Report of Highway Department

S. D. RICE, Road Commissioner.

In November 1916, at the request of the State Highway commission, all streets and highways in the town were measured. The work was done by S. D. Rice, road commissioner, and Aubrey M. Hussey. The distances were not taken absolutely accurate, the speedometer being used which measured only in tenths of the mile. However the selectmen have considered it worth while to print the report as a matter of record. Mr. Rice also made a map of the streets and highways in the town which is on file in the town office.

Superintending School Committee.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending school committee and the Citizens of Guilford:

I hereby submit to you my third annual report of the work, progress and needs of your schools.

The year has been marked by consistent work and good progress, and I believe that greater spirit of cooperation has existed among teachers, parents, school officials and other citizens than ever before. It was recently remarked by one who has had opportunity to observe the schools, that it is quite seldom that one sees a corps of teachers more co-operative, hard working and interested in the welfare of the schools as a whole and also of the individual pupil than the present corps in Guilford.

I believe this to be true and I further believe that much encouragement can and should be given to the teachers and pupils thru visitation by parents and citizens. I wish to urge, as I have done in previous reports, that you improve the duty and privilege that you have of gaining a first hand acquaintance of the conditions as they actually are in the school room. Children see and hear with children's eyes and ears and report from a child's point of view. Thru these visits you not only have an opportunity to know what your boy or girl is doing, but also to become acquainted with the teacher.

COMMON SCHOOLS: Few changes have been made from plans of previous years. During the year

vacancies have occurred in three of the schools due to the resignation of the teachers. These places have been well filled by Miss Brown, Miss Bragdon and Miss Seekins, and all the schools at the present time are making good progress.

At the close of the spring term Monson withdrew from the arrangement of previous years of uniting with Guilford in the supervision of music and drawing. Miss Marsh, not wishing to continue the work in only one town, resigned. During the fall-term the regular teachers conducted the work in these branches. At the opening of the winter term I was able to arrange with Miss Chisholm, supervisor of music and drawing at Dover and Foxcroft, to supervise the work here, and under her direction very good work is being accomplished. Once in two weeks she visits the rural schools, and frequently meets the rural teachers for planning the work and giving instruction. Work in music has been extended to the High school, and conditions look favorable for satisfactory results.

The Palmer System of Penmanship which was introduced into the upper grades last year has been introduced into the High school this year and is under the direction of Miss Holman. Much interest is being manifested by the pupils and very gratifying results secured. The Palmer Company grants several rewards to pupils as they achieve different degrees of efficiency, and a final diploma when a certain degree of perfection is reached. We believe that there will be several pupils who will receive certificates during the year.

RURAL SCHOOLS: Today one of the greatest problems in educational work is that of the rural school. The complex conditions demand trained and experienced teachers for the most effective work. During the past year the general work has been of a good standard and all teachers have made special efforts to make their schools most successful.

With the increase of the school year to thirty-six weeks I believe that it will be necessary to increase the amount of conveyance on account of the uncertain conditions of the roads outside or the village in order that pupils may be more regular in their attendance during the winter months and thereby receive more benefit from the schools. During the winter term there has been considerable sickness and it has been necessary to close some of the schools.

Thruout the State the formation of Boys' and Girls' Agricultural clubs in the rural communities has been a decided success. I believe that this plan should be seriously considered and without doubt well adopted in connection with the work of the rural school. Its tendency would be to bring home and school into closer relation and to stimulate a greater interest among the boys and girls in the possibilities of rural life.

opening of the fall term without any break or change in the teaching force. We were able to retain Mr. Holman and Miss Webb and Miss McAron was appointed as instructor in the English and History Department. A few changes have been made which are mentioned in the Principal's report. Of the class which was graduated last spring a good percentage is in college and others are making plans to attend next year. Those who are in college are carrying their work in a manner worthy of mention. At the present time greater provisions need to be made for those who do not attend college.

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN: The work of medical inspection has been conducted this year by Dr. Dore. A thorough examination has been given to all pupils and thru the co-operation of the District Nurse, local organizations and individuals, considerable has been accomplished in dental work. A more complete report is submitted by Dr. Dore.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS: The usual needed repairs were made on the High school and new school buildings during the summer vacation. Two improvements have been made during the year which have greatly helped the condition of the village schools;—the installation of a modern lighting system in the High school building, known as the semi-direct system and the grading of the front yard which has greatly increased the amount of available play ground for the pupils. The tennis court which was rebuilt has been much used and greatly enjoyed by all who have wished to participate in this wholesome sport.

I am sure that the plan of providing places for suitable play and sports for all children thruout the school year is one that should be seriously considered. No one will dispute the fact that it is much better for a boy or girl to be spending their leisure time in clean sports than loafing about the streets and stores. I hope that in due time greater privileges may be offered along this line.

