PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ANNUAL REPORT

1950

The public health nursing program in Owl's Head has made great progress this past year. In a large measure this has been due to the untiring efforts of the Health Council under the leadership of Mrs. Charles Wotton. They not only assisted as usual with the planning and operation of the various clinics but immediately set to work following the school health clinics to find ways of getting most urgent remedial defects corrected Through various means they raised funds eight tonsil operations and assisted in getting ten in all taken care of. Even the transportation to and from hospitals as far away as Waterville for some, was no small task. In addition, one correction has also been taken care of by the health council. I am sure everyone will feel deeply grateful to these women for their vision of the need and for the will to work hard to accomplish such fine results in so short a time.

The nurse's time has been divided as usual between the homes, the schools and clinic work. Thirty-three home visits were made to infants, and over thirty to others, both children and adults. Three persons were given tuberculin tests. Some individuals are being followed at State chest and crippled children clinics.

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Three child health conferences were held during the summer. The total number of infants and preschool children who attended was forty-four. Physical examinations and immunizations against four communicable diseases were given by the conference physician.

Sixteen visits were made to the schools. Conferences were held with the teachers and help offered as far as possible. In the spring forty immunizations were given by Dr. Lawry, Jr. at two school clinics. Also in April and May three other school clinics were conducted. Eighty-four physical examinations were made to children in the three schools by the physician. More than half the children had their parents present which makes for a very much more worth-while program. In November hearing tests were given in all three schools using the audiometer.

Again I extend my appreciation to the health and council members and all in Owl's Head who have helped make this one of the best years for maintaining a healthy community.

School Department

To the School Committee and Citizens of Owl's Head:

I am submitting my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Our teaching staff has remained the same as last year with one exception. Mrs. Myra Scammon replaced Mrs. Bertha Thurston at the Ash School. All the teachers are doing an excellent job. The school at Ingraham's Hill is very much crowded. No teacher can efficiently teach more than 40 pupils in one room. A large percentage of these boys and girls are in the primary grade. The 7th and 8th grades will not be taken to Rockland after the school year 1951-52. The tuition bill for these grades is over \$2,000.00. The people must decide very soon if they are to provide room for these pupils or continue to pay tuition to some other town. A bill is pending before the state legislature that will permit towns to construct a new building at a low expense to the town.

REPAIRS:

New fluorescent lights have been installed in the

(Page 28)

Timber Hill and Ingraham Hill schools. The floor and desks at Timber Hill have been sanded and treated with filler. This improves their appearance and makes them much easier to clean. The same treatment should be extended to the other two buildings. This expense cannot be justified if it is possible to start construction of a new building within the year.

We are gradually bringing our textbooks up to date. Some of our books are still in use after 15 or 20 years of service. History and geography books are useless if they do not reflect changing conditions.

It is hoped that the town may secure a music supervisor for the next year. A musical training is very desirable for every child. Pupils going to other schools are especially handicapped because they have had no musical training.

I want to express my gratitude to the school committee, teachers, and citizens who have helped to make this a profitable year for our boys and girls.

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3, Revised Statutes of 1944, and at your request, the records of the Town of Owl's Head have been audited by the State Department of Audit for the period January 1, 1950 to December 31, 1950 inclusive.

The examination was made by Auditor L. J. Hann in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards of municipal accounting applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transact-

ions of the Town appear to have been appropriately handled, with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying comments.

Exhibits and Schedules incorporated in this report present the results of the financial operations of the Town for the period designated. Recommendations are also offered which are believed to be worthy of your consideration.

TOWN OF OWLS HEAD

January 1, 1950 to December 31, 1950

An audit has been completed of the books and records of the town of Owls Head for the year ended December 31, 1950.

The records maintained by the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Assessors and Town Clerk were audited. The system of internal control was reviewed. Accounting records and other support-

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ing evidence were examined or tested to the extent deemed necessary, under the circumstances.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet together with the related financial statements fairly present the financial position of the Town at December 31, 1950 and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

ASSETS:

Cash in Bank (\$4,763.60)

The cash balance of \$4,763.60 at the year end and was accounted for as follows:

All receipts issued for monies received by the Treasurer were checked in detail to the cashbook and to the appropriate accounts in the Selectmen's ledger. It was ascertained that all recorded cash had been promptly deposited in the bank.

