To the Inhabitants of Jackman Plantation

March 18th, 1946, brings to a close our last fiscal year and the beginning of a new one. Your Plantation officers have trued to render you a non-partisan administration, and to extend the money budgeted to the most advantageous point and herewith submit their Annual Reports of the financial condition of the Plantation of Jackman for the fiscal year.

Included in this report are those of the Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Treasurer, Clerk, Superintendent of Schools, Post-War Planning Committee and the complete audit for the year ending March 1st, 1945.

For the second consecutive year the Plantation has been awarded the certificate of Superior Merit for its Annual Report for the fiscal year ending March 1st, 1945.

Amid much criticism your officers have tried to serve to their best ability, knowing of course that the Inhabitants of the Plantation realize the many duties and responsibilities which are your officers' plus Plantation work. We know you too, must share in the pride of the accomplishments of recent years; you will note that our Town Debt is at present only the Bonding issue of \$9,000.00 as against a debt of \$21,600.00 on March 1st, 1942 which means an actual gain of \$11,600.00 during '42-'43-'44; and a \$1,000.00 reduction during '45: which is all the Plantation is allowed to pay on their bonded debt. The sum of \$1,300.00 was borrowed for the purpose of building the septic tank, if the Plantation so wishes it can be easily paid from the present cash on hand, thereby eliminating the appropriation.

We know the tax rate has been rather high, but we must remember too, that our timberland valuation has dropped considerably plus several other losses through fire which have not been replaced. We are appreciative of your co-operation, and trust that you too are gratified with the present status.

We wish to thank all the Inhabitants of our Plantation for the splendid support they have given us in our many appeals, during

all the drives. Your contributions have resulted in publicity for your Plantation.

Many of the duties imposed on your selectmen during the last four years, the greater part of which the inhabitants are not aware of, because they have been done with no compensation and no complaining on the part of the individuals doing it, have been lessened with the cessation of hostilities, and from now on will be eliminated completely, making it easier and allowing many more hours for your officers to devote to your individual needs. We are grateful to those of you who have helped us share our heavy load and know that you feel as we do, that these services continually rendered have been for a very worthy cause, and were the ones deserving first consideration during time of War.

Our sincere thanks to everyone who has contributed in any way towards the accomplishments of our Plantation; to all officers who have served, either for compensation or "gratis"; we appreciate your services.

Our sincers thanks to all of you and trust that you will go on giving your help that the fullest measure of "Success" may be attained

Faculty:

We were fortunate again this year to retain three of our last year's faculty: Mr. Erskine, Principal of the High School whose report follows; Mrs. Nichols, primary teacher, and Mrs. Johnston, teacher of the grammar grades. These teachers are conscientious, hard working and their pupils are making good progress. Mr. Erskine and Mrs. Johnston attended summer schools this past year.

The resignation of Mr. and Mrs. Fuller at the close of the spring term made it necessary to get a new English and French teacher and one for the commercial department.

Mrs. Vera Wilson, who was hired for the first position, has had ten years of experience in the schools of Massachusetts. Her year here has been most successful. We are fortunate in having a teacher of her ability to take this important position.

Miss Patricia Hayden of the commercial department is a recent graduate of the Maine School of Commerce Teacher Course. This is her first teaching experience and she is making a success of it. Not only is she successful in her school work but she is popular with the students and has taken her place in the community and extra-curricula activities.

Last year we raised seven hundred dollars for repairs to the building. We hoped to have the outside trim repainted, the windows and sashes puttied and painted as well as some renovating inside. However, we were unable to get it done because there was no man available to do it. I hope that it can be done this coming summer as it is badly needed.

The heating system needs to be replaced with a more efficient one. The present system is inefficient, dirty and dangerous. I think it would be wise to appropriate a sizable sum each year beginning now so that some remodeling may be done and some equipment added.

I would suggest the following order:

- 1. New heating system
- 2. New plumbing
- 3. Arrange for more adequate lighting facilities
- 4. New seats for the primary room
- 5. Enlarge and equip laboratory
- 6. Buy some visual education equipment

You have reason to be proud of the pupils attending Jackman Consolidated School. They are a fine group of boys and girls and they deserve a better equipped building in which to work.

School costs show no signs of decreasing and will not do so until cost in other areas begins to drop. The average school tax rate for the state went up two mills this year while that for Jackman increased 1.5 mills. We are still .00431 below the state average which is now .01800 mills.

To all who have cooperated to make this a successful and pleasant year, I wish to express my appreciation.

The pupils have shown seriousness of purpose and an especially fine spirit of cooperation in their school work for the most part. We have really enjoyed working with them.

Langdon Holden has coached the boys' basketball team and is deserving of credit for having given so much time and effort in helping the boys. Robert Henderson and Joseph Nowosielski have helped much with girls' basketball. We wish to thank them very much and also any others who have assisted in any way with any of our school activities.

Our Freshman Reception and School Fair were very well received and patronized.

The school needs very much a mimeographing machine.

I wish to thank the parents and friends of the school for their splendid cooperation and support.

It is especially gratifying to have had the continued interest, the whole-hearted cooperation and support of the School Board and Superintendent.