The building at Low's Bridge was painted and the foundation repaired. The inside of the Brown building painted and calsomined, and the desks and seats of all the schools refinished. Flags have been provided for all schools.

NEEDS: Some of the needs for the coming year are: painting of High school building; changing office and book room to ground floor; combining present office and small recitation room into one large recitation room; building hood in laboratory; increasing apparatus and equipment of laboratory; the State Inspector of High schools strongly recommends increasing the High school library facilities; jacketing of the stoves in all the rural schools, this work has been done in several of the rural schools in this Union and has improved heating and ventilating conditions about 75%; painting of Brown school house; other minor repairs as needed.

MANUAL TRAINING: Again I wish to place before you the question of introducing into your schools a course in Manual Training. Each year several new towns are placing this course in their schools, but I have been unable to find one that has abolished it.

Supt. Ross of Dexter has introduced this course and also Domestic Science into the Dexter schools this year and reports that excellent results are being secured.

I am confident that such courses are a great benefit to all pupils and aid materially in retaining those boys and girls in school who now drop out long before completing their possible school career. The State pays two-thirds of the cost of instruction in these courses, thus giving special encouragement to towns to adopt them.

I hope that you may consider it to be advisable to take advantage of this opportunity and introduce a course in Manual Training at the opening of the fall term.

HIGH SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It becomes my privilege to submit my fifth annual report of the progress of Guilford High school during the year now closing. I feel that we have made on the whole a forward step in the character of the work done in the past year. Our enrollment has not materially changed, which is to be expected in any town that does not draw from a large rural community. At the close of the past year the plan was continued which was inaugurated the year previous of holding trial declamations for all juniors. The results were very satisfactory this year.

At the opening of the school year of 1916-1917 sixtyfive students were registered. Two dropped out during the term and one entered, closing the term with the following enrollment by classes, Senior class, 14; Junior class, 10; Sophomore class, 21; Freshman class, 19; total, 64. The average attendance for the fall term was 61.6 which I consider exceptionally good for a fifteenweek term. The attendance during the winter term will be considerably reduced due to a large amount of of sickness.

We have much to thank the citizens for during the past year. During the summer the lighting system was installed and it would be hard to properly express our appreciation of its splendid service. I wish, on the part of the pupils, however, to say that it has enabled them to lenghten the school day fully two hours, when necessary, and to accomplish more work at the building than ever before.

At the beginning of the school year our tennis court was raised, graded and leveled thru the action of your school committee. I hope that the students may show their appreciation this coming season of the work done there by keeping it in a fit condition.

Now a word in closing as to what we are doing and our needs. During the past year we have made work in music and consistent drill in penmanship possible for all High school students. This is a step forward but we are not as yet meeting the needs of that 90% of our students who do not attend higher institutions of learning. Manual Training should be opened to the students of the first two years in High school. An opportunity for a practical business education should be given if space and funds would allow. Our laboratory facilities are not what they should be. Seating arrangements should be made for at least 15 students, provision for a hood for ventilation, and an outline of the work in science following the nature of a syllabus such as are used in other states for similar work.

The Public Schools are yours. They will be very largely what your attitude toward school and the teacher makes them. We can never have too much of

intelligent criticism nor too little of the other kind. There is no period so critical in the life of boy or girl as the High school period. It should be our duty then to realize the fact that at that period the habits of self-reliance, industry, and above all confidence in one-self must be developed if ever. Know what your boy or girl is doing in school and let them know that you know it.

Our mistakes in the past year must be our guide in the coming year to help us make our High school play its part in the forming of a great body of democratic, intelligent citizenship that may in its time form a better town, state and nation. Our schools must live to create a practical, industrial, commercial people in the coming period if they fulfill their mission.

Many defects are thus discovered in their incipiency when the most can be done for their alleviation. The work has been very satisfactory this year as the district nurse has instituted a "follow up" system and many more are receiving proper treatment than heretofore.

Report of Board of Health

The Board of Health submits the following report:
The more acute contagious diseases have been absent from the town the past year with the exception of scarlet fever. During the summer months there were three isolated cases in the village, and in the late fall and winter an outbreak occurred in the east part of the town. The cases numbering four, three in one family and one in another, necessitating the closing of the Brown school for several weeks.

The schoolhouse grounds have been drained and a sewer laid the length of School street upon recommendation of the board.

Several carcasses and nuisances have been disposed of.

The local Anti-tuberculosis society and public health workers should be commended for their continued good work. During the year, 1916 Piscataguis county had the lowest death rate of any county in the state.

Report of Public Health Nurse

The Piscataquis county Anti-tuberculosis Association began its second year of work Sept. 7, 1916. From June 1916 to Sept. 1916 there was no nurse in the district.

This association now includes the four towns of Milo, Guilford, Dover and Foxcroft and the work of the nurse tho under the direction of this association, includes general public health work, for the predisposing causes of tuberculosis as well as many other communicable diseases are often preventable if discovered in time.

