School Department

Superintendent of Schools Report

To the Superintending School Committee and to the Citizens of Owl's Head:

Please accept this my eighteenth annual report.

At the opening of the schools in September, Miss Winnifred Lamb of Lincolnville assumed the duties of teacher at Ash Point. Miss Lamb is a teacher of experience and of unusually good professional training, and has achieved good results. Miss Makinen, the former teacher, had taught in all three of the town schools and had served faithfully and well.

Good work is being done in all schools. The pupils cooperate, order is maintained and appproved methods of instruction are employed.

Miss Coffey, the assistant has been able to do her work with increasing efficiency.

Music books have been bought and some progress has been made in this subject. Reference books have been added by gift and purchase and there is need for more additions along this line. Twentieth Century performance requires twentieth century equipment. Schools must be well supplied with books other than the texts in which pupils find their lessons

from day to day if those habits of reading necessary for well informed citizens are to be established.

The graduation exercises at the Owl's Head Chapel in June were enjoyed by the large audience and were ceditable to the pupils and to the town.

In spite of the efforts of some of your citizens to introduce changes in our school system, its organization is the same as in the past years. Some alterations in the near future seem inevitable. It is not for the superintendent to say when or at what cost the changes must bemade. It is his privilege and duty to urge you to be prepared for the improvements that must be made and at some cost. It is true that considering their organization and equipment, your schools have achieved excellent results, and much credit is due the teachers, to the cooperating parents and to the committee members who have tried earnestly to give the boys and girls adequate preparation for high school and for life.

Any school system where all grades are found in one room and, during most of the time, under the direction of one teacher cannot be expected to do all that should be done for the children.

The plan of having an assistant who spends one-third of her time in each school has helped. The teacher employed has peculiar ability for this type of work. It would be difficult to find another who could accomplish so much and get along so well with teachers and pupils.

Some have asked if, when the employment of another assistant becomes necessary, it would not be

better to spend a little more to maintain an upper grade school separately, and it has been said that this might be done in the Town Hall.

This could not be done as a permanent arrangement without a substantial expenditure and some alterations would have to be made before it could be done lawfully as a temporary measure.

The usual minor repairs will have to be made, the school at Ingraham's Hill should be painted and a leak in the roof attended to.

In conclusion, allow me to express my thanks for the cooperation of officials and citizens.

To M. E. Scammon, a Constable in the Town of Owl's Head, in the County of Knox.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitant of the said Town of Owl's Head qualified by law to vote in Town Affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, in said Town on the 25th day of March, 1940 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 8. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what method the Town will vote to adopt for the collection of Taxes.
- Art. 10. To see what scale of wages the Town will vote to pay the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Common Schools.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Repairs.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Text Books.

- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for School Supplies.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for High School Tuition.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to establish a School for the 7th and 8th grades in the Town Hall.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money, (suggested \$2,000.00) to be used for no purpose other than a Consolidated School building. If the vote be "yes" to elect a committee of three (3) to be custodian of all money so raised.

- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate money to be used for the transportation of our school children.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Current Expense.
- Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to purchase forest fire hand tools.

- Art. 22. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate forty-four dollars (\$44.00) for public health nursing in Owl's Head. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will accept the provisions of ITEM five of the will of the late Perley H. Fisk which reads as follows: "I give to the Town of Owl's Head my lot in the Ingraham Cemetery at Owl's Head."
- Art. 24. To see if the Town will accept one hundred dollars, the income of which is to be used annually for the care of the Perley H. Fisk lot in the Ingraham Cemetery in Owl's Head.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a Town Seal (a suggested design being the head of an owl) and to appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars if the vote is "yes."
- Art. 26. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the road belonging to the Town leading to the so called Foster Farm.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the care of the Poor.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for "Aid to Dependant Children."

- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain an electric light at the first curve leading from Maloney's corner to South Thomaston.

To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 37. To see if the Town will appropriate money to construct a road from the main highway, beginning at the west side of the cemetery to Ocean Street, along the stone wall on the easterly side of land owned by Dudley M. Holman to Wall Street, thence to Crescent Beach, thus affording a good road through Hendrickson's Point to Crescent Beach, the land from Ocean Street to Wall Street to be deeded to the Town by Dudley M. Holman.
- Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid Highway Construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.
- Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars (100.00) to tar the road from Jameson's Store to the end of Town road.
- Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to be used to tar Ocean Avenue.

- Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to repair the foundation of the Town Hall.
- Art. 42. To see what sum of money if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions. Said amount to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 43. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Officers' Salaries.
