yes or no, on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for improvement of section of State Aid road, as outlined in the report of the State highway commissioners, in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.



Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town expenses.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay to town officers.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Treasurer of the town to borrow on the faith and credit of the town, from time to time, such sums of money, as may be necessary for the payment of town charges and to give the notes of the town for such sums to be paid during the municipal and current year, such notes to be countersigned and recorded by the selectmen.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to sell the Alford school house (so called).

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a term of years, the factory formerly owned and operated by F. L. Payson & Co.

Art. 30. To act on any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at at the Town House, at ten o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