Accounts Receivable (\$2,320.54)

The accounts receivable totaled \$2,320 54 at the year end. Of this amount \$2,144.26 was due from the State for State Aid Construction, \$40.73 was due from the State for State Poor, and \$135.55 was from the City of Rockland for Poor Account.

Taxes Receivable (\$864.06)

An examination was made of the Assessors' valuation records for 1950 and the related commitment of taxes. The 1950 assessment charged to the collector was accounted for as follows:

The supporting detail on unpaid taxes for all years is shown on Schedules A-12 and A-13.

In connection with the examination of the Tax Collector's records it was noted that no warrant of commitment was given by the Assessors for supplemental taxes. This is required by the provisions of Chapter 81, Section 29 of the revised Statutes of 1944.

Tax Liens (\$151.04)

During the year uncollected 1949 taxes assessed against real estate totaling \$239.14) were transferred to tax liens. Sales totaled \$165.60 and liens totaling \$55.50 were transferred to tax acquired property. At the year end the tax liens amounted

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to \$152.04, the detail of which is shown on Schedule A-14.

Tax Acquired Property (\$160.64)

The tax acquired property acct. totaled \$160.64 at December 31, 1950. During the year matured tax liens totaling \$55.50 were transferred to this account. Sales during the year amounted to \$84.00.

The First National Bank of Rockland, held notes of the Town amounting to \$3,440.00. These are 3 percent notes issued August 10, 1949, and matured within 5 years.

The balance of various accounts carried forward to the ensuing year amounted to \$1,155.58. compared with balances carried forward from the previous year, a decrease of \$478.03 was indicated. This decrease resulted from the decrease in the school accounts less the increase in the charity accounts.

A net increase of \$2,598.30 was reflected in the surplus account as compared with the balance at the close of the previous year. The change in the account is summarized as follows:

Revenues and Expenditures

Excess of Available Funds Over Expenditures (\$1,738.30)

A comparative statement of revenue and expenditures is presented for the 1950, 1949 and 1948 years which discloses that available funds exceeded expenditures for each year. For the 1950 year the excess of available funds over expenditures amounted to \$1,738.39. This represents an increase of \$128.74 over 1949.

Revenues reflect an increase of \$6,032.26 for 1950 as compared with 1949. This increase was caused principally by the increase in the tax commitment and in the revenue from the State of Maine. The revenue from the State of Maine increased \$1,186.47. This increase occurred principally in State Aid Construction (\$757.76). Snow Removal (\$561.48) and State Poor (450.13.

Expenditures reflect an increase of \$1,543.84 for 1950 as compared with 1949. Major changes in expenditures were the increases in Education

(\$3,327.16) Charities (\$867.04) and Municipal Indebtedness (\$860.00) and the decrease in Highways and Bridges (\$3,547.66). The increase in the Education Accounts resulted principally from the increased cost of operations and an increase in the amount of high school tuition paid. The increase in the Charities Accounts occurred principally from increased expenditures for State and Other Town's Poor. Because of the completion of the work on the Cripple Creek Bridge in 1949, the total cost for Highways and Bridges was less in 1950 than in 1949.

Overdrafts were noted in several appropriation accounts, the summary of which is shown on Exhibit D. The following opinion was rendered by the Department of Attorney General on this point.

"The municipal officers are bound by the terms of the articles in the warrant calling the town meeting providing for the expenditure of money. The officers should not spend more than the taxptyers appropriated at town meeting, unless the statute expressly authorizes an expenditures in excess of the appropriation."

The provisions of Chapter 84, Section 81, of the Revised Statutes of 1944, however, relates to expenditures of monies for highway purposes and pemit overdrafts in cases of emergencies to the exexpenditure in excess of the appropration."