This report will, therefore, be limited to incidence of contagious diseases for the past year.

During this time there were eighteen cases of contagious disease in the community. A summary of the types of illness in this class is as follows:

Chicken pox: 11 cases. (Scattered throughout

the year at irregular intervals).

Malaria: 4 cases. (Contracted South Pacific).

Whooping Cough: 1 case. Reported.

Mumps: 1 case. Reported.

Tuberculosis: 1 case. Reported. (Placed in

Sanitarium).

The law restricts birth, marriage, and death records in this report. Chapter 320 of the Public Laws, 1945.

Report of Public Health Nurse

January 1 to December 31, 1945

Peace, with its promise of hope for a better world, has also brought us greater responsibilities as well as larger opportunities. Disease is always with us but preventive measures have been found for many communicable diseases. Let us strive for greater health protection and education for our community.

Through the interest and cooperation of your Health Committee, your Bureau of Health nurse did Tuberculosis Patch testing of all students in the village school and day pupils at the convent who wished it. Audio-meter (hearing) tests were done on all upper grade children in the village school and convent.

Typhoid and Diphtheria immunization clinics were held in the schools with Dr. Szanton the attending physician. It is regretable that more adults did not take advantage of these clinics.

Two health movies were shown in the school. Due to irregular meetings of the committee it seemed difficult to arrange for movies for the community. It is hoped that in the future more of the townspeople will become interested in community health when regular committee meetings are held. In this way the services of your Public Health Nurse may be much more effective.

Teached-nurse conferences were held from time to time.

In the fall the Sisters at the Sacred Heart Convent requested a demonstration of the Vision Testing, using the Snellen E Chart. Recording of the vision and hearing tests and reporting of the defective cases were also discussed. Early vision and hearing corrections can mean much to the future of a child and may prevent a life long handicap. The value of the Pupils' Health Record was taken up and many questions were asked about other School Health problems.

COMMENTS

CASH

All receipts as recorded were examined and the cash for same was found to have been properly accounted for by the Treasurer, as summarized in Exhibit B.

Expenditures were made by check and compared with the Warrants drawn by Selectmen, as shown by total Warrants drawn in Exhibit B, and detailed to proper departments in Exhibit D. All Warrants drawn have been paid.

The cash balance reconciled with the Bank Statement at the close of the Municipal year, plus cash on hand, as shown by reconciliation in Exhibit B. Deposits in transit were verified by subsequent bank statement and receipts from bank. The outstanding checks were verified by checking with Warrants and also by the checks themselves as returned from bank in subsequent months. All banking is done with the Guilford Trust Company.

TAXES

The 1944 tax commitment was added and found to agree with assessors' records. The total amount committed was accounted for by cash to the Treasurer, authorized abatements, discounts allowed, or remained unpaid as summarized in detail in Exhibit C.

All payments received on back taxes and liens were examined.

EXCISE TAXES

The Excise Taxes were checked from the triplicate copy of the receipts, and schedule covering these taxes is included as part of Exhibit C. Three receipts amounting to \$11.38, were apparently overlooked by the Collector in settling with the Treasurer. This matter was taken up with the Excise Tax Collector who has agreed to its correctness, and therefore it has been set up as Accounts Receivable, as being due from your Collector. Total of 1944-45 Excise Taxes has been carried to reduction of Net Debt as shown in Schedule 1.

NET SURPLUS

Exhibit A indicates that at the end of your Municipal Year there was a Net Debt of \$4,297.36, compared with a Net Debt of \$5,034.13, at the beginning of the year. This shows a decrease in the Net Debt of \$736.77, the analysis of which is shown on Schedule 1 of this report.

GENERAL

A check was made of numerous invoices and payrolls which indicate that they were properly and correctly recorded. The Town Clerk's records showed payments to the State Treasurer for dog licenses in the amount of \$71.60. This item did not go through the hands of the Treasurer. As some of the dog license records could not be found it was not possible to determine the number of licenses issued, but as the Town Clerk is held responsible by the Fish and Game Department for all licenses sent him, it is reasonable to suppose that he has remitted for licenses issued.

The records of the Treasurer have been exceptionally well kept and records of the Tax Collector show a big improvement over a year ago.

With the exception of Cash and Trust Funds, no external verification was made of your accounts.

In verifying Cash as of March 1, 1945, I noticed quite a few of the old taxes have been collected since the close of the last Municipal year, therefore no recommendation will be made at this time relative to unpaid taxes of prior years.

Warrant for Annual Plt. Meeting

To Edward Larochelle, Constable of the Plantation of Jackman in the County of Somerset:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Plantation of Jackman, in said County, qualified by law to vote in said Plantation affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Plantation on Monday the eighteenth day of March, A. D. 1946 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Art. 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2-To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3—To elect three selectmen also to be known as assessors, five overseers of the poor, treasurer, auditor, one member of the school board, fire warden for town, fire warden for forests, surveyor of wood and bark, sealer of weights and measures.

