



SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the Citizens of Bluehill:

The superintendent of schools hereby submit the following report:

Number of persons belonging in town between the ages of 5 and 21 years, April 1, 1909, 487; number of different pupils registered in the spring term, 254; in the fall term, 232; in the winter term, 218. Number of schoolhouses in town, 18; number of schoolhouses for school purposes, 17; number in good condition, 12.

Number of different teachers employed during the year, 31; number who are residents of Bluehill, 22; number who are non-residents, 9; number of teachers who are graduates of normal schools, 4; number of teachers who are normal school students, 4; number of teachers who hold State certificates, 15; number of teachers continued in the same school for the year, 7; number of teachers who had had previous experience, 24; average wages of teachers per week, \$7.63.

The above statistics are for the common schools.

Pupils who passed the entrance examinations for Bluehill-George Stevens academy in 1909 are: Marion B. Simpson, South Bluehill school; Alice A. Osgood, Dora A. Leach, Charles Parker, Beech Hill school; Elinor Howard, Mildred Bisset, Belle Davidson, Granite school; Chester Candage, Morgan's Bay school; Leon Cooper, Roy V. Grindle, Thomas Grieve, jr., Warren Kane, Walter T. Robertson, Percy Saunders, Walter Stover, Bluehill grammar school. All pupils in the

above list entered the academy at the opening of the fall term.

SCHOOLS WITH AN AVERAGE ATTENDANCE BELOW EIGHT.

A school that does not maintain an average attendance of eight pupils for the year is discontinued by law, and cannot be continued unless the town so votes.

The schools in districts 2, 6, 10, 11, 14, 15, 17 and 20 have not averaged the required number the past year, and so I have had inserted in the town warrant the following article: "To see if the town will vote to continue the schools in districts 2, 6, 10, 11, 14, 15, 17, and 20."

This is a very important article, and should be given careful consideration. For the benefit of the voters of the town, I will give the names and ages of the pupils who will attend school in the above districts provided the schools are continued. The ages given will be the ages of the scholars on April 1, 1910.

The purpose of the above list is to show the number of scholars to be provided for in these districts next spring. As can be seen, some of the precincts have more than eight pupils to attend school, but the average went below eight the past year chiefly because of sickness. This is especially true of district 20. In district 17 the parents of some of the scholars moved to South Brooksville during the spring term, and did not return until late in the school year. This absence partially accounts for the low average of the school in that precinct.

In district 15 all the scholars, with the exception of Nellie Hinckley, have been very regular in their attendance. She was obliged to remain at home a great deal on account of illness.

District 11 has tried very hard to maintain a good average, and has fallen below the required number by a small fraction. There are some small children in the precinct who will attend school next spring for the first time, and will no doubt be the means of giving the school an average of eight or more the coming year.

The scholars in districts 2, 6, 10 and 14 are, as a rule, very regular in their attendance, but you will see in looking over the lists that it is impossible for them to average eight if they are all present every day.

NEW GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

At a special town meeting held last spring it was voted to hire the old academy for grammar school purposes, provided the trustees would have it thoroughy repaired and rent it to the town for a period of ten years. The rent agreed upon is not to exceed \$75 per year. The building has been put in first-class condition, and much credit is due the trustees.

This school supplies a long-felt want in the village. For years two teachers have been trying to do the work of three, and the results accomplished were far below what were really required. The teachers who have been employed the past three years worked very faithfully, but it was impossible to do good work under such conditions.

As much work can be accomplished in twenty weeks in this school as was done in thirty weeks when intermediate and grammar grades were combined. The first term opened Oct. 11, 1909, under the instruction of Miss Augusta C. Leighton, and continued for nine weeks. Whole number in attendance, 21; average number, 20; not absent, 9; wages of teacher, \$13 per week. The winter term opened Jan. 10, 1910, with Miss Leighton as teacher, and is still in session. The length of the term will be ten weeks.

EYE AND EAR TEST REQUIRED IN ALL TOWNS.

Your attention is called to chapter 73 of the public laws of 1909, entitled: "An act relative to the appointment of school physicians." You will note that section 6 of this act provides that in all towns of the State, except those having a population of 40,000 or more, eye and ear

tests are required. There is no expense to the towns in making this examination. The material, with directions for making the tests, is supplied on application to the State superintendent of schools. All examinations given in the Bluehill schools have been under my supervision, and parents of children whose eyes or ears should receive competent medical attention will soon be notified.

TEXT-BOOKS.

Whenever a contagious disease breaks out in a community, the report is at once circulated that the person afflicted took it from the school-books, and immediately it is suggested that the school officers burn all the books. Now, school-books are expensive, and the appropriation for books will have to be large if we are to destroy all books in a school every time a case of scarlet fever, measles, whooping cough, itch or a louse makes its appearance in a precinct.

There is no State law that forbids the taking of books from one school to another. It is absolutely necessary for schools to exchange books to a certain extent. If a set of readers is no longer needed in a school and they are in good condition, I know of no reason why anyone should object to having them taken to another school where they may be of service, provided the books have not been in the hands of pupils afflicted with some contagious disease. Some people who object so strongly to exchanging text-books will peruse books and magazines belonging to a public library, and never think for a moment that the volumes may have been exposed to contagion.

