# High School Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following is an accurate report of conditions in the High School for the year 1921-1922:

School opened Sept. 12, with an enrollement of 32 in the Senior High School

Comparatively little equipment has been purchased this year for the chemical laboratory or the agricultural department or in fact for any course. The agricultural department has had added to it this year a few much needed reference books, while the only expense for the chemical laboratory has been a small amount of glassware and a few chemicals which were necessary for experimental work.

In examining the physics apparatus which must be used next year I find a number of necessary pieces are beyond repair and also the absence of a number of pieces of apparatus which I consider essential to the proper teaching of laboratory physics and it is my suggestion that at least \$100 be appropriated for the purpose of purchasing new equipment for the physical laboratory. The agricultural equipment is still deficient in some respects and there is need of expending from \$75 to \$100 in this department next year. I believe that the agricultural course is of decided importance in this section and should not lack for equipment to make the course efficient in every respect.

The equipment of chairs for the agricultural laboratory have been practically built over this year but they are again becoming useless and a new equipment of chairs must be furnished at once.

The workshop which was installed last year is a decided advantage and the boys have in their shopwork this year manufactured and installed shelves downstairs and in the laboratory, repaired chairs, made bookracks for use by the students in typwriting, filing racks for agricultural bulletins, besides other miscellaneous articles for use in the school and on the farm. The first and second year students in agriculture have also tested milk for various farmers this year.

The agricultural instructor wishes to state that he desires to cooperate with the citizens of the town in the betterment of the teaching of agriculture here and he would appreciate any suggestions along that line. The department, while designed to teach agriculture to the high school students is also designed to be of all possible help to the farmers of the community and the instructor would like to have it understood that he is desirous of the department being used to help the farmer in every possible way. It is felt that all problems presented serve a dual purpose. They help the farmer and also furnish practical work for the student which is most essential.

A fire drill system has been installed in the school this year and I am sure that is has been again and again proven that such a system is necessary insurance for the safety of the students in any school.

The water supply at the school has been especially low this year. For days at a time the school has been without any water and this has caused great inconvenience in the teaching of chemistry and has likewise at times tended to produce unsanitary conditions in the building. I feel that a good and adequate water supply is essential whether it be in the home or in the school.

The school victrola is being used to good advantage in the various rooms and is much enjoyed by the students. It introduces variety and entertainment in the opening exercises which is much to be desired.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and the citizens of Brooks:

It is my privilege to submit my first annual report. So few things have happened to mar the progress of our schools, that I can say in all sincerity that progress has been made.

I think we have done very well in securing competent teachers in about every ease. No school can expect to maintain its efficiency under the strain of losing a large proportion of its experienced teaching force as has been the case. Every effort must be made to stop the exodus of our teachers. In order to build up a good school system, those teachers who make good should be encouraged to remain in the school system. After they have received their experience here at the expense of the pupils we should receive the benefit of that increased efficiency and not make our schools training schools for other towns.

I was hoping to present to you in this report, the standing of your schools as indicated by the Standard Educational Tests, but because of the lack of funds I was unable to do so.

Until the last few years the measurement of the progress of children through school has been based upon tradition, local option and personal opinion. The personal equation of the teacher also had much to do with the success of the pupil. If you were going to measure the length of a house you would use a rule and with that rule you could determine how many feet it was long. But no educational rule has been developed. But now educational experts have devised standards in the different school subjects by which, when the work of a pupil is applied to a scale, we can say the pupil has progressed to a very definite point. Then by comparing the results obtained in our schools with those obtained in other schools we can readily ascertain the standing of our own.

The new school law which took effect this year makes an apportionment for aggregate attendance in our schools. Parents should make an extra effort in order that their children should be in school every day that it is possible for them to be there. The rate per pupil is slightly less than two cents. Aggregate attendance is the total number of days attendance for one year of both elementary and high school pupils resident of the town supporting such high school.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENT

As you will note, the resources do not over the expenditures. This is due to the fact that the town did not have as much money to put into their schools as in previous years. Brooks did not share in the equalization fund, which made a difference of \$560.00. Owing to the increase in agricultural departments the vocational fund was about a hundred dollars less. Ability to share in the equalization fund depends upon the special efforts which the town makes in the matter of its schools which raises its average for school purposes above the average for the state. This year the tax rates are as follows:

You will note from the above that the tax rate for both items of school accounts is below the average.

#### REPAIRS

In the recommendations for this account I have included those things which should be done.

It is absolutely necessary that we have an adequate water supply to suit our needs. The past year we have not had enough to safeguard the health of our children. With over one hundred and fifty pupils in the building, and a scant water supply, it makes a very unsatisfactory condition and at times unsanitary. It seems to me the only feasible thing to do is to connect with the town water supply. It is impossible to deepen the school well and the cost of a new well forbids us from entertaining a plan of this sort.

It is essential in compliance with the Smith-Hughes Act that new chairs be bought for the Agriculture course, to be placed in the laboratory. This course also needs some extra equipment.

At the South Brooks school there is need of some repairs. We would like to replace the old fashioned seats with modern ones. The old seats are in a very delapidated condition. This school has presented a very neat appearance throughout the year and in full justice to both teacher and pupils, I think we should install new seats. The schoolhouse needs painting and if the town will purchase the paint it will be painted free of charge.

These are the repairs foreseen at this time with the exception of a few minor things.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

These recommendations are made with the facts at hand from which to reckon. There are some things which it would be difficult to estimate in the way of resources.