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Trust Funds

Time Deposits (\$1,657.04) Investments (\$100.00)

The time deposits and the investments of the trust funds were verified by examination of the bank passbooks and the U. S. Defense Bond. It was determined that all interest earned had been accounted for. Expenditures appeared to have been in accordance with the terms of the trusts.

General

Excise tax collections deposited with the Treasurer amounted to \$2,863.22. The following receipts issued by the Collector were examined the total of which was in agreement with deposits as recorded by the Treasurer.

A corporate surety bond for \$4,000.00 was furnished by the Maine Bonding and Casualty Company for Herbert S. Montgomery, Treasurer and Collector.

Vouchers, payrolls and cancelled checks representing one month's expenditures were examined in detail with no exceptions being noted.

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Requests for verifications were mailed on a representative number of the items of accounts receivable, and tax liens. Should any variations be noted as a result of these verifications, the proper munipal officials will be notified.

Recommendations

It is believed that the following recommendations is worthy of consideration by the municipal officers:

Supplemental taxes be committed in accordance with the requirements of Chapter 81, Section 29,, of the Revised Statutes of 1944.

TOWN WARRANT

COUNTY OF KNOX, ss:

To Avard L. Walker, a Constable in the Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

GRREETING:-

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Owl's Head, qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on the 12th day of March, 1951 at 7 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside over the meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act upon the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Superintendiing School Committee

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- Art. 4. To chhoose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose three Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuiing year.
- Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To vote "yes" or "no" for a Road Commissioner and to choose a Road Commissioner if the vote is "yes."
- Art. 10. To choose a member of the Superintending Schol Committee for the ensuing three years.
- Art. 11. To see what scale of wages the Town will vote to pay for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for Officers' salaries.
- Art 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$65.00 for public health nursing in Owls Head. Said sum to be expended by the Maine Department of Health and Welfare.
- Art 14. To see if the town will vote to build a new school house.

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- Art. 15. To see what method of financing the town will use for the construction of a new school building and what sum the town will vote to raise for this purpose.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will choose a building committee to take charge of the construction of a new building.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the teaching of music in the schools.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to install a hydrant at the south side of Ingraham's Hill near the Government meter, or move the present hydrant at the top of Ingraham's Hill to the above mentioned location.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire hydrants.
- Art. 20. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (approximately

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- \$200.00) to finish the repair of the beach road that leads down to Crockett's Beach.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200.00 to repair damage done by the November storm, from town landing to Glover's property at Crescent Beach.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town roads and bridges.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to expend the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) on the Ballyhac road, beginning at Drew's corner and ending at the East and West lines of the Elmer Curtis land so called. Bulldozer to be used on ditches, and gravelled in center with remainder of money. Work to be completed by June 1, 1951.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the purchase of small forest fire equipment such as: Indian tanks, spades, axes, fire rakes, pails, etc.
- Art. 26. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in acordance with

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the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

- Art. 27 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for current expense
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise \$565.00 for street lights.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of the poor.
- Art 31 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Dependent Children.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for interest on the Cripple Creek Bridge Loan.
- Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for retirement of the Cripple Creek Bridge loan. (voted in 1949 to retire this loan in five years)

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- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Common Schools.
- Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Text Books.
- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Supplies.
- Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for School Repairs.
- Art 39. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.
- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to pay transportation of the High School pupils on Wood's Bus. If the vote is "yes" to see what action the town will take with reference to raising the necessary money to cover said transportation cost.
- Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Civil Defense, as recommended by the state director.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to recind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.
 - Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to adopt

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the following in regard to the collection of taxes. Taxes shall become due and payable on August first of current year a discount of 3 percent will be allowed if payment is made within thirty days of date of tax bills; interest will be charged on all amounts unpaid after August first. Delinquents will be dealt with according to the law provided for that purpose. If the vote is "no" some other method must be adopted.

- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, to execute quit claim deed on such property and to advertise land or property in local paper prior to sale.
- Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the cemeteries in the town of Owls Head.
- Art. 46. To see if the town will raise and approate a sum of money for the Capital Reserve Fund (School and Town Hall Building Fund).
- Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue notes for temporary loans.
 - Art. 48. To transact any other business which

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may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall at 6.30 O'clock P. M. for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