During the five months work the nurse has made 363 visits on tuberculosis patients and has taken two local patients to Bangor and one to Fairfield.

In all cases where death has occurred or a patient has moved, fumigation and general cleaning has been thoroughly carried out and all articles that could notbe sterilized were burned, thus disposing of every source of future infection.

Health talks have been given in all grades of school and emphasis placed on personal hygiene for school children.

In Guilford the nurse assisted the school physician in the examiation of all village school children and by so doing was able to do follow-up work and plan for the correction of many physical defects that go from year to year uncorrected.

As our work must be largely educational and preventative a great deal can be accomplished in the schools by teaching the children the simple rules of personal hygiene. This work should be a part of the daily school life of every child for only through the child can we ever hope to reach into the homes of a large per cent of people really needing this work.

In this district we hope to carry out this branch of the work through the formation of Health and Hygiene leagues among the school children.

This year several children needing dental treatment were taken to the dentist and the necessary work done, the local association, paying the bill, amounting to \$28.00.

This is a great work in that carius teeth are often the cause of poor general health and if a child is not in good health it cannot keep up with its studies in school. It is more likely to contract any contagious disease and it has not the proper chance to grow into a healthy. robust adult.

As an aid to this work a supply of tooth brushes have been ordered and will be sold to the children at cost and given to those who cannot afford to buy them.

A baby welfare conference will be carried out in the early spring under the supervision of the local association and the Woman's club. This is all in the interests

of better health for our future citizens.

Public health work is always slow at first but it is hoped that results will prove its worth and that its need will be no longer questioned.

To FRED A. HEATH, a constable in the Town of Guilford in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Guilford, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town hall in said town on the fifth day of March, A. D., 1917, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk.
- Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.
- Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.
 - Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art. 6. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to unite with any other town or towns to employ a Superintendent of Schools in accordance with the Statute law of the State.
- Art. 8. To choose a Superintendent of Schools, or to see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to elect a Superintendent of Schools.

- Art. 9. To choose a Collector of Taxes and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To choose one or more Auditors of Accounts.
 - Art. 11. To choose one or more Constables.
- Art. 12. To choose a Truant Officer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To choose Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the Superintendent of Schools for each day of actual service, or to pay a stated salary, and raise money to pay for the same.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs and insurance on schoolhouses the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Free High school at the village.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to purchase school books.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies and appliances.
- Art. 20. To see what action the town will take relative to the introduction of Manual Training or a Commercial Course in the village schools and what sum of money shall be raised to defray the expense of the same.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor and other town charges.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding interest-bearing debt and interest on the same.

- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of roads and bridges.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to build new sidewalks and repair of the old sidewalks in Guilford village.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600 00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise to be used for patrol maintenance in accordance with Chapter 272 of the Public Laws of 1915.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire purposes and electric lights.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to buy for the town an adding machine and to appropriate and raise money for the same.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to pay the superintending school committee for their services the ensuing year.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$575.00 for the support of the Guilford Memorial library.
- Art. 32. To choose one or more trustees for the Guilford Memorial library.

- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music in the schools.
- Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to help pay expenses of Memorial day and how the same shall be expended.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to have a night watchman in Guilford village and vote to raise money to pay for the same.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000. and pay the same over to the treasurer of the Guilford Water Co. as per contract signed August 10, 1910, as per vote of said town.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150. and pay the same to the treasurer of the Guilford Fire Co., the same to be paid for practicing and fighting fires according to the time actually put in by each member.
- Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes by side of town roads, and buy boards to build and repair snow fences.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will authorize the school board to appoint a school physician for making medical inspection of our schools and what sum of money shall be raised for the same.
- Art. 40. To see what action the town will take to protect public and private property in the village of Guilford and stop rowdyism and disturbance of the Peace and quiet of its citizens on the nights of July 3 and 4, 1917.
- Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to prohibit the selling and use of fire-crackers and explosives in Guilford village until 12 p. m. July 3, 1917.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to furnish free use of water and standpipes as used in sprinkling the streets to any party that will put the same in repair

and keep the pipes in repair free of expense to said town.

- Art. 43. To see what sum of money the town will raise for fuel and janitor's services in the High school.
- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more fire wards, fix their compensation and raise money for the same.
- Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen, Town treasurer and Town clerk.
- Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to place new electric lights on such side streets and in such places in Guilford village as the Selectmen in their judgement think the same should be placed to properly light the village, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200, to be paid to the Dexter and Piscataquis Tuberculosis Association for the services of a visiting nurse in Guilford.
- Art. 48. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise to be expended in the Guilford Center burying ground.
- Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise \$60.03 and pay same to P. H. Knowlton, Treasurer Centennial Committee, to take care of Centennial deficit.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting and revising the list of voters at Selectmen's office at the Town hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
