ART. XIII. To choose fence viewers, surveyors of lumber, measurers of wood and bark, constables, public weighers and all other necessary town officers.

ART. XIV To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to be expended in building concrete sidewalks.

ART. XV To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to be expended in building a State road.

ART. XVI. To see what sums of money the Town will grant and raise for the following departments for the ensuing year:

Repair of Highways and Bridges.

Purchase of Lumber.

ART. XVII. To see if the town will vote to fix a date when all taxes for the ensuing year become due and payable, or act anything relative.

ART. XVIII. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest at the rate of six per cent on all taxes remaining unpaid January 1st, 1907, or act anything relative.

ART. XIX. Fo see if the Town will vote that the collector of taxes shall settle in full for all taxes legally assessed and committed to him for collection on or before February 1, 1907, or forfeit all of his commissions, and that said collector shall be elected upon above conditions.

# Annual Report Of The Chief Engineer Of The Fire Department.

I hereby submit the ninth annual report of the condition of the fire department for the year ending Feb. 1, 1906, containing a full and complete list of the officers and members, condition of apparatus, number of fires, the cause, the loss and insurance as near as can be ascertained, the amount of money expended, and recommendations.

#### FORCE OF DEPARTMENT

The force of the department consists of forty-three men classed as follows: One chief engineer, two assistant engineers, four foremen, four assistant foremen, thirty-two hosemen, ladder men and axe men.

#### FIRES AND ALARMS.

The number of alarms the department has responded to from Feb. 1, 1905 to Feb. 1, 1906, are as follows: Six be I alarms and two still alarms.

Bell alarm March 22, at 11.45 o'clock a. m., at Capt. Reed's grist mill, Kimball street, fire on roof, cause, spark from engin. Extinguished by chemicals from hose one. Da nage slight.

Still alarm Mar. 28, at 5.15, p. m., from Daniel Knight house, School street, chimney fire, extinguished by Hook and Ladder company. No damage.

Still alarm April 7, at 2.30 p. m., from Robert Preble house on Main street, chimney fire. There being no danger, let it burn out.

Bell alarm, May 6, at 4.15, a. m., from Ruel H. Adams' house, Mt. Pleasant. Mr. Adams fought the blaze as best he could, but the fire got well underway before the alarm was rung in. The depart ment responded very promptly, and although it has always been supposed an impossibility to get water at this high point, still the firemen worked faithfully and succeeded after a short delay in lay

ing 1350 feet of hose from hydrant number 9 and got a good stream to the surprise of every one present. This was the first fire on the hill and taking into everything consideration the department deserved all the praise they received. The house burned to the ground, the loss being about one thousand dollars and was fully covered by insurance. Cause was a defective flue.

Bell alarm, June 29, 11 p.m. at R. H. White's house occupied by Mell Blackman. We coupled onto hydrant No. 31 and run out about six hundred feet of bose. It being a dead end the pressure was considered good for this distance. The fire was well underway before the alarm was given and when the fireman arrived every attention was given to the surrounding property. The house was situated in the town of Bowdoinham and the total loss was estimated at three hundred dollars.

Bell alarm July 15, 9.30, a. m., J. K. Hathorne's residence, corner Kimball and Front street. The department responded and bose was laid from hydrant number 12, but this fire being in and around the chimney was handled wholly by chemicals. Damage \$5. Insured.

Bell alarm Nov. 21, 5.15 a.m., from Jericho in building occupied by F. R. Duren as a lumber shed. The fire was caused by sparks from passing freight train. The department responded promptly and hose was laid from hydrant number 22 on North Pleasant corner Kimball street. The fire was promptly extinguished, damages about \$10.

Bell alarm Dec. 12, 10.45 a.m., from Geo. H. Theobald residence on Pleasant street. The department was quickly on hand; hose was laid from hydrant number 28. This fire was caused by a defective fue, setting fire to the woodwork upon the second floor. By the quick and effective work of the department it was speedily extinguished with a loss of about \$200. A very close call. Insured

#### LOSSES AND INSURANCE.

The entire loss by fire this year is about \$1215.00 Covered by insurance.

#### **APPARATUS**

The apparatus in the department consists of two hose wagons with two pony chemicals each, one hose reel, one hook and ladder truck, three sleds for winter use for hose; two pony chemicals on Mt. Pleasant, at J. J. Gaubert's residence, and F. P. Hathorne's residence, one each. In reserve, we have one hand engine and reel and one hose reel.

#### DETAILED STATEMENT OF APPARATUS.

Noble Maxwell Hose Co. No. 1. House on Main street, near railroad. Apparatus in fine condition.

Independent Hose Co. No. 2. House on South Front street, Apparatus in fine condition.

Volunteer Hose Co. No. 3. House on North Front street. Apparatus in first class condition.

J. Clark Flagg Hook and Ladder Co. House on School street, under Town hall. Apparatus in splendid condition.

#### HOSE.

There are 2,000 feet of hose in the department, 2 1 2 inches, all first class.