It has been currently reported that the scarlet fever cases in the Beech Hill school and Bluehill grammar school were caused by books brought from South Bluehill school, but the report is false. I do not believe any sick-

ness that has occurred in Bluehill during the past three years was caused by school-books used in the common schools. I inspect the books very frequently, and whenever I learn that a set of books may contain the means of spreading disease, great care has been taken to keep them from the hands of the pupils.

A careful record of the books has been kept, and whenever second-hand books have been taken to a school I have been sure that they were all right. Any book that I was the least suspicious about I have never taken from one school to another. It costs the town about \$400 per year for text-books and supplies. If we are to burn all books in a school every time a contagious disease is reported in the precinct where said school is located, it will be necessary to have an appropriation of \$800.

REPAIRS.

For repairs the sum of \$500 was appropriated. In district 4 the exterior of the schoolhouse was painted two coats, and the roof on the northern side reshingled. The woodshed was thoroughly repaired, and two new waterclosets built. In districts 8 and 9 the old wooden posts were removed from the primary room and some iron supports erected in their places. Though the mischievous scholar was deprived of a good friend by this change, nevertheless the appearance of the room is much improved. For many years the pupils in this school have been obliged to sit in seats large enough for scholars many years older than those generally found in primary grades. The seats were so high that 90 per cent. of the pupils could not rest their feet on the floor. So the old seats in the room up-stairs were removed, as many of them were broken and unfit for use, and the seats in the primary room were taken up-stairs. New seats were purchased for the lower room, and I assure you they are greatly appreciated by the children.

The walls and ceilings of both rooms in this building have been patched, but further repairs are necessary. The exterior of the building was painted, and extensive repairs were made on the outbuildings.

The schoolhouse in district 14 was furnished with new seats and a new stove. A flag-pole was erected on the building.

Only slight repairs have been made in the other districts, but when one takes into consideration the number of buildings to be kept in repair and the prices of paint, lumber and other materials necessary for the work, he will not think the amount of money expended each year unreasonable.

Fall term—Principal, William J. Nutter, salary, \$950: assistants, Miss Christine Shaw and Miss Cora M. Shaw; salary of each, \$450. Attendance, 68; average attendance, 61; length of term, 14 weeks.

The winter term is now in session. The length of the term will be eleven weeks. Corps of teachers same as for the fall term. A class of 16 was graduated at the

close of the spring term, and a class of 22 entered at the opening of the fall term.

CONCLUSION.

In passing over the year's work it is possible to see great improvement. This is what we want, and it can be accomplished by the hearty co-operation of all who have an interest in our schools.

I wish to thank the teachers, pupils and parents who have aided me in my work the past three years. To the superintending school committee I tender sincere thanks for their support and assistance in my varied duties.

WARRANT.

STATE OF MAINE.

To Alfred C. Osgood, a constable of the town of Bluehill, in said County,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town hall in said town, on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1910, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2. To choose a town clerk for ensuing year.
- 3. To hear and act on the reports of the town officers for the past year.
- 4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor, treasurer, auditor, agent, and member of the school committee.
- 5. To choose a collector of taxes, fix his rate of pay, and the date when the taxes are due, and see what instructions, if any, they will give the collector for collecting the taxes for 1910.
- 6. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to employ an attorney to collect the taxes due previous to the year 1906.
- 7. To choose one or more road commissioners, if the town votes to do so.
- 8. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 9. To see what sums of money the town will raise by taxation for the follow-purposes:

For support of schools.

support of poor.

free high school.

free text-books.

repairs on schoolhouses.

snow breaking.

Memorial day.

highways and bridges.

town and incidental expenses.

repairs on sidewalks.

street lamps.

libraries.

10. To see if the town will vote money to pay note due Oct. 1, 1910, and interest for one year.

- To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine, for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1910.
- 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$400, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chapter 112, public laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, public laws of 1909.
- 13. To see if the town will vote money to continue the work on the road from the village to East Bluehill, and near schoolhouse No. 7.
- 14. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to repair Mello's hill on the Point road.
- 15. To see if the town will raise money to build the bridge at Bunker's corner, so called, in the village.
- 16. To hear the report of the selectmen on the Falls road, and see what sum of money they will raise to repair and improve the same.
- 17. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to buy an iron fence for the the front of Seaside cemetery.
- 18. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to apply to the next legislature for a charter authorizing the town of Bluehill, or their assigns, to construct and maintain waterworks in the town.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to continue the union with Sedgwick and Brooklin, or with one of these towns, provided the other wishes to withdraw, for the purpose of employing a superintendent of schools.
- To see if the town will vote to continue the schools in districts numbered 2, 6, 10, 11, 14, 15, 17, 20, provided there should be less scholars than the law requires.
- 21. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to hire money for any of the purposes mentioned in this warrant.
- To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to fight forest fires as the law requires, and authorize them to hire a sum of money not exceeding \$250 to pay for same.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to raise \$120 to pay the yearly rent on the Bluehill academy building.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at their office in the town hall in said town at eight o'clock on the morning of the meeting to correct the list of voters.
