

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman Plantation:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of schools.

Though the past year has been considerably interrupted by absences due to diptheria, bad colds, etc., yet on the whole a very satisfactory degree of progress has been made. The credit for this being mainly due to the excellent work of our teachers and the diligence of pupils in making up work lost through absence. I believe that the policy of our school committee in paying salaries sufficiently attractive to secure and hold teachers above the average in training and experience has been amply justified. The difference in cost between a good and an incompetent teacher being so little in comparison to the value received by the pupils as to far out whigh the additional expense.

HIGH SCHOOL

The work of the high school is progressing very satisfactorily under the capable leadership and instruction of Mr. Diehl and Miss Curtis. Thirty-two pupils have been enrolled this year, 24 from Jackman and eight from Moose River. As in the past the rate of tuition charged is the per capita cost of maintaining the school, which for the past fiscal year has averaged \$151.07 per pupil, this of course covering all expenses, including fixed charges, such as interest on the investment in the building and insurance. Due to our limited teaching force and the requirements of the State Department of Education regarding the number and length of teaching periods we are unable to offer as complete preparation for college as we would like, consequently it is not infrequently necessary for our graduates desirous of entering one of the classical colleges to take an additional year at some good preparatory school.

It is however our purpose to give thorough instructon in such subjects as we offer, so that even though our curriculum may be limited in the variety of course it offers, yet in standards of quality it may compare favorably with any secondary school.

PAYSON SMITH GRAMMAR SCHOOL

As for several years past with the exception of the school year 1926-27 this school has been taught by Mrs. Anne Nichols. Mrs. Nichols is a teacher of thorough training and long experience who has an enviable record of success both here and in other towns. The enrollment in this school has varied, but has approximated 25, nine of whom are in the eighth grade, which assures us of a fair sized freshman class in high school next year.

PAYSON SMITH PRIMARY

The enrollment here is about 20. The school is fortunate in having as its teacher a woman of Mrs. Williams' ability and experience. Probably few teachers in the state have taught so long in the same school and certainly few with equal or greater success. During the past year the pupils of the primary and grammar schools with the assistance of their teachers have purchased a set of swings for the playground and have a considerable amount of money on hand for the purchase of additional apparatus.

STATION SCHOOL

At the close of the school year Mrs. Madeline Foster resigned. This vacancy was filled by the election of Mrs. Maxie Johnson a teacher of experience and ability. The school has been smaller than usual this year, at one time having only nine pupils. Within the past few weeks however there has been an increase, so that it now seems probable that the average number for the year will not be much below the usual number.

REPAIRS, ETC.

During the past year the high school building has been painted, lights installed in the grammar school room, the position of the fire escape changed to prevent the accumulation of ice, some work done at the Station School to prevent water entering the basement, and other general repairs made. A certain amount of repair work is necessary each year to keep the buildings in proper condition, the recommendation of the committee being what is considered necessary to maintain the buildings and fixtures in good condition. In making our recommendations for school appropriations we have carefully considered the cost of maintaining the schools at the usual standard of efficiency making due allowance for such income as we may receive from other sources. These recommendations have according to the usual custom been submitted to the budget committee for their approval.

Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

To Joseph Francouer, Constable for the Plantation of Jackman in the County of Somerset: GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitatns of Jackman plantation qualified by law to vote in Plantation affairs, to assemble at Jackman Hall, in said Jackman, on the eightquenth day of March A. D. 1929, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, viz:

Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2 To choose a Plantation clerk, assessors, overseers of the poor, collector of taxes, and all officers required by law to be chosen at the annual March meeting, and it is to be understood that the person chosen collector of taxes shall be required to make a full and complete settlement with the plantation not later than March 1, 1930.

Art. 3 To see if the plantation will vote to elect a road commissioner, fix his compensation, and have it understood that a certain sum of common road money shall be set aside for fall use after the patrol is taken off if need be, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 4 To see if the plantation will instruct the assessors to appoint a road commissioner, fix his compensation and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 5 To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said plantation and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$2200.

Art. 6 To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State Aid on unimproved roads under the patrol system, and pass all votes respecting the same. Art. 7. To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916 and pass all votes respecting same.

Reccommended, \$533.

Art. 8 To see if the plantation will appropriate and raise a sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the plantation is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$600.

Art. 9 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the repair of sidewalks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$200.

Art. 10 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the breaking of snow roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$1,000.00.

Art. 11 To see if the plantation will vote to leave in the hands of the assessors the matter of snow removal and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 12 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers, fix their compensation and pass all votes nespecting the same.

Art. 13 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 14 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for hydrant rental for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$400.

Art 15 To see if the plantation will elect three overseers of the poor, they shall also be known as the Municipal Board of Mother's Aid and Child Guardianship, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 16 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of the poor and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 17 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Jackman Public Library and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$100.

Art. 18 To see if the plantation will vote to elect one or more constables for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 19 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to rase for electric street lights and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 20 To see if the plantation will vote to employ a traffic officer to enforce the law relative to motor vehicles, etc: fix his compensation and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 21 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommend, \$3200.

Art. 22 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of a free high school for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$2200.

Art. 23 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purchase of school text books for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommend, \$150.

Art. 24 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay a joint superintendent of schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommend, \$340.00.

Art. 25 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the payment of insurance, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$110.

Art. 26 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school supplies for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$300

Art. 27 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school house repairs for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$300.00.

Art. 28 To see if the plantation will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to help defray the graduating expenses of the class of 1929 of the Jackman High School.

Recommended, \$25.

Art. 29 To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for procuring a speaker for Memorial Day.

Art. 30 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purpose of paying all or a portion of the plantation debt and interest due thereon and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommend, \$1,000.00.

Art. 31 To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for a public health nurse and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$65.00.

Art. 32 To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of installing a hydrant at the intersection of Forest St., and the street leading to the pump house and pass all votes respecting the same. Art. 33 To see if the plantation will vote to build a tower for the purpose of drying the fire hose properly, so that the hose will not rot, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 34 To see if the plantation will vote to purchase five hundred feet of fire hose and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 35 To see what action the plantation will vote to take, if any relative to the claim for damages to the property of Mar P. Nadeau by reason of the work done on the road and sidewalk leading past her premises and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 36 To see if the plantation will vote to have an Ordinance in regard to the parking of public cars, also the parking of private cars and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 37 To see if the plantation will vote to charge interest at the rate of six percent. on all taxes paid after Sept. 1, 1929.

Art. 38 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session in Jackman Hall on Monday the eighteenth day of March, A. D. 1929 at eight o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