Art. 4—To elect a road commissioner, fix his compensation and have it understood that one hundred dollars of the common road money shall be set aside for fall use after the State Patrol is laid off if needed at said time and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 5—To elect a tax collector of Plantation taxes, fix his compensation and it shall be understood that the person elected tax collector of Plantation taxes will be required to make a full and complete settlement with the Treasurer of the Plantation no later than February 20th, 1946.

Art. 6—To elect an excise tax collector, fix his compensation, and it shall be understood the person elected excise tax collector shall be required to turn over all excise tax money collected to Plantation Terasurer and to make a complete settlement on or before February 20th, 1946.

Art. 7—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the Annual Audit for year of 1945 and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$100.00

Art. 8—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the making and repairing of roads and bridges for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$1400.00

Art. 9—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to entitle it to State Aid and pass all votes respecting the same

Art. 10—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to entitle it to State Aid on Unimproved Roads under the Patrol System and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$928.20

Art. 11—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining Third Class Roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$300.00

Art. 12—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will wote to raise and appropriate to entitle it to extend on State Maintenance—that is known as the 50-50 road and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of cutting bushes, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$50.00

Art. 14—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for sidewalks and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$100.00

Art. 15—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and maintaining the so called—"Nichol's Road" and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$300.00

Art. 16—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended for Snow Removal for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$2,000.00

Art. 17—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 18—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for miscellaneous expense and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 19—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for Hydrant Rental for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 20—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of shoveling hydrants and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 21—To see if the Plantation will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept or reject bids made for Snow Removal on the Side Streets for the ensuing year and all bids to be in no later than September 15th, 1946 and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art: 22—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$4,000.00

Art. 23—To see if the Plantation will vote to direct the Selectmen to take possession for the Plantation of all real estate upon which liens have been placed, and redemption period has expired, and to sell or otherwise dispose of the town's interest in such real estate as they seem advantageous to the Plantation and to authorize the Selectmen, in behalf of and for the Plantation to execute all deeds or other documents as may be necessary to effect the above actions, and to pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 24—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the Jackman Public Library, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$100.00

Art. 25—To see if the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,928.00 for the support and maintenance of the Schools to be apportioned as follows: Consolidated Schools \$6,815.00; Superintendent of Schools, \$488.00; J. H. S. Graduation, \$25.00; School Repairs, \$1,400.00; Ins., \$200.00; and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$8,928.00

Art. 26—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of interest charges and coupon on bonds and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$1,360.00

Art. 27—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$1,140.00

Art. 28—To see what sum of money, of any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of Treasurer's and Collector's Bonds for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$48.00

Art. 29—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of paying the Collector of Plantation taxes and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$600.00

Art. 30—To see if the Plantation will vote to instruct the Tax Collector to pay to all who pay their taxes in full before June 1st, 1946; 2% of the tax assessed and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 31—To see if the Plantation will vote to charge interest at a rate of 6% on all Taxes remaining unpaid after September 1st, 1946, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 32—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on the Town Hall and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$100.00

Art. 33—To see what sum of money, if any, the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate to expend on the so called "Nadeau Street" and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 34—To see if the Plantation will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans in anticipation of taxes and to issue and negotiate notes thereof, or renewals therefor, or any notes in places of the original notes when paid to an amount which at any time shall not exceed in the aggregate to total tax levy of the preceding municipal year and all such notes to mature and to be paid during such current year by taxes, in accordance with the provisions of the Revised Statutes of Maine 1930, Section 83, Chapter 5 as amended,

Art. 35—To see if the Plantation will vote to elect a Constable for the ensuing year, fix his compensation, accept bids for same if necessary and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 36—To see if the Plantation will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the maintenance of the Airport and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 41—To see if the Plantation will vote to instruct the Selectmen to pay the \$1,300.00 note due the Guilford Trust Co., out of cash balance on hand said money having been borrowed at Special Town Meeting held September 7th, 1945, for the purpose of building septic tank, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 42—To see if the Plantation will vote to use \$500.00 of the Post War Fund toward the construction of cement sidewalk on the Main Street. The decision to be made at present Town Meeting as to location of starting point, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 43—To see if Jackman Plantation will vote to make it necessary before loans are procured by note that the signature of the three assessors must appear on said notes also the signature of the Treasurer and Town Clerk also that all loans by note or otherwise must be recorded in the town records in the town clerk's office also the date of the loan, the amount thereof, from whom borrowed and also the date of payment thereof, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 44—To see if Jackman Plantation will vote to charge Moose River Plantation \$25.00 per year tomb rental, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 45—To see if Jackman Plantation will vote to charge Moose River Plantation \$35.00 per year dump rental, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 46—To see what action Jackman Plantation will take relative to the proper care and rental or lease of the Town Hall, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 47—To see if Jackman Plantation will vote to transfer the \$1,500.00 as set aside for post war planning to be used for the purchase of a suitable fire equipment and housing of same, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 48—To see if Jackman Plantation will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase and house suitable fire equipment for the protection of the property within Jackman Plantation, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 49—To see if the Plantation will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make use of the \$1,500.00 now in the Post War Savings account and to designate the purpose for which it is to be used, and pass all votes respecting the same.
